Body Blow Dealt At Social Credit By Supreme Court In Rendering Adverse Decisions

OTTAWA, March 4: (CP)—The Supreme Court of Canada appeared to have struck a body blow at Social Credit plans of the Aberhart government of Alberta Loday.

The court not only ruled unconstitutional Alberta bills dealing with credit regulation, regulation of newspapers and bank taxes but Chief Justice Lyman Duff ruled against the Alberta Social Credit Act, cornerstone of the Alberta government's financial structure.

In a series of judgments, the Supreme Court ruled as follows:

First, held as unconstitutional the Act to Amend and Consolidate the Credit of Alberta. Second, held as unconstitutional the Taxation of

Banks Act. Third, held as unconstitutional the Act to ensure

publication of accurate news and information. Fourth, ruled that the Dominion had power to

disallow provincial enactments without restriction. Fifth, ruled that Lieutenant Governors had power to reserve their assent from provincial legislation subject only to instructions from the Governor Gen-

Going outside the terms of the reference to the court, Chief Justice Duff passed opinion on the Alberta Social Credit Act which he found was outside the legal jurisdiction of the province.

The Court was unanimous in all the judgments.

Aberhart Disappointed

EDMONTON, March 4: (CP)—Disappointment over the adverse judgment of the Supreme Court was expressed by Premier William Aberhart today. "Naturally, I am disappointed over the decision," the Premier said "but I would not care to comment until I have had an opportunity to give more consideration to the situation."

The industry that uses more steel than any other on this continent is the automobile and next to it comes the can. In the manufacturing of this staple article more steel is used than in the making of steel rails. The tin can is mostly steel. There is a very small amount of tin used. It fact only two per cent of the material used in manufacture of a can is tin. Prince Rupert is interested in cans because many thousands are used in this neighborhood in the salmon canning industry and more thousands are used by local housewives in providing them with vegetables, milk and other commodities.

INDIAN VILLAGE HERE

In his address to the Rotary Club yesterday Lieut.-Col. J. W. Nicholls mentioned that at Palm Springs, California, a whole Indian village had been imported to the neighborhood and cow boys and horses had also been brought from other states in order to provide atmosphere and entertainment for the guests at the large hotels

From this Prince Rupert might well take a lesson. We already have some fine totem poles. What we need now is to erect an Indian house similar to the large community houses of the natives. This could be made of concrete with a block front and could be used to house the museum collection. It would be one of the best investments the city could make. It would be a place that most tourists would visit and, at the present small charge of ten cents each, the museum could be easily made self-sustaining which it is not at present. The amount needed is so small and the prospective benefits so large that it seems like poor business to let the opportunity pass. The difficulty is to raise the money at a time when very few people seem to have any to spare.


