# Cumberland Woman Wins Fortune

## Miner's Wife Holder Of First Prize Ticket in Hospital Sweepstake

Mrs. R. Sutton Had Sold Half of Her Chance—Would Have Won \$150,000—Ontario Woman Has Similar Good Fortune

TORONTO, October 26.—Two Canadian women won \$150,000 each in the Irish Hospitals Sweepstake when Contravent won the Cesarwitch today. The winners were Miss Dora Smith, Strathroy, Ontario, hairdresser, and Mrs. R. Sutton, a Cumberland, British Columbia, miner's wife. Both women had sold half interests in their tickets before the race was run.

## GOV'T IS PREPARED

Attorney General Wismer Himself Will Go Into Court to Defend Cut in Gasoline Price

VICTORIA, Oct. 26: (CP)—Premier T. D. Pattullo announced yesterday that Attorney General Gordon Wismer will conduct the government's case before Mr. Justice A. M. Manson tomorrow when His Lordship hears arguments of the oil companies asking for a continuation of the temporary injunction against the reduction of gasoline prices.

## NEW PHONE RATES HERE

Revisions Have Particularly to Do With Extensions—Tax Payments Easier—Old Buildings Sold

First reading was given this morning by City Commissioner W. J. Alder, in his capacity as a city council, to a bylaw making certain revisions in telephone rates, particularly residential extensions which may now be obtained at as low a rate as 50c per month. The bylaw will come up again Friday morning for final reconsideration and adoption.

## Fishermen To Hear About Co-Operatives

Brief Course of Lectures To Be Held on Coast This Winter

VANCOUVER, Oct. 26: (CP)—A brief course of instruction in co-operative principles probably will be held about the middle of December for British Columbia fishermen, Dr. Gordon Shrum, director of the extension department of the University of British Columbia announces. Nova Scotia educationists familiar with co-operatives of that province have been invited to give the lectures which will take place at the University of British Columbia, lasting three to five days.

## ROOSEVELT OPTIMISTIC

Anticipates no Difficulty in Connection with New Wages and Hours Law

WASHINGTON, D.C., Oct. 26.—President Franklin D. Roosevelt, speaking yesterday, indicated optimism in regard to the operation of the new wages and hours law which has just come into effect in interstate industry.

By the time the November elections come along, the new laws will be working smoothly, the chief executive expects.

He hoped, the President said, that employers and employees would sit down together and work out their problems without entering upon the legal phases.

## BIG FIGHT NOW OVER

Sino-Japanese Conflict Expected to Be Pursued Now on Guerrilla Basis—Hankow Largely Destroyed

SHANGHAI, Oct. 26: (CP)—Japanese and foreign dispatches report that the Japanese army and navy completed the occupation of Hankow today as well as the sister cities of Wuchang and Yangang. Twenty-six Japanese warships steamed up the Yangtze to a position off Hankow's Japanese concession. Army units marched into Hankow from the northeast.

## NAZI ENVOY IS IN ROME

Ribbentrop to Discuss Hungarian-Czech Situation with Italian Authorities

ROME, Oct. 26.—Foreign Minister Joachim von Ribbentrop of Germany arrived in Rome today to discuss with Italian authorities the question of the Hungarian-Czechoslovakian territorial dispute. It was reported last night that Czechoslovakia had sent a new proposal to Hungary not complying with Hungary's demands but proposed further negotiation.

## Mercy Flight To Vancouver

Seven Month Old Boy, Suffering From Pneumonia, Flown To City

VANCOUVER, Oct. 26: (CP)—Pilot Howard Macdonald arrived here yesterday after a 200-mile flight from Alert Bay with a seven month old baby boy, Martin Dahl, suffering from pneumonia. The child, accompanied by its mother, came from Port McNeill to Alert Bay to board the plane. The child, now in hospital here, is given a fighting chance to live.

## Special Session Of Legislature

Alberta Provincial House Is Called For November 15 To Talk Oil And Gas

EDMONTON, Oct. 26: (CP)—A special session of the Alberta Legislature is called for November 15 to deal with legislation respecting the conservation of gas and oil production within the province. The session, it is expected, will last for only three or four days.

