NO MERCY IS SHOWN

Spanish Insurgent Planes Bomb Loyalist Ports Regardless Of Civilian Population And Foreign Interests

Bombed

Germans Said To Be At Back Of Deliberate Attacks On English Property

MADRID, June 8: (CP)-Spanish insurgent planes bombed the British-owned port of Gandia, 36 miles south of Valencia, today, disabling a British dredger, destroying two warehouses and tearing up a railroad. Edwin A. Pfel, British manager of the port, said he believed the planes were German-manned. He said: "It was a deliberate and brazen attack on British property. The sole aim was to destroy the port which British capital established fifty

years ago," BARCELONA, June 8:-Air raiding by the Spanish insurgents of loyalists ports on the Mediterranean continues relentlessly. Hundreds were killed and injured yesterday. 


