British Declaration Is Awaited

READY TO WITHDRAW

Italy Will Leave Spain if Britain Recognizes Ethiopian Sovereignty, It Is Said

LONDON, March 23: (CP)—The Daily Mail said yesterday that Rome had indicated that it was willing to withdraw Italian forces from the Spanish civil war in return for British recognition of the Italian conquest and sovereignty of Ethiopia.

ROUND UP NOBILITY

Even Those In High Places Run Foul of Nazis in Austria—Windsor Plea Rejected

VIENNA, March 23: (CP)—Chancellor Adolf Hitler has politely refused a plea by the Duke of Windsor, formerly King Edward VIII of England, on behalf of Baron Louis von Rothschild who has been imprisoned along with other members of the Austrian aristocracy, including two of the Maximilians, following the German annexation of Austria.

Former Chancellor Kurt von Schuschnigg, who had been at first held in his palace, has now been removed to a small house on the palace grounds where he is being kept under strict guard. There seems to be considerable uncertainty as to his future disposition.

OVERTURE REJECTED

France Not Interested in Talking Peace With Loyalists—Rebels Advance

BURGOS, Spain, March 23.—General Francisco Franco said last night that he was not interested in negotiating a peace treaty with the Spanish loyalists. It had been reported that five government delegates were coming here to sue for peace.

Yesterday the insurgent drive toward the Mediterranean coast was resumed with sudden fierceness, three more key towns being captured. The rebels expect to be at the coast within a very short time now. There have been two thousand government casualties in hand to hand fighting, the insurgents claim.

Today insurgent guns thundered east and northwest of Huesca as General Franco shifted his drive northward to liberate Huesca in eastern Spain from a government "pocket."

Smallpox On Halifax Ship

One Sailor Dead and Two Others Suffering From Malady

HALIFAX, March 23.—An East Indian sailor off a visiting ship died of smallpox here. Two hospital orderlies who had been attending him are also down with the malady. Four thousand persons have been vaccinated against smallpox, serum having been rushed here by airplane.

NEW YORK: (CP)—Bar silver was unchanged at 44 3/4 per ounce on the New York metal market today.

FORMER PREMIER DIES
GUELPH, Ont.—Hon. Walter Scott, Liberal Premier of Saskatchewan from 1905 to 1916, died in hospital here of a heart condition. He was seventy years of age and had been in failing health for some years.

APPEAL DISMISSED
VANCOUVER—Charles H. Cahnan's appeal from a conviction for robbery with violence was dismissed by the British Columbia Court of Appeal today.

POLICE SEARCHING
VANCOUVER—British Columbia police started search today for Wesley and Gordon Gibbons of Nanaimo who have been missing since last Thursday when they left Vancouver for Nanaimo on a thirty foot boat. Strong winds had been blowing on the Gulf since and it is believed the men may have taken shelter near one of the Gulf Islands.

Gas Not To Be Used For War

WASHINGTON, D.C., March 23: (CP)—An agreement has been reached, it was reported last night, whereby Germany undertakes not to use gas supplied by United States for military purposes in dirigibles. Export of gas to Germany had been held up by the United States pending such an agreement.

LITHUANIA AIR TENSE

Authorities Take Action to Check Disorders in Protest at Surrender to Poland

KOVNO, Lithuania, arch 23:—Strict curfew regulations were put into effect last night in this capital city owing to a tense situation which has followed street demonstrations against the government for its action in submitting to the Polish ultimatum last week. There has been much rioting and disorder.

WRECKAGE OF PLANE IS FOUND

British Air Ministry Unable to Determine Why Bomber Was Off Norway Coast

LONDON, March 23: (CP)—The British Air Ministry announced last night that the mystery of the disappearance of a crack bomber last month had been partially solved with the discovery of wreckage off Karmo Island on the Norway coast. There was no indication as to why the plane should have been so far away from England.

