FAIR HERE

Ample Showers But Also More Sunshine Than Usual Recorded During Month

April this year was showery in Prince Rupert with a total precipitation of 7.5 inches but there was also a goodly amount of sunshine totalling 89.3 hours. The precipitation was somewhat heavier than in April 1937 when 6.1 inches was recorded. The sunshine this April was considerably more than the 52.5 hours in April 1937. So far this year the sunshine in Prince Rupert has totalled 302 hours compared with 247.5 hours in the first four months of 1937. The precipation for the present year to date has aggregated 22.6 inches, showing little difference from the 22.2 inches recorded in the corresponding period of last year.

If the rest of the Chinese people feel the same will be held. they will win. If they weaken, they will lose. They have the disadvantage of being without a navy but they have the advantage of fighting on their own soil in a cause they believe to be just and right. They also have the sympathy of the world.

Now that they have proved that the Japanese are not invincible, that they can be beaten on occasion, the probability seems to be that the Chinese will continue to stiffen their resistance. They are evidently being supplied with arms and ammunition and airplanes so they are not hadly handicaped as might seem.

THE WORLD'S POWER

Statistics gathered by the League of Nations labor! office at Geneva indicate that coal provides sixty per cent of the world's power, oil coming second with sixteen and a half per cent and wood third with nearly thirteen per cent. Water power supplies six and a half per cent; and natural gas between three and four per cent. United States is an oil country and Great Britain and Germany are coal countries. In Russia coal provides over seventy per cent of the energy.

In view of the trend toward the use of coal in a good many countries it is quite possible that the huge anthracite deposits in the Groundhog near here may become very valuable. The late F. G. Dawson shortly before his tragic death had a scheme for bringing the Groundhog coal to Prince Rupert and he had been promised several million dollars to develop the scheme but with his death it fell through. Some man with brains and energy and with a flare for promoting new enterprises may vet bring the scheme to fruition.

THE FLY IN THE OINTMENT

Judging from submissions to the Royal Commission and other information filtering through, it would seem as if the reluctance of the mortgage and loan companies to lend money in Prince Rupert comes from the fear that, when the present commissionership ends, there will be a reversion to the mayor and council system with more! reckless spending of the city's funds. Under that system pressure is brought to bear by sections of the community and, if the pressure is sufficiently strong, the city is forced into incurring liabilities which should have been avoided. Without loans there can be very little building because very few people can finance themselves. The recent proposal to secure money under the federal housing scheme was by far the best proposal ever made in Prince. Rupert. Had there been a ready local response, it is possible that the money might have been forthcoming but, evidently, the local people did not want it.
