


(3) What would happen to the Empire office and the business section between the time the fire broke out and the time the hydraulic fireboat got back to port?







On the hydro-electric proposition he remarked that if the citizens wanted their \$550,000 spent by "schemers," as Alderman Hilditch himself called them, they had better vote for Hilditch.