STOCKS IN CANADA UP

February Better in Toronto List—Values Highest Since October

TORONTO, arch 23: (CP)—Despite the shorter month, February trading on the Toronto Stock Exchange amounted to 20,791,800 shares, an increase of 1,185,397 over January and highest since last April. Values of shares traded at \$37,876,297 were \$422,790 higher than January, best since October, 1937.

Gold shares contributed most of the increase in activity, particularly large volume being recorded in a number of prospects and near producing issues. Substantial gains were recorded by a number of these secondaries but the goods as a whole finished the month at slightly lower levels. Considerable irregularity was shown in price movements in individual sessions and the Exchange's index of 26 representative issues consequently held within a range of less than four points. Opening at its high for the period of 125.08 the index touched a low of 121.70 on February 10 and closed the month at 122.17, down 2.91.

VATICAN CITY, March 23: (CP)—Pope Pius has made two appeals to General Francisco Franco to use moderation in air bombing of civilian populations in the Spanish civil war.

Great Britain and France had asked the Pope to join in appeals to General Franco after the bombings of Barcelona last week.

Former President Hoover Sees King, Also Chamberlain

LONDON, March 23: (CP)—Former President Herbert Hoover of the United States had a half hour visit yesterday with King George. He also called on Premier Neville Chamberlain at his office in Parliament. Mr. Hoover sailed today on his return to New York following his visit to Europe and the British Isles.

SEATTLE, March 23: (CP)—The Alaska Steamship Co. last night cancelled six sailings owing to the dispute of the American Federation of Labor-affiliated machinists and salmon packers with the Alaska salmon cannery. The men have refused to take wage reductions which the companies claim are necessary.

French Fiscal Bills Approved

Important Measures For Blum Government in France Passed by Chamber of Deputies

PARIS, March 23: (CP)—The Chamber of Deputies last night approved two important fiscal measures for Premier Blum's government—that providing \$238,000,000 for increased armaments and the other covering current estimates. The bills are now before the Senate.

Cabinet Gathering To Put Finishing Touch To Policy Statement

Broad Lines of Anticipated Stand Indicate Little Change—Russian Proposal for Conference Considered Inopportune

LONDON, March 23: (CP)—The British cabinet gathered today to put finishing touches to the foreign policy declaration which Prime Minister Neville Chamberlain will make in the House of Commons tomorrow. Mr. Chamberlain is expected to tell the cabinet tonight that the new quickening of rearmament must parallel Britain's course of action in the troubled international situation.

The broad lines of the declaration are understood to be:
Great Britain cannot disassociate herself from events in Central Europe but there can be no pledge of military support for Czecho-Slovakia.
Reaffirmation of the British pledge to assist France or Belgium if either are attacked.
No Spanish intervention.
Close collaboration with the French government to continue.
The Russian proposal for a conference is considered inopportune.

INDEMNIFY OPERATORS

Mexican Workers' Confederation Would Compensate Oil People For Expropriation

MEXICO CITY, March 23: (CP)—The Confederation of Mexican workers has suggested a special series of taxes to pay foreign oil operators for loss of their \$400,000,000 industry expropriated by the government.

The Confederation suggests that taxes be placed on real estate, industry, securities and wages above one hundred pesos (\$28) per month.

U.S. CLAIM ON PANAY

Indemnity of \$2,214,000 Sought in Sinking of Yangste River Gunboat

WASHINGTON, D.C., March 23.—The United States government has sent a claim to Japan amounting to \$2,214,007 arising out of the bombing of the United States gunboat Panay in the Yangste River. The figure includes \$1,945,000 the actual value placed on the ship and three vessels she was conveying as well as compensation for three deaths and forty injuries arising out of the incident.

German History And Geography

Curricula in Schools of Austria Changed—No Firearms Allowed

VIENNA, March 23.—The new Nazi authority has ordered the study of German history and geography, instead of Austrian, in schools of Austria. Nazi philosophy is also to be studied including the history of the movement.

Another decree orders the turning in of all firearms and ammunition held by private citizens prior to Friday after which severe penalties will be imposed on those found in possession of them.

