Daladier Gets Confidence Vote

FAVORABLE REACTION

Prime Minister Chamberlain's Agreement With Italy May Be Important Peace Move

LONDON, April 12: (CP)—Reliable quarters here indicate, as suggested in dispatches from Rome, that Premier Neville Chamberlain's long-sought agreement with Italy is virtually ready for signing.

Prime Minister Chamberlain is planning to send one of his ministers to call on Premier Mussolini to seal Great Britain's reconciliation with Italy. Informed sources said today, Rt. Hon. Leslie Hore-Belisha, Secretary of War, it was said, would stop in Rome on his return from an inspection trip to Malta and "quite likely will pay a courtesy call on Mussolini."

It is significant that Hore-Belisha was recently reported to have been one of the insurgents against Chamberlain foreign policy.

There appeared to be favorable reaction in Europe yesterday to Great Britain's efforts to bring about League of Nations recognition of Italian Ethiopia as a move towards European peace. France appears to be agreeable to the move and it is pointed out that Belgium has already given such recognition. However, Russia and some of the smaller European nations have still to be heard from.

It is felt in some quarters that the recognition of Italian sovereignty in Ethiopia may bring Italy back into the League from which it withdrew last December. It might also mean a break in the disturbing Rome-Berlin axis.

WAS GREAT VOCALIST

Feodor Chaliapin, Russian Basso, Passes Away in Paris—Was Cobbler's Apprentice

PARIS, April 12: (CP)—Feodor Chaliapin, one time shoe maker's apprentice, whose voice carried him to world-wide operatic fame, died here today at the age of sixty-five.

This remarkable Russian basso was not simply a singer but an artist, not merely a personality but a man. Being such, he had had not a "career," but a life. He was born at Kazan, Russia, in 1873. At seven he was a cobbler's apprentice; he became woodcarver, book-binder, pawnbroker's clerk, novice in a monastery of the Russian Church, and longshoreman on the Volga at 17 cents a day. At 17 he was in comic opera at \$6 a week—machinist, promoter, stage manager, singer, all in one. Not long afterwards he was singing in Moscow at \$6,000 a year. He upset all stage traditions, expanding, not breaking rules.

In Boito's "Mefistofele" he appeared with the upper part of his body nude and covered with luminous paint. Chaliapin not only sang but acted a song. He had one of the most beautiful voices of history.

QUEEN MARY BIDS FOR WAS TOSSED

Giant Liner Arrives at Southampton Following Stormy Passage Across Atlantic

SOUTHAMPTON, Eng., April 12: (CP)—The giant liner Queen Mary arrived here yesterday from New York after having encountered the worst storm she has yet experienced on Atlantic crossings. Forty persons were slightly injured as the great ship was tossed by huge waves which some said went as high as one hundred feet. One of the passengers was Lily Pons, noted opera singer, who, in the height of the storm, kept a promise to sing at a concert aboard ship.

Spain War Tide Turns

Loyalist Resistance in Spain Diminishes Following Week-end Stiffening

HENDAYE, Franco - Spanish Frontier, April 12: (CP)—Fresh advances by insurgents beyond Lerida in the direction of Barcelona and the Mediterranean coast were reported yesterday as government resistance, which had stiffened up somewhat during the week-end, diminished.

NEXT MOVE OF HITLER

This Is Question of Interest Following Taking of Anschluss Plebiscite

BERLIN, April 12: (CP)—With the Anschluss plebiscite confirming the union of Austria and Germany now over, interest centres in what will be the next move of Chancellor Adolf Hitler. Two major issues present themselves—the problem of the 3,500,000 German minority in Czecho-Slovakia and the return to Germany of the Polish corridor and port of Memel. There is still a feeling that Hitler may defer further expansionary moves for the meantime at least until the assimilation of Austria is perfected.

STRIKE OF WORKLESS

Edmonton, Lethbridge and Medicine Hat Relief Workers May Go Out In Sympathy

CALGARY, April 12: (CP)—The Calgary Unemployed Union has been advised that strikes of relief workers are being considered at Edmonton, Lethbridge and Medicine Hat in sympathy with the Calgary strike in demand for more adequate allowances. Mass meetings are to be called in the other cities to consider striking.

For the first time pickets appeared on relief work yesterday. There was no attempt to stop the men who remained at work despite the strike. They were merely reminded that a strike was on.

The provincial government yesterday refused to appoint a conciliation board in the strike which the government holds is outside the jurisdiction of the new Labor Disputes Act.

Stowaways Are Intercepted At Ketchikan Port

KETCHIKAN, April 12:—Stowaways taken off northbound vessels here at the end of the week appeared in United States Commissioner's court yesterday and were given fines of \$250 and twenty-five days' imprisonment, the penalties being suspended providing they return to the United States on the first boat which they are doing.

