URGES IMPORTANCE ALASKA HIGHWAY

Member of Audit Bureau of Circulations

Writing in the London Times Sir Evelyn Wrinch urges the importance of the Alaska Highway and then goes on to urge that the British make a low interest loan or a loan without interest to British Columbia in order that the road may be built by British capital. In his reasons why the highway is desirable he says:

(a) Canada would possess a road essential to the defence of its western coast and which will have to be constructed sooner or later.

(b) The building of such a road—which would give a vast amount of employment, would expedite the development of British Columbia, one of the few practically virgin territories in the British Commonwealth.

(c) It would focus attention on the Canadian West, not merely on British Columbia. No one who has recently visited western Canada can have failed to have been impressed by the splendid stoicism of the people of southern Saskatchewan and southern Alberta in face of great hardships. The west badly needs a fillip. I am convinced that the recent succession of lean years is only a passing phase. | NO LABOR (d) It would develop one of the greatest scenic dis-

Work Mostly on 60-40 "Lay"

GLOUCESTER, Mass., Nov. 25 (CP)-Labor troubles have steered clear of the fishing industry in this port. So far there seems to be no existed in the fisheries at Boston and New Bedford, Mass.

The Gloucester fisheries is the oldest industry in Massachusetts, three centuries fishermen here have gone their way with no serious disturbances between employer and employee.

It is popularly supposed the Gloucester co-operative "lay," or distribution of the profits of a fishing is a plan of dividing the profits, or losses, between the employer and the fishermen he hires.

When the first fishermen settlers been at Korea since 1925. arrived at Cape Ann, this question was settled in the following manner: If a man accumulated enough capital to build a boat of say a four or five-man crew, he contributed the craft with its outfit of fishing against the labor of the crew on a 50-50 basis.

Earlier Plan Modified With the advent of the big beam trawlers, the 50-50 plan of sharing proceeds was first adopted, but as time has gone on the plan has been greatly modified so that now there are several complex methods of settlement in vogue.

Here, since the installation of the diesel engines, the bulk of the fleet landing at the home port has pared down to a maximum of about 30 gill netters, shore draggers and trawlers, with a crew of six to 10 and landing their fares. These skippers. Occasionally the crew have an interest in them.

These craft land in fair weather 30,000 to 50,000 pounds of fresh fish each trip. The crews are mostly on a 60-40 "lay." This list of fishing vessels does not include mackerel seiners, swordfishermen and others, landing at other ports on the same co-operative "lay."

Fishermen here seem content to sail along with this system. At least no voice has been heard demanding a change.







ROUTE FOR NORTH ROAD

Blackwater, Road From Quesnel To Vanderhoof is Suggestion

VANDERHOOF, Nov. 25:-As the Alaska Highway is rapidly becoming more certain, the people of the Vanderhoof district are taking a very keen interest in the probable route it will take.

In these days of costly road construction it is assumed that the most direct route will be chosen and, in view of this, the people of Vanderhoof would like to bring to the attention of the public that route very well known to the old timers of the province as the Blackwater Road running from Quesnel to Vanderhoof along which was built the Yukon Telegraph line in 1898. Also in those days practically all the freight for the country now served by the Canadian National Railways was brought in over this route

At the present time the road from Quesnel to Vanderhoof via Prince George is 154 miles. By utilizing the Blackwater Road the distance is only 110 miles which is saving of 44 miles, quite litem when the question of paved From Stewart and Anyoxhighways is being considered.

Aside from looping off 44 miles this road traverses a good section ed with lakes and rivers where hunting and fishing to be found anywhere in the province.

For Ocean Falls-At the present time one can motor from Quesnel north for about thirty miles over a gravelled road, then there is a stretch of From Ocean Fallssome twenty - five miles which needs grading and gravelling to make it passable for cars. This would take one to the Mud River settlement and from there on top Vanderhoof. Cars and trucks have been travelling this route for number of years.