## KENT NEW GOVERNOR

Brother of King is Appointed Viceroy of Commonwealth

LONDON, Oct. 26: (CP)—The Duke of Kent, brother of King George, will be the next Governor General of Australia, it was announced last night. He and the Duchess of Kent will leave next year for Canberra. The Duke, succeeding Lord Gowrie whose term expires in November of next year, will be the first royal Governor General of Australia.

## KING WILL SEE QUINTS

Their Majesties to Visit Callander During Their Stay in Canada

TORONTO, Oct. 26: (CP)—King George and Queen Elizabeth, it was officially learned yesterday, will proceed to Callander during their visit to Canada next year to see the Dionee quintuplets. Their Majesties have expressed the desire to mingle without formality among the five little girls who will be five years old then. Utmost satisfaction was expressed by Dr. Allan Roy Daffoe, the quint's physician, when advised that the King and Queen would visit "his babies."

## BIG SHIP IS AFIRE ON OCEAN

German Liner Deutschland Sends Out "S.O.S."—Vessels Racing to Her Aid

NEW YORK, Oct. 26.—The great German transatlantic liner Deutschland was afire in the ocean 200 miles south of Cape Race, Newfoundland, last night with the lives of 800 passengers and crew of between 300 and 400 at first believed in danger, later advices stating that the fire was under control. In distress messages, which sent eight ships racing towards the stricken vessel, the captain said it might be necessary to take to the lifeboats in stormy seas. Preparations were being made to abandon ship. The fire was in No. 2 hold and raged alarmingly for three hours.

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#### STRATEGIC RETREAT

Evidently the rape of Nanking was sufficient warning to the Chinese against trying to defend a large city against invaders. The Chinese army has again retreated, following out the policy set at the beginning of the war. By surrendering both Hankow and Canton the Chinese have lost prestige with the world but it was better to withdraw than to put up a futile defence.

If the morale of the Chinese troops has not been weakened by the steady withdrawal, it is possible they may yet prove dangerous to the Japanese, especially in view of the extremely long line of communications it is necessary for the invaders to maintain.

#### UNEMPLOYMENT AGAIN

The Speech from the Throne yesterday, speaking of unemployment, stated that "further efforts will be made as far as possible to create and stimulate new opportunity." This is the most interesting feature of the document which is the official declaration of policy of the provincial government for the session.

If the government is able to bring about establishment of a few industries such as a pulp mill at Prince Rupert or any similar enterprise, it would create employment. The building of the Alaska Highway would create employment and so would the completion of the highway between Prince Rupert and Edmonton. We shall be glad to hear of any move that will give men who want to work an opportunity to get off the relief lists.

#### DR. MANION'S WESTERN VISIT

Dr. Manion seems to have made a good impression in the cities of southern B.C. as a jolly good fellow, a good mixer and one who is willing to at least pretend enjoyment of the most trivial entertainment. He is said to be vivacious and keen and able to adapt himself to any company.

We wish the new leader had been able to visit Prince Rupert. Possibly when he comes west again the local Conservatives will be able to prevail upon him to visit the city so that, if at any time he should become Premier, he would have us in mind. In any event he is a big man and we should all like to hear him speak and see what sort of a man he is to meet.

