Insurgents Launch New Offensive

City Commissioner Alder Is Starting Campaign For House Building In Prince Rupert

If there are enough applicants of the right kind Prince Rupert has a good chance of being able to take advantage of the provisions of the Dominion Housing Act under which loans amounting to eighty per cent of the value of the house and lot are made to prospective builders, according to word brought from the south today by City Commissioner W. J. Alder.

It will require applications from thirty or forty people who are prepared to build to make it worth while for them to send a man to the city to inspect the buildings. This the commissioner thinks can be obtained so he is planning to immediately invite applications and make a big effort to induce the companies to loan in the city.

Mr. Alder says the plan is going over big in Vancouver. The terms of repayment and the rate of interest are so easy that it is cheaper to build a house than to rent.

DIVORCE GROUNDS

Extended in Canada to Include Cruelty, Desertion and Insanity

OTTAWA, March 9: (CP)—A bill was introduced in the Senate yesterday to widen the grounds of divorce in Canada. It was based on recommendations of the senate divorce committee and is patterned after similar legislation enacted last year in Britain under sponsorship of A. P. Herbert. The bill was introduced by Senator McMeans, Conservative, Winnipeg, and given first reading.

Grounds added are cruelty, desertion for three years and insanity for five years. At present there are only two grounds for divorce in Canada.

The new grounds would be applicable to all divorce courts in Canada.

Ottawa Church Body Protests

Resolutions Objecting to Imprisonment of German Protestant Leader Being Sent to Berlin

OTTAWA, March 9: (CP)—The Presbytery of the United Church of Canada here yesterday passed a resolution which will be forwarded to the government of Germany protesting against the imprisonment of Rev. Martin Niemoller, leader of the Protestant opposition to the Nazis, for attacks from the pulpit upon the government. Niemoller has not yet been released although his sentence was supposed to have been up last week.

Legislature Of Manitoba Turns Down Communist

WINNIPEG, March 9: (CP)—The Manitoba Legislature by a vote of 35 to 8 yesterday rejected a motion by a Communist member for Winnipeg which would have asked the Dominion government to disallow the Quebec padlock law.

GOVERNMENT TO RESIGN

PARIS, March 9: (CP)—The French cabinet met hurriedly today and reports are current of its impending resignation.

Demonstration Against Envoy From Germany

LONDON, March 9: (CP)—Traffic around Piccadilly was tied up for a time last night on account of a demonstration against Joachim von Ribbentrop, German foreign minister, who is due in London today to confer with the British government in regard to a friendship pact. Ribbentrop will open conference with the British government tomorrow. Meantime at Rome the Earl of Perth, British ambassador to Italy, yesterday called on Count Ciano, Italian foreign minister, for a preliminary conference preparatory to opening friendly negotiations. The first effort of the negotiations with Germany and Italy, it is explained, will be to clear the air of suspicion and distrust.

MACBRIEN FUNERAL

Ottawa Pays Final Tribute With Many Dignitaries Taking Part In Final Rites

OTTAWA, March 9: (CP)—Public men, diplomats, military leaders and war veterans joined yesterday to honor in death the late Sir James MacBrien, commissioner of the Royal Canadian Mounted Police and former chief of general staff. The procession was the largest since Sir Arthur Currie's funeral five years ago. It was led by a troop of Royal Canadian Mounted Police.

The Governor General, Lord Tweedsmuir, was represented and Prime Minister William Lyon Mackenzie King and Rt. Hon. R. B. Bennett, Leader of the Opposition, attended in person.

The service took place in Christ Church Cathedral. The streets were thronged for miles as the procession passed along to Beechwood Cemetery where interment was made with full military honors.

Thirteen minute guns thundered out a final tribute.

APPEAL TO GOV'T MADE

Vancouver City and Other Municipalities Present Cases at Victoria Yesterday

VICTORIA, March 9: (CP)—Mayor George C. Miller of Vancouver conferred with the provincial government yesterday announcing that an impasse had been reached in connection with the drawing up of Vancouver's civic budget and that special aid would have to be given. Mayor Miller asked for legislation to permit of a revision of the civic financial structure.

A delegation from the Union of British Columbia Municipalities also met the government presenting a brief asking for resumption of aid for unemployment relief.

It was pointed out that an influx of unemployed to the province had increased the burden on the municipalities. It was estimated that 5000 persons had arrived in the Fraser Valley alone from the prairie drought areas during the past three years.

