Five Die In Alberta Mine Blast

Explosion Occurs In Hinton Colliery; Was First For District

Fire Boss Does Heroic Feat of Bringing Out Four Injured Men Although Hurt Himself—Four of Dead Killed Instantly

HINTON, Alberta, March 31: (CP)—Five men are dead and four others are recovering from injuries as a result of the first coal mine explosion this district, 165 miles west of Edmonton, has ever had. The explosions occurred yesterday afternoon. The cause has not been determined. Four of the dead are believed to have been killed instantly while the other died after struggling for two hundred feet toward the entrance.

PERSONAL COMMAND

General Francisco Franco Himself Leading Siege of Lerida, Key to Barcelona

HENDAYE, France, March 31: (CP)—Generalissimo Francisco, commander-in-chief of the Spanish insurgents, yesterday assumed personal command of his armies closing in on Lerida, key city on the road to Barcelona, the loyalist capital, eighty miles to the east.

BIG STORM KILLS TWO

Lowering Temperatures Follow Blizzard and Wind in Southern Alberta—Lawyer Reported Missing

CALGARY, March 31: (CP)—With the temperature dropping, there were prospects last night of an abatement of spring blizzards and high winds, the most severe which southern Alberta has experienced in thirty years. In some places the snow drifted as much as fifteen feet in depth. At least two are dead.

AIRCRAFT SABOTAGE

LONDON—A new outbreak of sabotage in Royal Air Force planes was revealed to the House of Commons yesterday by the government. Wires in new planes had been cut at Southampton and Coventry, it was revealed. There was no reason to attribute the sabotage to a foreign power it was stated.

PENALTIES RELAXED

VICTORIA—The British Columbia government has relaxed penalties under the Highway Act. The provision for a minimum fine of \$10 has been removed and henceforth no minimum is specified. Magistrates will be authorized to impose as small fines as they deem fit. There had been an inclination to dismiss charges of minor offences rather than fine offenders the \$10.

STOCK MART OPPOSED

EDMONTON—Several Social Credit members of the Alberta Legislature yesterday expressed opposition to the application for a charter for establishment of a stock exchange in Edmonton. Liberal and Conservative members favor the granting of the charter. Joseph Unwin, Social Credit member for Edson, declared that stock exchanges were not essential. The establishment of one in Edmonton would afford another opportunity to "fleece and rob the public."

Importance Of Prince Rupert In Coast Defense Emphasized By Naval Officer In Address

Largely a Naval Problem, Declares Commander C. T. Beard of Esquimalt Naval Station—Nothing New in Plans

"There is a great deal being written in the newspapers today about coast defense," said Commander C. T. Beard R.C.N., commanding officer of Esquimalt naval station, in addressing the Prince Rupert Gyro Club at luncheon yesterday on the subject of "Some Aspects of Naval Defense" with particular reference to Prince Rupert.

"As a matter of fact, there is actually such a great deal being done although it is a little more than we did before. The things that are being done have been up for years and years. Our thoughts of defense quarters have not changed. Rather the attitude of the public has changed. Today the public is interested and that has helped in making it possible to do things." Conditions in Canada had changed, declared Commander Beard. The plans were not new. The speaker referred to the importance of Prince Rupert's position on the coast. It was the terminus of one of the transcontinental railways and the port of one of the passes through the mountains to the rest of Canada. Its vulnerability was common knowledge to those who lived here.

Commander Beard discussed the three main branches of defense—the army, the air force and the navy. As far as attack from the air was concerned, there were many limitations. One of the most important of these was the fact that this coast was 4000 miles away from any possible enemy. Airplanes with bombs could frighten and destroy but they could not capture. Aircraft could not operate in fog or in light. Then an airplane had to identify the object of its attack.

TOLL OF TORNADO

Twenty-Seven Persons Dead as Result of Twister Which Swept Central States

CHICAGO, March 31: (CP)—Twenty-seven persons were known dead up to today as a result of the tornado which strafed five mid-western states up from Louisiana through Oklahoma, Arkansas and Missouri into Illinois. Nearly 250 persons were injured, hundreds are homeless and property damage is unofficially estimated at over \$1,000,000.

Only Means of Attack

The only way in which an enemy could come to this coast and do any much was by water in ships. There were certain fundamentals which should be kept in mind. The enemy was not endowed with any supernatural powers. He had many natural obstacles to contend with on this coast and he could not come any time he felt like it.

Commander Beard suggested that listeners try to place themselves in the position of an enemy ship when coming to the coast. What would he do? First, he would establish a base for shelter and secrecy. Then he would attempt to stop shipping. To most effectively do this, he would hover somewhere outside, say off the west coast of Vancouver Island or off the Queen Charlotte's, in a focal point for shipping. He would not likely attempt to bring his ship in through such a place as the Strait of Juan de Fuca where he would be cut off. His object in stopping shipping would more readily be accomplished by laying outside without firing a gun. His mere presence would have a lot of effect. Conversely, the mere knowledge that there were ships in place for the defense of the coast would have a lot of effect in stopping the approach of enemy ships.

