Overwhelming Vote of Confidence In French Chamber came as Surprise Today

PARIS, April 12: (CP)- The Chamber of Deputies today gave the new Daladier "national defense" government an overwhelming vote of confidence 576 to 5. Both Socialists and Communists, unexpectedly, joined the centre and right to give Daladier a huge majority. It appears that Daladier will now get decree powers failure to get which caused Leon Blum's resignation. Daladier combines the office of minister of defence and Premier in the new government.

First Opinion

PARIS, April 12: (CP)—Barring some unexpected coup, general opinion here was the life of Edouard Daladier's one party Radical Socialist ministry wouldn't be long. With Socialists and Communists, both of which groups are excluded from his cabinet, marking the disappearance of the Popular Front. it seemed near certain that the Chamber of Deputies would reject Daladier's demand for virtual dictatorial powers free of Parliamentary dependence for six months so that he might effectively carry out a fiscal program much the same as that for which Leon Blum was refused authority last week leading to his resignation as Pre-

Communists continued to parade the streets of Paris in thousands demonstrating in protest at the disappearance of the Popular Front and the omission of Socialists and Communists therefrom.

The French metal industry has become practically paralyzed with strikes following the change of governments. At least one hundred thousand factories have closed down, involving an estimated 100,-000 workers. Increased wages is the general demand although the | fall of the Popular Front is conceded to be the actuating motive of the walk-outs.