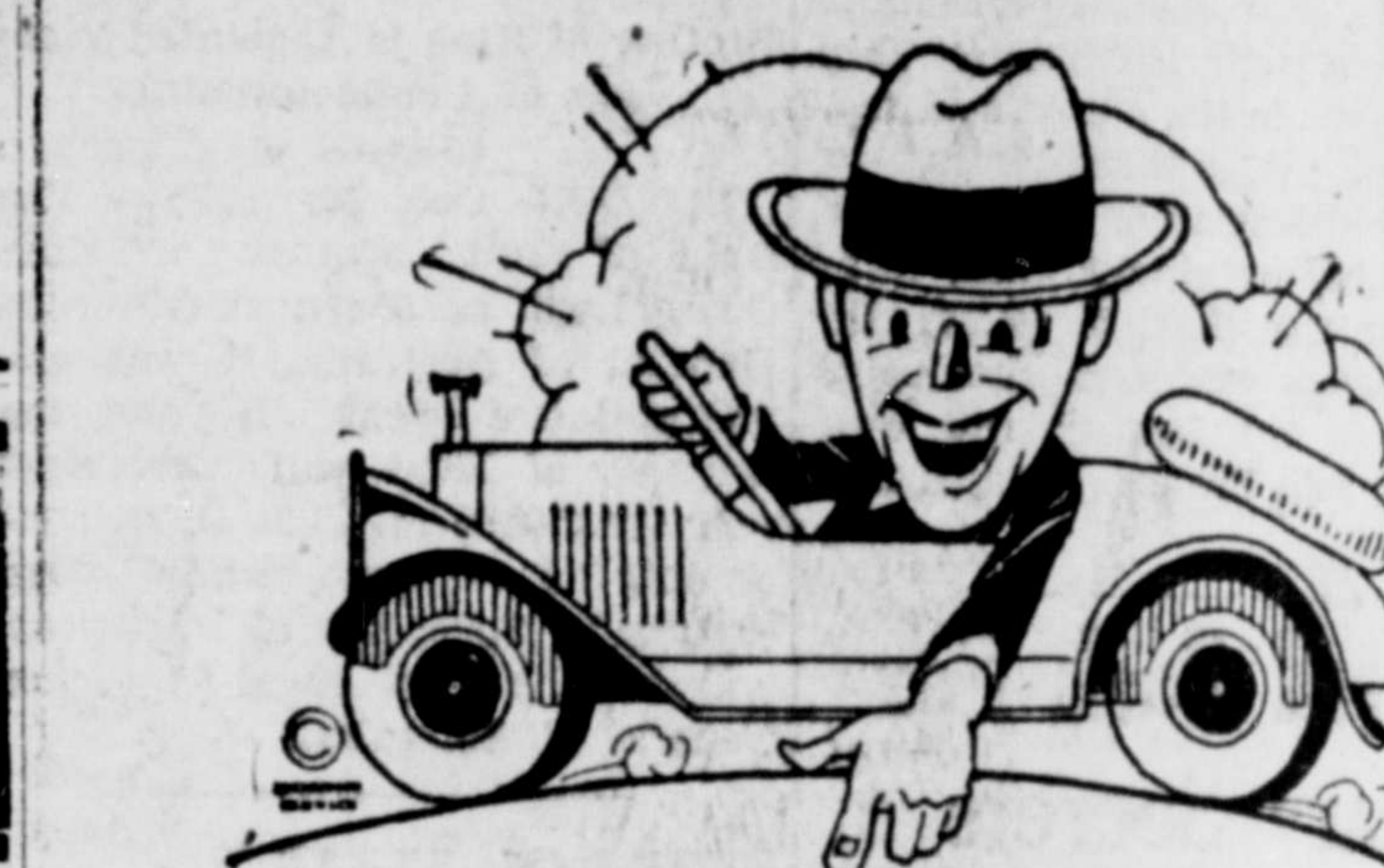

work done by the committee. The total production of fish for the season of 1938 was 2,163,767 pounds, and this was an advance on that of the season of 1937 by approximately half a million pounds.

One of the things that had been done since the last meeting of the association was the opening of a store at Cow Bay. It commenced business on March 15 and has enjoyed a good trade in fishermen's supplies, including groceries, fishing gear, gas, oil, ice, bait, etc. In addition to the city store there were also four camp stores operated throughout the entire season. The total sales, to September 30 for 1938 were \$69,890.90 and for the same period in 1937 \$36,861.93, a gain of \$33,028.97.

The two fish packers, "Azurite" and "Ogden" were operated this season the same as last but there was a substantial reduction in the operating costs over that of 1937. The association also paid off the sum of \$1700 outstanding on the "Ogden" at the end of 1937. Both Packers are now fully owned by the Association. The "Ogden" is now on charter to the Canadian Fish & Cold Storage Co. for a short period.