REPORT ON AIR LINES PRESENTED

First Year of TransCanada Reviewed By President S. J. Hungerford

MONTREAL, March 31.—With the active development of the operating organization carried forward vigorously during past months, with the training of personnel well advanced, with difficulties inherent in the initial stages surmounted, the Trans-Canada Air Lines has attained momentum and is facing future development with confidence according to the first annual report of the corporation, just presented by S. J. Hungerford, president of board of directors. "There is every reason to expect," he says, "that the objective of a first class air transport service across Canada, forging another link between the Atlantic and the Pacific, will be achieved in 1938."

Alberta Hospital Head Passes Away

James Rogers Of Drumheller Dies From Effects of Concussion Suffered Some Time Ago

DRUMHELLER, Alta., March 31.—James Rogers, secretary of the Drumheller General Hospital and president of the Alberta Hospitals Association, died here Tuesday. He had suffered a concussion in a fall recently and failed to recover from the effects. Mr. Rogers served overseas during the Great War and was once a member of the Alberta provincial police. He was also prominent as a hockey coach here.

Discoverer Of Ensol Ready To Help In Probe

KINGSTON, Ontario, March 31: (CP)—Dr. Henry Connell, discoverer of the cancer treatment known as ensol, which is said to have caused the deaths through tetanus (lockjaw) of seven persons at Orlando, Florida, declared last night that he was ready to proceed to Florida to assist in the investigation. The preparation must have become contaminated after it left his laboratory, Dr. Connell asserted. A seventh woman died today at Orlando as medical witnesses assembled for an investigation of the series of deaths following injections of the "Canadian-made serum."

MUSSOLINI CONFIDENT

Italian War-Making Power Ready To Mobilize On Short Notice

ROME, March 31: (CP)—Premier Benito Mussolini yesterday lauded Italian war-making power, asserting that the nation could "completely mobilize" in a short time a number of units greater than engaged in the Battle of Vittorio Veneto—Italy's World War victory in which fifty-seven divisions fought. Italy's submarine fleet was now the largest in the world, declared Mussolini, its air force was unexcelled and its army numbered 9,000,000 men.

BOURSE TO BE CLOSED

Premier Blum Anticipates Opposition in Parliament to His Fiscal Program

PARIS, March 31: (CP)—Premier Leon Blum plans a temporary closing of the Bourse to prevent excessive speculation if Parliament refuses to make a quick decision on the French financial reconstruction program he plans to introduce on Friday.

ANOTHER BOMBER LOST

HONOLULU — United States Navy officials last night announced that still another big bombing plane was missing following manoeuvres off the Hawaiian Islands. It makes the fifth bombing plane to be lost in Pacific manoeuvres since the first of the year, involving the loss of a number of lives.

JOBS SAVED

OTTAWA—A telegraph poll of union officials from coast to coast last night saved for two months at least the jobs of 1800 Canadian National Railway shop employees in the central and western regions. The men had been scheduled to be laid off April 1. Union representatives of all provinces west of Quebec agreed to put the workers on an eighteen day work month during April and May.

CONCILIATION BOARD

CALGARY—A federal conciliation board was yesterday asked for by union representatives in the wage dispute between coal miners and colliery operators of Alberta and southeastern British Columbia. The companies would reduce wages by ten percent. The miners are seeking a twenty percent increase. The present wage agreement expires March 31.

TO PROBE RAILWAYS

OTTAWA—At the suggestion of Senator Raoul Dandurand and on motion of Senator Frank B. Black of New Brunswick, it was decided yesterday that a committee of twenty senators should investigate the railway problem of Canada. This was the outcome of a discussion on the subject of railway unification which has been in progress in the Senate during the last week or so.

SOCRED CHALLENGED

OTTAWA — Hon. Charles A. Dunning, minister of finance, yesterday invited the Social Credit party to set up its own bank in the province of Alberta as a test of the theories which it has been advancing. He promised his support for the granting of a charter for such a bank if application was made for it. Mr. Dunning was speaking on the want of confidence motion of John Blackmore, Social Credit leader.

REPORT ON AIR LINES

(Continued from Page One)

Ottawa, Toronto, North Bay, Kapuskasing, Wagaming, Winnipeg, Regina and Lethbridge, with an extension from Lethbridge through Calgary to Edmonton and a branch from Vancouver to Seattle. The letter has been in operation since last September.

The matter of other international mail routes is receiving consideration. The international routes involve an agreement between Canada and the United States and conversations have already taken place.

The provision of emergency landing fields, radio beam equipment and certain other facilities is the responsibility of the Dominion Department of Transport.

"There has been and continues to be complete collaboration between the officers of the corporation of department in these matters," the report states.