Pays Visit To Zeballos

Minister of Mines Promises New Mining Camp Co-operation in Providing Roads

ZEBALLOS, Vancouver Island, April 12: (CP)—Visiting this new West Coast of Vancouver Island mining camp at the end of the week, Hon. W. J. Asselstine, minister of mines, gave assurance of his "utmost co-operation in having more adequate mining roads provided for the district. He urged the formation of a Board of Trade here to more expeditiously make representations in support of district needs.

HOW IT LOOKED THEN

When the Vancouver Province recently published a special anniversary number it republished a cartoon by Fitzmaurice showing how bewildering was the news of the day in 1908. Civilization was about to fall, the world faced chaos, war and revolution were in the offing. And yet we are told that the world is continuing about as usual with more possible wars in the offing, with chaos threatened, yet civilization does not differ much from what it was at that time.

QUICK CHANGE OF MIND

Adolph Hitler probably knows that, if a plebiscite had been held in Austria as proposed prior to invasion by Germany, there would have been a very large majority in favor of independence of Austria. It is only the iron hand of the dictator that has made the change in popular opinion. The opinions of Austrians have been forced to change. Also it may be that, since the change has been made, the Austrians feel it might be as well to try out the system. There will be no going back now.

PEOPLE DO NOT APPROVE

It may be safely said today that the people of Britain do not approve the policy of the Chamberlain government in condoning the rape of Abyssinia and Spain and the capture of Austria by the Germans. The only question is whether these matters are sufficient cause for the British people to enter upon another war and whether Britain today is ready to fight. They have to remember that, when they enter upon a war today, they involve France as well as Britain and they must expect to meet more than one European country.

The people of Britain may not approve the Chamberlain policy but they are not very anxious for war either. Yet history has shown that in the past the bold policy has usually kept Britain out of war while weak policies have eventually led to almost suicidal conflicts.

DANGERS OF HIGHWAY

Yesterday this paper recorded the death of six people who were driving on the highway in a neighboring state. The cars collided.

The automobile is not a toy to be played with. It carries in itself the seeds of destruction if not carefully handled. In Prince Rupert we have been particularly free from serious accidents, rather by the Grace of God than through careful driving. Possibly we are protected by the fact that driving is difficult here and that, if a person drives at all, he must be careful.

WINDSORS WELCOME

Former King and His American Bride Brighten Social Life In City of Versailles

Royalty On Move

Former Kings Tossed About—Restoration Sentiment in France

PARIS, April 12: (CP)—Versailles is enjoying its biggest social season in years, largely because of the presence of royalty. This most royal of French cities is delighted to open its doors to the Duke of Windsor and his charming American Duchess.

When Edward of Windsor was Prince of Wales he loved Versailles and spent several short holidays there. In the hustle and bustle of republicanism Versailles has retained something of the ease and grace of another century. All France is flattered and especially the hostesses living in the big Versailles mansions, to think that the Duke has chosen to live among them.

Besides the Frenchman is a practical man and there's no denying that a bit of royalty about boosts rents, produces business rents flats and brings tourists.

The Chateau de la Maye in the Parc de Clagny has been leased and the furniture, linen and silver of Port Belvedere shipped over and installed. Curtains along the smart avenues moved discreetly as the black car with the arms of the House of Windsor passed along. The Duchess arrived in a coat of her favorite blue and, it is said immediately won the hearts of the servants with her warm smile and Parisian "chic." Which reminds us that there's a rumor about that another Wallis color sensation is to be introduced a little later by one of Paris' biggest dressmakers.

After Many Moves

Royalty in Europe is just a little bewildering. The former kings seem to have been taken up and tossed about like a box of chessmen.

In England, for instance, we find the ex-King of Siam, the emperor of Ethiopia and half a dozen aspirants to European thrones. In Holland we find the Kaiser, ex-emperor of Germany; Alfonso spends his time in Italy, Belgium and other countries than his homeland, Spain; Edward of England lives at Versailles while Paris is full of Russians who have more or less valid claims to the Russian throne—if there was one which obliges us to remember that France has its royal family too. The Duke of Guise, descendant of Louis Philippe lives with his family in splendid isolation—Brussels is the present address.

The latest occasion for remembering them was a visit of H. R. H. the Countess of Paris, the Duchess of Guise and the Countess' four small children. The Dukes of Guise and the Count of Paris are exiled by the law of 1836 but as a special favor the government allowed the Countess to bring the four children to Paris for Christmas.

In spite of 70 years of republicanism the French royalists do not give up hope. The Royal Courier which appears regularly is usually to be found at the newspaper vendor's tucked between "Humanite," the communist daily, and "La Republique" quaint French humor.

Pictures appear in it of H. R. H. the Countess of Paris, the Duchess and Prince Henri, Princess Isabelle in attitudes studiously copied from those of the British royal family. Her Royal Highness with the children before the tomb of the Unknown Soldier; Little Prince Henri crying, "When may we come back to our beloved France, Mama?" Prince Henri and Princess Isabelle handing out gifts to the poor children Prince Henri and Princess Isabelle with their mother in their box at the circus waving their hands (Princess Elizabeth manner) to a crowd of undevoted little republicans.