THE 102nd BATTERY

The thanks of the community should be extended to the officers and men of the 102nd Battery training in Prince Rupert for home defense. They give hours of their time to perfecting themselves in physical set-up, in gunnery, signalling, range finding, ambulance work and the other incidentals to coast defense work. They have done this in spite of difficulties. They have had very little encouragement from the Department of National Defense at Ottawa which, so far, has been devoting its energies to defending Vancouver and Victoria.

Happily there seems to be a change coming over the situation. A little attention is being given to Prince Rupert and, when there is any little instrument or weapon not needed elsewhere, they take the trouble to ship it north. A gun shed has been completed on the waterfront to house a gun when it arrives. We have not been told what happened the guns that formerly were said to have been coming for that purpose.

The department is also planning to clear the land this year for two or three gun positions at advantageous positions and tenders have been called for the clearing of the land. That is a move in the right direction. When they are completed, it is understood they will be manned by the local battery. In the meantime we trust to luck for our defense. So far there is no gun here for the use of the boys in kakhi.

TURNING BOOK AND PAGE

Turning back a page in history it is well to remember that it was the efforts of the local 102nd Regiment, prior to its conversion to artillery, that brought about the purchase from their own funds of the present armories. Ottawa refused even to give a grant until shamed into doing so by the members of the regiment. The officers and men worked night after night, Sunday after Sunday, nailing boards and doing the work themselves which made the present headquarters fit for use. Today the armory is a splendid monument to the energy and persistence of the local militia and not to the Canadian governments, no matter of what political stripe. All were equally negligent.

Under these circumstances it is really wonderful what has been achieved here. The showing made Monday night was excellent in view of the circumstances. The unit is being steadily built up and officers and men seem to work together with splendid co-operative spirit.

MINISTER OF DEFENSE

We are looking for great things from the present Minister of National Defense, Hon. Ian Mackenzie. He has at any rate recognized the strategic importance of Prince Rupert and, if his plans are carried out, we shall eventually be in a position to keep a possible enemy from raiding our city, destroying the dry dock and seizing the railway. We hope that among other things the minister will see the desirability of building a highway from Prince Rupert to connect at Terrace with the provincial highway. We realize that there is opposition to many of his plans but we think he has done wonders on this coast so far.



SPORT CHAT

Man O'War comes of age March 29. And in the belief of many, Man O'War is still the greatest horse alive. Man O'War was foaled March 29, 1917. Technically, of course, he was 21 on January for every registered thoroughbred becomes a year older in the record of the first year, no matter if he was born December 31.

"They ain't never been a hoss like Man O'War," says Will Harbut. "And, furthermore, they ain't never likely to be one." Will is Man O'War's personal valet. He has a chest like a potato barrel and a drawl you could slice with a butter knife. On Samuel D. Riddle's Faraway farm near Lexington, Kentucky, the big negro personally looks after the grooming of his charge. He likes to recite the record of the horse that lost only once in 21 starts as a two and three-year-old and since has sired well past 250 thoroughbreds.

Sitting there in the tackroom beside a purring stove, Will looks up from his polishing. It's Man O'War's saddle he's "dusting up a bit." Each stroke is a caress. "I don't want to be famous nohow. Man O'War's famous — that enough." Across the concrete drive, in a spotless white barn bordered in green, Man O'War munches his hay. Big Will leads the way. "Gentlemen," he says, "you is looking at the greatest hoss of all time. His teeth is perfect, his wind is perfect, his digestion is perfect — and, gentlemen, look at them legs. Ever see legs like that on a hoss Man O'War's age?"

Man O'War entered the stud in 1921 and is still in demand. His foals, through last year, averaged race earnings of \$9,366. They won 246 races, placed in 732 and showed in 645. The average per foal stands at the top among averages of 27 leading sires listed in available records. "Big Red" has sired two Kentucky Derby winners — War Admiral (1937) and Clyde Van Dusen (1929). Man O'War himself, so honored in the Bluegrass as a Lexington American Legion Post was named after him, never won the Kentucky Derby; did not, in fact, ever race in Kentucky.