Satisfactory arrangements have been entered into by the corpora-

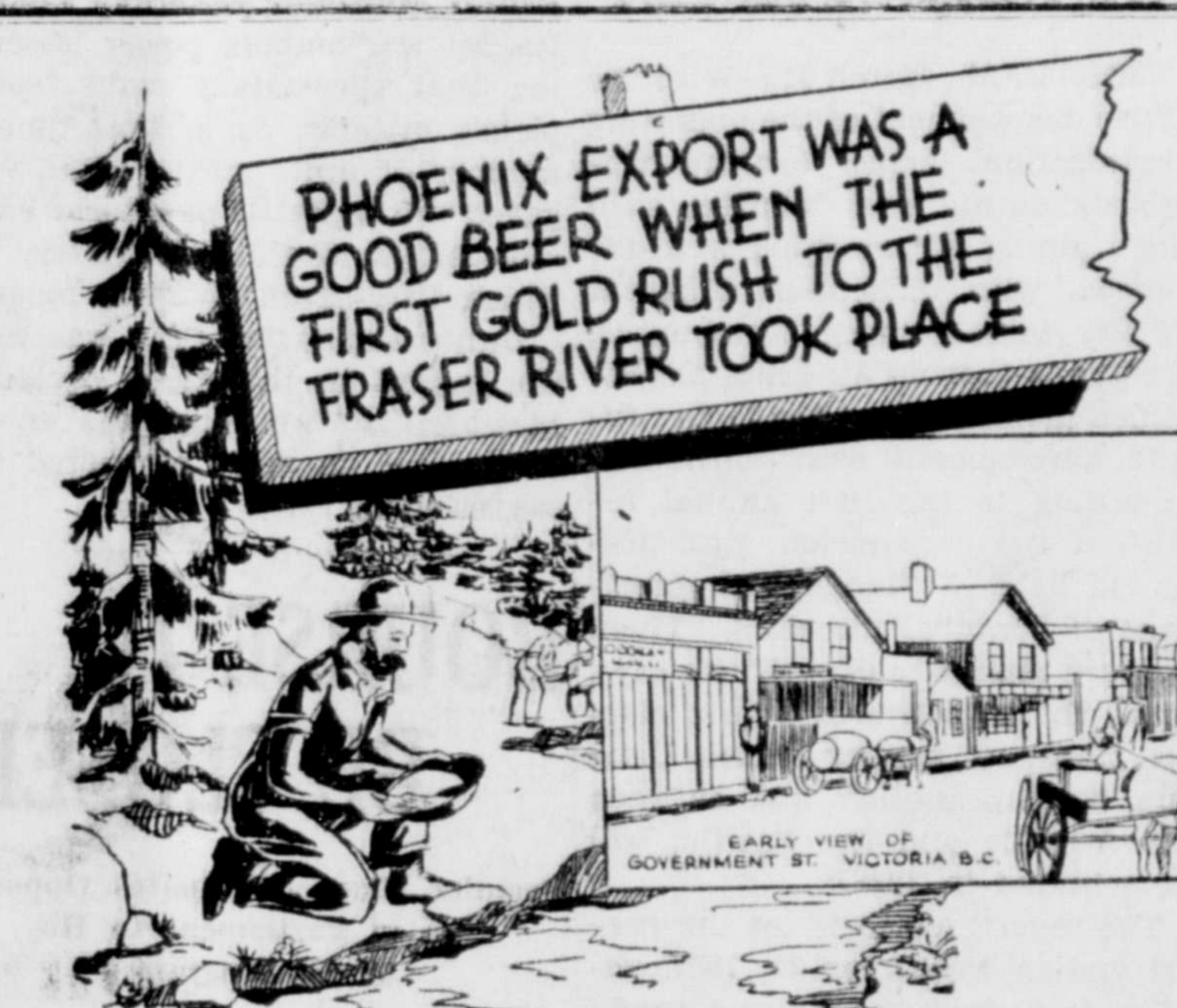
tion for use of the municipal airports and other facilities at Winnipeg, Regina, Lethbridge, Cranbrook and Seattle. Negotiations are in hand looking to a term agreement at Vancouver, where temporary arrangements are in effect. There have been preliminary discussions with the municipal authorities at Calgary and Edmonton and arrangements for the use of airports east of Winnipeg are under consideration. Although it is the policy of the Trans Canada Air Lines to make use wherever possible of the existing facilities available at airports, not all of them have hangar space suitable for large transport planes and the corporation is building its own hangars at Winnipeg and Lethbridge.

Vancouver to Seattle.
The Vancouver-Seattle service was taken over from Canadian Airways Limited in 1937. Equipment included two Lockheed Electra monoplanes. Before the end of the year, three more of these Electras, or 10 A's, were required. They are twin engined planes with passen-

ger accommodation for ten and a crew of two, cargo capacity of eight hundred pounds and a cruising speed, with full load at 10,000 feet above sea level, of 175 miles an hour.

On order are ten larger Lockheeds (model 14 H) with accommodation for eleven and a crew of three, cargo capacity of 2,700 pounds and a cruising speed of two hundred miles an hour. The equipment on hand or ordered will be sufficient for all of the operations now in contemplation.

In referring to the personnel, which numbered 71 at the end of the year, the report says: "a very high standard and considerable background of experience are required of all operating staff engaged. An intensive program of training and instruction is proceeding with respect to all operating positions. The co-ordinated effort of a highly trained personnel is the objective with safety of operations the all important consideration. The quality of the personnel is high and there is already a splendid esprit de corps."
