In a similar case if anything of the kind were proposed for Canada it would not be the King who might be to blame in the matter but his chief adviser who today is Right. Hon. W. L. Mackenzie King. To blame the King because of the Padlock Law in Quebec would be to forget how the country is ruled. It would be just as unreasonable to blame him for allowing a gathering of free thinkers in London.

WORLD WHEAT PROBLEM

Accepting the information conveyed by the Royal Bank economist as correct, the problem this year and next may be to sell wheat rather than to raise it. 

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