The following resolution was unanimously adopted:

"Resolved that in view of the fact that British Columbia is the only province in the Dominion of Canada in which there is no Credit Union Act to encourage thrift by providing a safe, convenient and attractive medium for the investment of savings of its members, and to increase the purchasing power of its members by enabling them to borrow for productive or other beneficial purposes at a reasonable cost; and in view of the further fact that in all the provinces of this Dominion where they have been established as well as in the United States and Europe they have proven successful, efficient and in the best interests of the people.

"Therefore this Association urges upon the government of British Columbia to provide such a Credit Union legislation at the present session in Victoria, so that this province may keep abreast of the other provinces of Canada."

There was a resolution passed at

the meeting favoring amalgamation with the North Island Trollers Co-operative Association, and there was a delegation present from the latter organization who advised the meeting that their association also favored amalgamation but that no necessary extraordinary resolution had yet been passed. The boards of both organizations were requested to investigate the possibilities of amalgamation and report to the next meeting.

The meeting deplored the extensive illegal fishing of creeks this season and passed a resolution reiterating their stand on the closure for the fishing of salmon in District No. 2. Should the Department of Fisheries find that they cannot effectively patrol the creeks, individual fishermen would be willing to be deputized to aid as patrolmen.

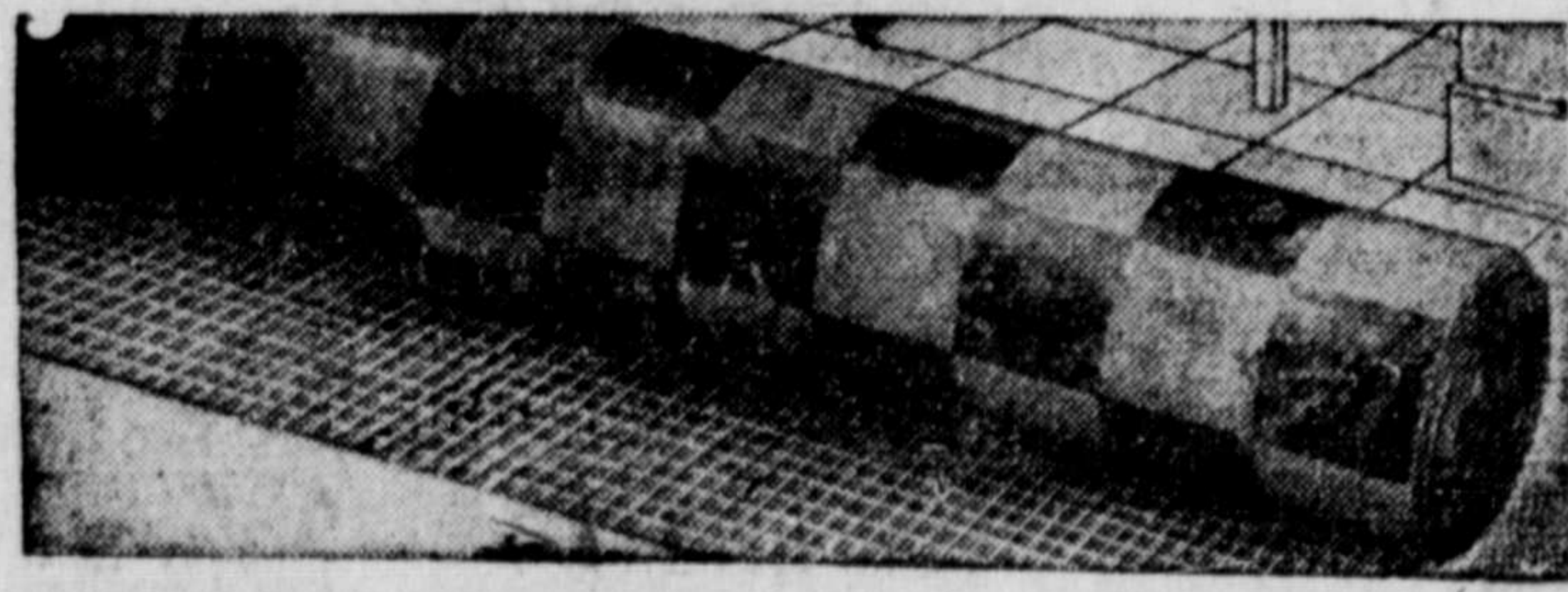
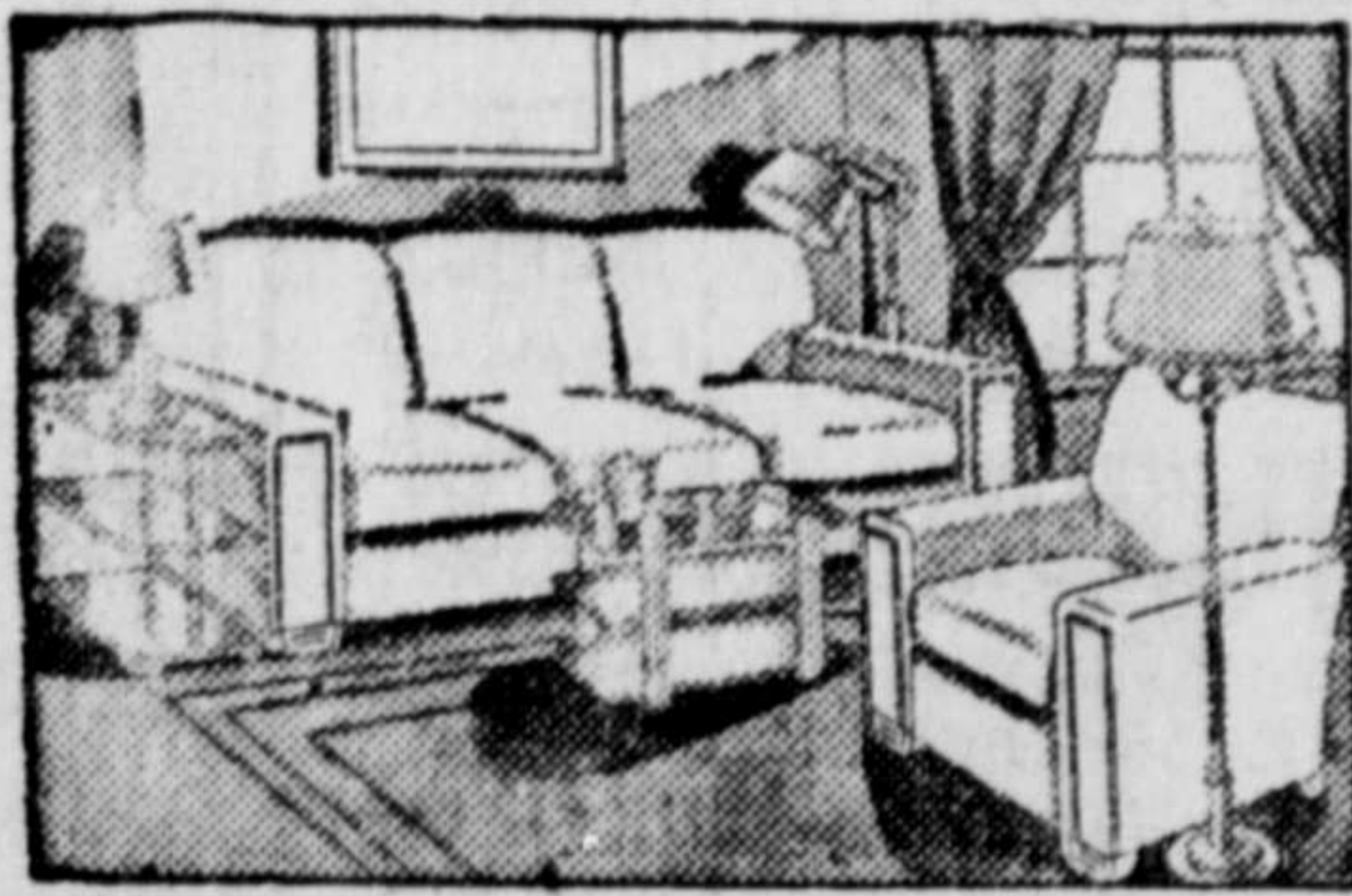