The Royal Courier believes restoration sentiment is growing and says: "Even Paris-Sol published an account of the visit of H. R. H. the Countess and the 'Children of France' in large type."

Yet nothing could be deadlier than the royalist issue in France. People have lived in Paris for years without knowing there is a royal

family, genuine or otherwise, to make pretensions to the throne.

The same thousands of Frenchmen who threw their hats in the air and shouted enthusiastically "Vive le Roi" when Edward VII unveiled the Canadian monument at Vimy in 1936 would hustle the Count of Paris into jail just as quickly as they did an earlier pretender, Louis-Philippe d'Orleans in 1830, if he ventured to set his foot on French soil.

Herriot Like Baldwin

Stanley Baldwin, as renowned for his pipe as for his political career, has his counterpart in France in the robust and genial Edouard Herriot, president of the Chamber of Deputies.

Baldwin said one day to a reporter at the Ottawa Conference in 1932 that his pipe and raising pigs represented his main interests in life—being really just an ordinary country Englishman—and politics were just a sideline.

Herriot has much the same idea. Mayor of Lyon more than 15 years he has devoted his life to puffing his pipe in a fog of smoke figuring out ways of improving his home town which has given him the name "Pere de Lyon." In fact he claims that he does some of his shrewdest pondering half-hidden in a smoky mist. Once when he was prime minister he gave a large reception at Quai d'Orsay where after a lottery, many politicians and journalists devoted to the more effeminate cigarette found themselves in possession of heavy meerschaum pipes which only two-fisted men could manage.

The other day Herriot appeared at a banquet given for the Tobacco Dealers Syndicate. (Tobacco is a nationalized industry in France). He was smoking a steamy, vile-smelling pipe. Exhibiting it to the dealers he said, "It was in this pipe that I tried to find a solution for European peace."

DESCRIBES SHANGHAI

Life Goes On Much The Same As Usual In Spite of War

EDMONTON, April 12: (CP) —Life in war-torn Shanghai was pictured by Mrs. F. R. Gabbott, Shanghai, former resident of Edmonton who visited here.

"Despite the terrible destruction, which is going on in the native cities on its outskirts, life goes on very much the same in the international city of Shanghai," she said.

"Cinemas are running, cabarets are full and, although business is bad and people haven't as much money to spend it is quite amazing how lively things are.

"Curfews ring at 11:30 p.m. if you are found on the street after that hour you spend the night in jail.

NORTH OF HAZELTON

This Is Proper Route For Alaska Highway Contends Pioneer Of North

(Barney Mulvaney)
BURNS LAKE, April 12.—That portion of the central interior from Endako west is now feeling some concern over the possibility of being sidetracked should the proposed Alaska Highway be built north from some point east of Hazelton. This would switch the tourist traffic it is felt, from its legitimate course. As from Endako to Hazelton every little hamlet depends upon Prince Rupert for its market, it is felt there should be co-operation in all matters concerning the building up of the whole interior and this Alaska Highway, it is contended, is one of those matters.

Prince George, with its great waterway system to Finlay Forks is independent. Vanderhoof, with its great hinterland reaching to Manson Creek, has an empire of its own. Hazelton, with a million dollars worth of advertising, backed by a historic environment, known from the Panama Canal to the Arctic Circle, is outstanding and has a right, it is contended, to demand the building of the Alaska Highway following the Kiseox River, one of the most beautiful and prolific regions of the Central Interior, thence crossing the Naas Summit to the east descent of the Skeine to Teleroah Creek. From Teleroah Creek to Teslin Lake is easy going and thence down the Hootalinqua and the Yukon offer no difficult engineering problems. From the mouth of the Hootalinqua to Dawson City bent grades and snowfall offer no impediment.

This route means so much to the people of the Central Interior whose only outlet is the Port of Prince Rupert, that every individual from Endako to the Coast is demanding that Prince Rupert be given a back door connecting with the Alaska Highway at Hazelton.

WHIFFLETS From the Waterfront

A meeting of fishing boat owners—both salmon and halibut—was held Sunday at the offices of the Prince Rupert Fishermen's Co-operative Association to consider the idea of organizing for blanket insurance coverage of boats. It was felt that it was a little too late to do anything this year so further action was deferred until fall.

Union steamer Catala, Capt. James Findlay, returned to port at 9:30 this morning from Stewart, Anyox and other northern points and sailed at 1:30 p.m. for Vancouver and waypoints.

Three halibut vessels sold catches totalling 32,500 pounds at Seattle yesterday. The sales were: Wireless, 15,000, Whiz, 15,000 and 7½c; Superior, 8,500, Booth, 16½c and 7½c; Westford, 9,000, San Juan, 18c and 7½c. All three boats sold mixed cod catches at 8c and 9c. Most of the halibut was second class, taking the lower price, the average being 10-5c per pound.

One halibut boat sold a catch of 9,000 pounds at Vancouver yesterday for 7.6c and 5.6c.
