ANOTHER CANDIDATE ENTERS MAYORALTY FIELD

ALD. NEWTON WAS ENDORSED

Property Holders Association Went on Record as Being Unanimously in Favor of Ald. Newton as Mayor for 1912

AN ALDERMANIC TICKET WAS NAMED

Those Suggested Were Messrs. Angle, Lannic, Maitland, Bullock-Webster, and Aldermen Douglas, Clayton, Morrissey, Kerr—Committee to Call on Them

Before a rather slim attendance of the Property Holders' Association last night Alderman Newton was given the unanimous endorsement of that body in his campaign for mayor. The candidate in acknowledging the honor conferred on him said that his chief object in aiming to become mayor was in order to achieve the reforms he had set his heart on a year before, but which he had found himself unable to secure. He declared that he had been obstructed in his efforts to secure reforms and the obstruction, instead of squelching him, had aroused his "ginger" and made him decide to become mayor. He said that despite the indemnity of \$2,000 offered by

the city he would have to make financial sacrifices to become mayor, but this he was quite prepared to make in order to get a chance to give the people good government. In answer to a question, Alderman Newton promised to look into the police administration. He said he had been informed that the Police Magistrate had once censured the Police Chief for doing his duty. If such a thing occurred in his administration he would see to it that a request was made to Victoria that the magistrate's resignation be asked for. They were sentenced to one month's imprisonment with hard labor. The men were discovered when a day out from Vancouver concealed on shelves in the fan room. They will remain in Rupert to serve their sentences.

ALD. HILDITCH ENTERS CONTEST

Announces That He Will Oppose Alderman Hilditch for the Mayoralty Rather Than See Him go in Unopposed

A WARM CAMPAIGN IS EXPECTED

Chairman of the Board of Works Secures the Empress Theatre, the Skating Rink and the New Westholme Theatre in Which to Hold Meetings

The withdrawal of Mr. Frank Mobley from the mayoral contest caused some disappointed surprise amongst a number of citizens yesterday, and surmise was strong that Alderman J. H. Hilditch would oppose his old adversary of the Council Board, Alderman Newton. His announcement in the morning press today gives considerable satisfaction to the section of the community that "wants to see the fun." Up to the last moment yesterday Alderman Hilditch refused to declare himself, though his mind must have been made up. The announcement of his candidature was made to his friends at the Kaien Island Club later in the evening. Interest centres now upon the

coming announcement of Alderman Hilditch's platform, and the fact that he is to be "the star" for the opening of the new Westholme Theatre attracts still further special attention. It is characteristic of Alderman Hilditch that when passing the Westholme Theatre late yesterday afternoon with a News reporter he remarked: "It will be a good long while before that place is ready for opening." In a few hours thereafter printers were busy on the announcement that he would address the first audience in that very building. Speaking since his decision, Alderman Hilditch said that he was prepared to stand by his record at the Council Board.

The campaign, he said, would begin at once, and he would then have an opportunity to put his views clearly before the public. He hoped to have the chance to speak before every voter before the week's campaign closed and present his views on the public questions fully before them. On Saturday night he will address a meeting in the Empress Theatre. On Monday night he will speak in Section 5 in the skating rink. On Wednesday night he will occupy the new Westholme Theatre, which will be opened to the public by a grand mass meeting in his interests. Choicest liquors and cigars—Savoy.

ALD. HILDITCH OUTLINES HIS MUNICIPAL PLATFORM

"LET THE PEOPLE CHOOSE BETWEEN WHAT THEY HAVE SEEN AND TRIED AND WHAT THEY HAVE YET TO PROVE PRACTICAL," SAYS JOHN H. HILDITCH.