Man O'War suffered his only defeat when, as a two-year-old, he ran second in the Sanford Memorial at Saratoga. Man O'War earned \$249,465 in his two years on the track but Big Will says if purses had been the same in "Big Red's" day as now he would have won \$600,000.

"Big Red" does about seven miles of road work daily this time of year. A little jaunting, a little walking, a little galloping. His day starts at four a.m. His thick mattress of straw is changed first thing, then he breakfasts on oats, timothy and clover. Big Will grooms him at 6:30. As soon as he comes back from his workout, Big Will grooms him again. At 11 he gets his oats and hay and some bran. From a little after 12 until three o'clock Man O'War prances in the paddock then Big Will leads him back in for — you guessed it! — a third grooming. It's time then for oats and hay again. Six o'clock is "lights out" time. A night man watches the famous sire's every move until he is relieved at four a.m.

WEDDED FOR BEER

Winners of this round meet for the right to play either Toronto Maple Leafs or Boston Bruins in the final for the trophy.

Timely Recipes

FISH LOAF

Many fish cookery recipes are very simple, calling for fish and little else, but Canadian fish foods lend themselves to numerous variations in treatment and one of the cookery demonstrators on the staff of the Dominion Department of Fisheries suggests a "fish loaf" which may be new to a good many housewives. Any kind of Canadian fish may be used in making it and it may be served either hot or cold.

"In making this fish loaf," the demonstrator said, "a tablespoon of flour is first added to a tablespoon of melted butter and the two are cooked together for a minute; then one cup of hot milk is added while the mixture is stirred constantly. Next I put in sufficient salt and pepper to suit the taste, and after that comes the addition of two cups of cooked fish, two beaten eggs, one cup of bread crumbs, one chopped hard boiled egg, two chopped pickles, and three tablespoons of parsley.

"When these additions have been made and the ingredients have been well combined the mixture is poured into a greased baking dish or mould, the dish is placed in a pan of boiling water and put to cook in a moderate oven. An hour's cooking time is required. When cooking has been finished the loaf is unmoulded. Whether one likes it better hot than cold or the other wayway round is a matter of individual taste."

HELPING OF BOYS

Constable R. Eyeleigh Does Work As Policeman He Wanted to Do As Minister

VANCOUVER, March 23: (CP)—Constable Ronald Eyeleigh accomplished as a policeman the job he planned 10 years before when training for the ministry at the University of British Columbia.

"I was always interested in boys, and wanted to help them," said the supervisor of the year-old Junior G-Men, a boys' club with 2,000 members in British Columbia and branches in other parts of Canada.

"That's what I had in mind when I started at the U.B.C., but after three years the depression put an end to those plans and I got a police job."

One April day in 1937 when off duty he saw fellow-officers halt a game of street baseball which led to a shattered window.

As the 17 young players passed by him grumbling, Eyeleigh stopped them and suggested forming a club and finding a place for them to play.

The first problem, choice of a name, was settled when Eyeleigh asked about their favorite characters in fiction and movies.

"G-men!" was the answer, and so they were called the Junior G-Men. The name attracted youngsters quickly and membership soared to 100 within a month.

Adult instructors volunteered aid. A service club helped Eyeleigh obtain an abandoned factory. The boys made it a club-house, the first of five in Vancouver where lads between the ages of eight and 18 can practise any one of 30 hobbies.

Before many weeks the group became a city-wide movement. Eyeleigh was given leave of absence from the city police to aid organization.

An adult board of trustees, chosen from leading citizens, aided him. The clubs, however, are run by the boys themselves, each centre being directed by a council which brings requests and problems to Eyeleigh.

Recently the club was incorporated under the Dominion Companies Act as the Junior G-Men of Canada to prevent its commercial exploitation.

Small monthly dues are charged, but a boy never is refused because of inability to pay. Instead, he is allotted some task around the club-house to make him feel he's doing his share.

"It's really those sort of boys we're after," said Eyeleigh. "Fellows who have no place to play but on the streets, who can't afford toys and games."

By giving them a place to play, he feels he's putting into action the club motto: "It is better to build boys than to mend men."
