LEAGUE OF NATIONS

The call has gone out for the holding of the annual meeting of the League of Nations Society in Canada at Ottawa next May. It is also announced that the topic of discussion will be "The Way to Peace, a Comprehensive Peace Program for Canada based on Collective Security and Collective Justice."

In view of the happenings of the past few months and of the general trend throughout the world today, we are beginning to feel that the League of Nations should be dissolved and a new organization formed to take its place when the nations of the world are ready for it.

The League failed when the Japanese seized Manchuria and since that has been singularly ineffective. Step by step its influence has been weakened until today it seems to be of little value. We do not see how it can be revived to such an extent as to make it effective.

ONLY A FEW LEADERS

Very soon a leader is to be chosen for the Conservative Party and it is noticed that very few Conservative newspapers are sufficiently courageous to advocate the choice of any particular man for the position for fear they may have backed the wrong horse and have to switch to some other after the convention.

CANADIENS IN SECOND POSITION

National Hockey League Schedule Completed in Readiness For Play-Offs

NEW YORK, March 21: (CP)—The issue between Montreal Canadiens and New York Americans for second place in the international division standing of the National Hockey League was settled with the playing of final games of the league schedule at the week-end, the Americans winning the right to play the New York Rangers, runners-up in the American division, tomorrow night in the Stanley Cup competition while the Canadiens will be pitted against the Chicago Black Hawks in the third place play-offs leading up to the cup finals.

Saturday night at Toronto the Americans finished up on the short end of an 8 to 5 count in a wide-open free scoring affair with the Toronto Maple Leafs, the conflict being resumed at New York last night with a 4 to 2 victory for the Americans who thus finished in second place by virtue of having won more games although being actually tied with the Canadiens in points.

The Canadiens played a one all overtime tie at Montreal with the New York Rangers Saturday night, it being the final game of the season for the Canadiens.

The Toronto Maple Leafs and Boston Bruins will commence the best three out of five-game series for the league championships in Toronto Thursday night.

Wild Third Period

Saturday night's game at Toronto between the Maple Leafs and the Americans was featured by a wild third period in which no less than nine goals were scored, five in rapid fire succession during the last five minutes of play. Despite the wide open play, penalties were not especially frequent, there being but five in all, three on the Americans and two on the Maple Leafs—one each in first and second periods and three in the third. Two major penalties were imposed by Referee Mickey Ion against Hamilton and Wiseman in the third for fighting.

The opening goal came after six minutes, 33 seconds of play, in the first period when Carr netted the puck for the Americans with assists by Shriner and Chapman. Buzz Boll evened it up for the Leafs after 13 minutes, 22 seconds, while the Americans were a man short with Gallagher serving a penalty. Jackson and Apps getting the assists. Twelve minutes, thirty seconds, after the start of the second period, Thoms, on Boll's assist, put the Maple Leafs into the lead and they were never again headed. In 16 minutes, 47 seconds, Parsons gave the Leafs their third with Chapman getting credit for the assist. The only penalty of the period and the second of the game was given against Anderson of the Americans.

One minute and five seconds after the start of the third period, Beatty, on Hap Day's assist, scored to keep the Americans in the picture. In 11 minutes, 50 seconds, Murph Chamberlain, from Parsons and Metz, gave the Maple Leafs their fourth and, in fourteen minutes, eight seconds, Nels Stewart, from Shriner, scored another for the Amerks, it being the 301st goal of this veterans' career. Almost immediately after the face-off, Davidson, from Apps and Drillon, made another for the Leafs. Then came goals at the rate of one a minute during the last five minutes—Hooley Smith, from Stewart and Anderson, for the Americans; Chamberlain, from Red Horner, for the Maple Leafs; Johnny Sorrell, from Chapman, for New York; Boll, from Thoms, and Harvey Jackson, for Metz, for Toronto. Chapman was penalized in addition to the two majors against Hamilton and Wiseman.

