Chamberlain's Statement

LONDON, March 21: (CP)-Prime Minister Neville Chamberlain told the House of Commons today that he would make a statement on British foreign policy on Thursday. Presumably the announcement will tell what Great Britain would do if Germany 'nvades Czecho-Slovakia. Intensive preparations for the statement are under way.

Meanwhile the European situation is still relaxed, the atmosphere being much easier after an eventful ten days. There is no indication that Czecho-Slovakia will comply with Chancellor Hitler's demand to renounce the military alliance with Russia. Pending his assimilation of Austria, Hitler does not seem to be in any hurry about Czecho-Slovakia.

### DIES IN OTTAWA

Hon. Martin Burrell Had Full Career-Farmer, Mayor, Cabinet Minister, Author and Librarian

OTTAWA, March 21; (CP)-Hon. Martin Burrell, custodian of the Parliamentary Library, wartime cabinet minister of Sir Robert Bo den and one of the most popular figures in the Canadian Capital city, died yesterday at his home here after an illness of three weeks. He was seventy-nine years of age. Born in England, Mr. Burrell came as a young man to Canada, first settling in Niagara Perinsula to take up fruit farming and later moving to Grand Forks British Columbia, where he began his public career. He first essayed to Parliament in 1904 when he was defeated. In 1910 he was elected however, for Yale-Cariboo and was re-elected in 1911. An authority on literature, he achieved some note as an author in his own right. His kindly personality endeared him to





PRE-EMPTIONS

ACANT, unreserved, surveyed Crown lands may be pre-empted by British subjects over 18 years of age, and by allens on declaring intention to become British subjects, conditional upon residence, occupation and improvement. Full information concerning Pre-emptions is given in Bulletin No. 1. Land Series, "How to Pre-empt Land," copies of which can be obtained free of charge by addressing the Department of Lands, Victoria, B.C.; Bureau of Provincial Information. Victoria, or any Government Agent. Records will be granted covering only land suitable for agricultural purposes within reasonable distance of road, school and marketing facilities and which is not timberland, i.e., carrying ever 5,000 board feet per acre east of the Coast Range and 8 000 feet per acre west of that Range. Applications for pre-emptions are to be addressed to the Land Commissioner of the Land Recording Division in which the land applied for is situated, on printed forms obtained from the Commissioner. Pre-emptions must be occupied for five tears and improvements made to value of \$15 per acre, including clearing and cultivating at least five acres, before a Crown

Fre-emptions carrying part time conditions of occupation are also granted. PURCHASE OR LEASE Applications are received for purchase of vacant and unreserved Crown lands, not being timberland, for agricultural purposes. Minimum price of first-class (arable) land is \$5 per acre, and secondlass (grazing) land, \$2.50 per acre. other information is given in Bulletin No. 10, Land Series, "Purchase and Lease of Crown Lands."