"I have not had time yet to prepare my platform," said Alderman Hilditch to The Daily News this morning. "It is only since 6 o'clock last night that I knew definitely that I was to come out, but I hope to have my platform in shape to put before the public tomorrow." Asked to give an outline of his probable position, Alderman Hilditch briefly summarized his platform thus: "It is my intention to continue the present plan of administration. The public see what they are getting, and I will develop this in line with the city's growth as far as is practicable. If they choose instead to go in for something as yet untried and which they have not any practical assurance about it is up to them. "As regards the 45-cent rate, I mean to continue the wage scale as at present. I have always been a strong advocate of the installation of a permanent sewer system. As for the Hays Creek sewer, a petition must now be

submitted by the people. If elected, I should act upon that. "I should certainly support the completion of the public park already begun by the present Council. "Fire protection and increased water supply are, of course, to be attended to, but I shall make no attempt at criticism of Alderman Newton's platform in my announcement. TURKISH GENERAL CLAIMS THAT HE ANNIHILATED THE ITALIAN ARMY

Twenty-four Hour Battle Was Fought at the Close of the Old Year at Tobruk Near Tripoli

(Canadian Press Despatch.)
Washington, Jan. 3.—Word of a twenty-four-hour battle, in which the Turkish troops defeated the Italian forces, killing half their number in a rout that followed, is conveyed in a despatch from Constantinople to the Turkish Embassy. A message from the commander of the Turkish forces at Tobruk, Tripoli, says he attacked the fortified posts of the enemy, notwithstanding the fire from the warships and batteries, and entered the fort. The garrison, he says, has been annihilated. Stores, ammunition, provisions and guns were carried into the Turkish camp. One of the Turkish wings cut off the retreat of the enemy, who fled toward the coast. The battle lasted all day and all night. Among the killed were three Italian officers.

SKATING PARTY AT SHAWATLANS

Moonlight Trip to the Lake Last Night—Ice in Perfect Condition—First Party Since Pioneer Days.

For the first time since the pioneer days of Prince Rupert Shawatlans Lake has been visited by a large skating party. Toward 9 o'clock last night the launch Rover left the Rupert Marine wharf with a big freight of skaters, provisioned for an Arctic trip, and supplied with ropes and a light sled. From the falls to the camp at the head of the lake the party sped in brilliant moonlight. Unfortunately, just a little way from his destination one member of the band struck a blow hole and went through to the waist. He picked himself out with no worse disaster than the loss of a couple of axes which he had been carrying. The party picnicked in the Shawatlans camp kitchen by courtesy of the camp cook, whose welcome was hospitable in the highest degree. A final hour was spent on the perfect ice at the rear end of the lake. The party

returned to the city at 4 a. m. satisfied that Prince Rupert can provide skating facilities equal to any in the east. The party included, among others: Mrs. Robinson, Miss Drummond, Miss Ellett, Miss Du Vernet and Messrs. Tooker, Gamble, Warton, MacMaster, Purdy. Captain Norman Broadhurst was in charge of the Rover.

THE OPENING OF CAMERON'S COVE.

The judgment of the Railway Commission in the Rochester case, announced exclusively in The Daily News yesterday, will be good news not merely to Mr. Rochester and his colleagues, but also to the general public. It means that despite the agreement between the G. T. P. and the Provincial Government whereby they divide up the waterfront between them it will now be possible for scows to enter the city at Cameron's Cove.

Mr. Rochester and his colleagues are to be complimented and congratulated—complimented for the fight they put up against the railway company, even after the City Council had by letter withdrawn their opposition to the filling up of the bays, and congratulated on the victory that has crowned their efforts.

The protection which the Railway Commission affords in looking after the rights of individuals and of small municipalities who are so often preyed upon by the large and wealthy railway corporations is a splendid service which will long redound to the statesmen who foresaw the need of appointing such a tribunal with a strong man at its head.

Though fighting to defend the riparian rights they had purchased in pursuit of private enterprise, the victory of Mr. Rochester and his colleagues is one that the public in general can feel satisfaction in.

COMMENTS ON THINGS CURRENT.

Having gotten the juggernaut placed in position on Wednesday morning, Alderman Hilditch naturally felt so elated by night time that he couldn't resist the temptation to run for Mayor.

After having been on fighting terms for nearly a year, the coming together of Alderman Newton and Alderman Hilditch at the polls is looked upon with a good deal more of human than of political interest.

Is there luck in odd numbers? This is the third time Alderman Hilditch has offered himself for service on the Council. He is also the third nominee to go up against Alderman Newton.