SIR EDWARD BEATTY IS HEARD IN ADDRESS

(Continued from Page One)

Beatty was either "unfamiliar with the facts or deliberately misrepresenting them."

Sir Edward urged discussion of railway unification on "its merits and not on prejudices."

Deachman's Reply

OTTAWA, March 21.—In a discussion of Canadian railway problems last night, R. J. Deachman, M.P. for Huron North, reiterated his opposition to joint operation of the Canadian National and Canadian Pacific systems which would constitute an acceptance of the principle of monopoly. He charged Sir Edward Beatty, president of the Canadian Pacific Railway, with being "strangely vague" in his statements in advocacy of railway unification. Just how, asked Mr. Deachman, did Sir Edward propose to divide the savings? What lines did he intend to take up? What railway shops did he intend to close? The full nature of Sir Edward's proposals, he declared, had never been revealed. Sir Edward had estimated a saving of \$75,000,000 from unification of the rail-

ways. This estimate, it should be remembered, was based on conditions of 1930. Conditions were much changed today. In addition to the railway employees thrown directly out of employment by unification, there would be further employment involved through use of less materials.

"The essence of the matter," asserted Mr. Deachman "is to provide dividends for the Canadian Pacific Railway." He questioned the possibility of benefits for either of the railways or the government. Certainly employment would be reduced.

Mr. Deachman, recalling how the Duff Commission had turned down the Beatty unification proposal, urged instead co-operation of the two systems. If such great economies were possible as Sir Edward said, why could he not even now have them effected by co-operation? "But that is not the way of the monopoly which wanted 'everything or nothing,'" Mr. Deachman expressed the belief that healthy rivalry would be for the benefit of the two companies and the country as a whole. He did not believe it proper for the president of a great company to ask the people to discuss the situation in the dark without possession of the full facts.

 Full information concerning Prefemptions is given in Bulletin No. 1, Land Series, "How to Pre-empt Land" copies of which can be obtained free of charge by addressing the Department of Lands, Victoria, B. C. Bureau of Provincial Information, Victoria, or any Government Agent.
 Records will be granted covering only land suitable for agricultural purposes within reasonable distance of roads, schools and marketing facilities and which is not timberland, i.e. carrying over 500 boards feet per acre east of the Coast Range and 800 feet per acre west of that Range.
 Applications for pre-emption are to be addressed to the Land Commissioner of the Land Recording Division in which the land applied for is situated, on printed forms obtained from the Commissioner.
 Prefemptions must be occupied for five years and improvements made to value of \$15 per acre, including clearing and cultivating, at least five acres, before a Crown Grant can be received.
 Prefemptions carrying part time conditions of occupation are also granted.
PURCHASE OR LEASE
 Applications are received for purchase of vacant and unreserved Crown lands, not being timberland, for agricultural purposes. Minimum price of first-class (arable) land is \$5 per acre, and second-class (grazing) land, \$2.50 per acre. Further information is given in Bulletin No. 16, Land Series, "Purchase and Lease of Crown Lands."
 As a partial relief measure, surveyed lands may be acquired by purchase on ten equal instalments, with the first payment suspended for two years, provided taxes are paid when due and improvements are made during the first two years of not less than 10% of the appraised value.
 Mill, factory or industrial sites on timberland, not exceeding 40 acres, may be purchased or leased, the conditions including payment of stumpage.
 Unreserved areas, not exceeding 20 acres, may be leased as homestead, conditional upon a dwelling being erected in the first year, title being obtained after residence and improvement conditions are fulfilled and land has been surveyed.
 For grazing and industrial purposes areas not exceeding 640 acres may be leased by one person or a company.
 Under the Grazing Act the Province is divided into grazing districts and the range administered under grazing regulations amended from time to time to meet varying conditions. Annual grazing permits are issued based on certain monthly rates per head of stock. Priority in grazing privileges is given to resident stock owners. Stock-owners may form associations for range management. Free or partially free permits are available to campers and travellers, up to ten head.