On the other hand, Alderman Newton's man is the third mayoral candidate he has endorsed since incorporation. Each of the other two got in. Will the luck hold for another year?

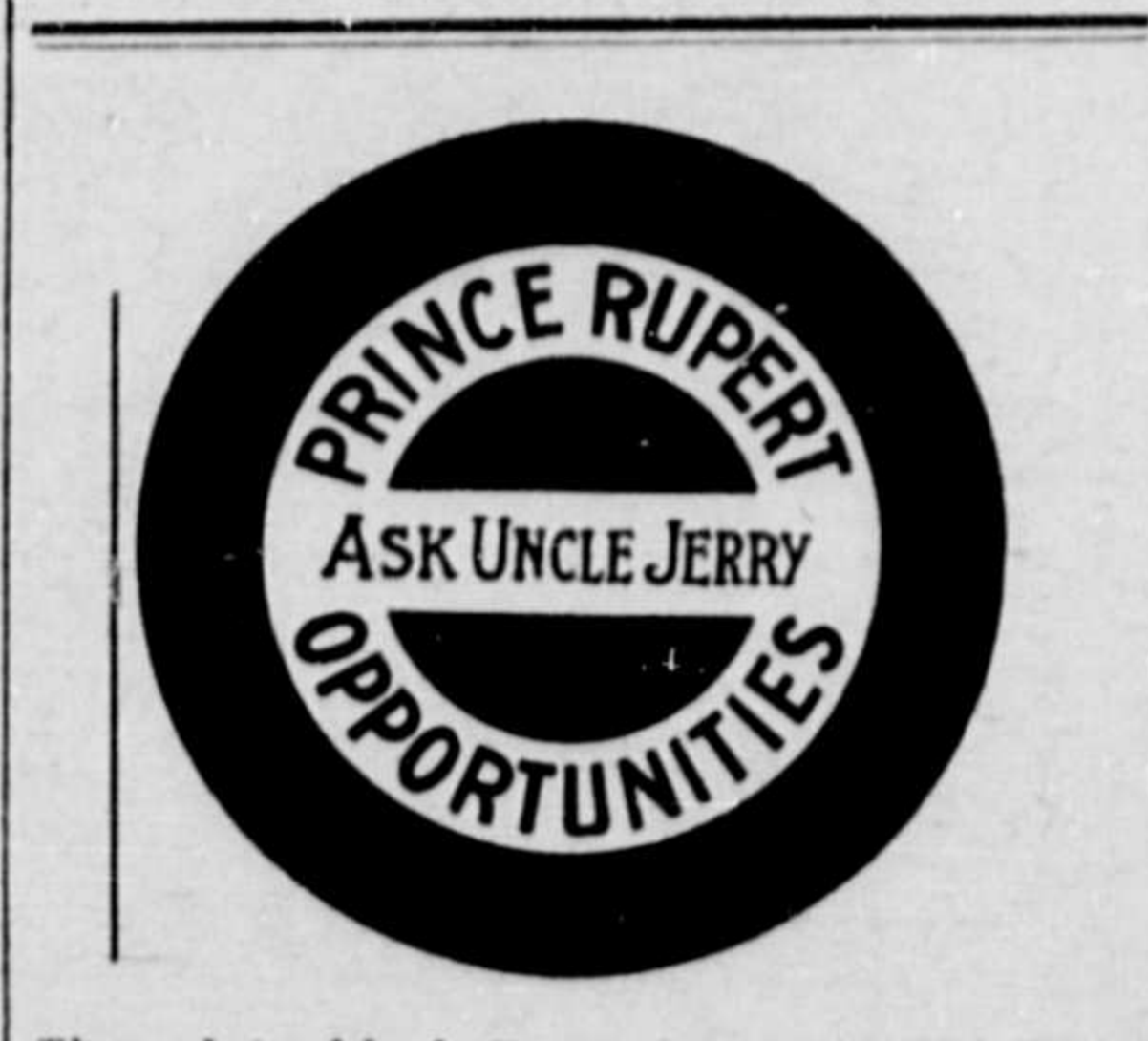