NEW MAYOR IN SEATTLE

Arthur Langlie Defeats Vic Meyers—Woman Heads Aldermanic Poll

SEATTLE, March 9: (CP)—Councilman Arthur D. Langlie was elected mayor of Seattle yesterday with a majority of some 4000 over Victor Meyers, orchestra leader- lieutenant-governor. Mrs. Powell headed the poll for the three seats on the council, John Carroll and Sam J. Hume being the other successful candidates. A number of propositions were rejected, one for a three mill increase in tax levy being turned down by a majority of 37,000. Another defeated measure would have provided for airport development. A total of 130,000 votes was cast, the largest in the history of the city.

Langlie becomes mayor in succession to Mayor John F. Dore who was defeated in the primaries. The mayor-elect is 38 years of age. Meyers had the backing of the Committee on Industrial Organization.

DEVELOP AVIATION

Great Britain to Double Annual Subsidies Now Amounting to \$7,500,000

LONDON, March 9: (CP)—A bill was introduced in Parliament yesterday by the government to increase air subsidies with a view to extending imperial air routes. The present subsidies of \$7,500,000 per year will be doubled and the two major airways concerns of Britain will be reorganized. The legislation follows recommendations of a special committee on commercial aviation.

NORTH CHINA CUTS TARIFF

Imposts on Number of Commodities Are Reduced By Provisional Government

OTTAWA, March 9: (CP)—The Department of Trade and Commerce has been advised of reduced tariff rates being put into effect by the provisional government of North China on a number of commodities including logs, fruit, apples, fish and newsprint.

BULLETINS

BURNED TO DEATH DEEPDALE, Man.—Three persons were burned to death when fire destroyed the home of S. T. Argent, Deepdale postmaster. The victims were the postmaster's wife and two daughters, Frances and Wilma. Flames blocked escape from an upstairs room.

HUNGARY CABINET QUILTS BUDAPEST — The Hungarian cabinet, headed by Premier Kolo-man Darayi, resigned today after seventeen months in office. Admiral Nicholas Horthy, the regent, commissioned Darayi to form a new government. The resignation came after a debate on the rearmament program.

AUSTRIAN PLEBISCITE INNESBRUK, Austria—Chancellor Kurt von Schuschnigg has called a national plebiscite on March 15 to determine the strength behind the fight for Austrian independence. Schuschnigg, by the referendum, would seek to win a mandate for his and the Fatherland Front resistance against German encroachment.

NEW LORD PRESIDENT LONDON—Viscount Hailsham was named Lord President of the Council today, replacing Lord Halifax who succeeded Captain Anthony Eden as Foreign Secretary. Lord Maughan, hitherto Lord of Appeal, succeeds Lord Hailsham as President of the Council.

YORK CITY BEATEN LONDON—York City's gallant fight for English Cup football honors ended today when the Third Division team was defeated in a Sixth Round replay by Huddersfield Town 2 to 1. Huddersfield meets Sunderland, the cupholder, on March 26 in semi-finals. In a Third Round Scottish Cup replay, East Fife, Second Division, scored an upset by defeating Aberdeen 2 to 1 at Pittodrie Park. In another replay, Ayr United, at home, eliminated Morton 4 to 1.

BOMBERS COMING NORTH SEATTLE—Six United States Navy patrol bombers left Sand Point naval station today on a flight to Sitka to replace others which are due to fly south tomorrow. The planes had arrived here a few days ago from San Diego.

OWNERSHIP OF ISLANDS LONDON—Prime Minister Neville Chamberlain told the House of Commons today that Sir Ronald Lindsay, ambassador to Washington, had been instructed to inform the United States government that Great Britain "reserves her right over the islands of Canton Enderbury." Canton Enderbury, in the Phoenix group in mid-Pacific, had been occupied by Hawaiian parties landed by the United States coastguard. Previously they had been treated as British territory.

Extra Train On Tuesday Nights

Effective with the commencement of the eastward halibut movement from Prince Rupert this spring, a train will be run eastward on Tuesday evenings whenever one or more cars of fish offers, it was announced this morning at local Canadian National Offices. As last year, the train will run approximately on the same schedule as the regular east-bound train on other days in the week.

SOCREDITER TELLS HOW

John Blackmore Expounds For Two Hours and a Half in House of Commons

OTTAWA, March 9: (CP)—For two-and-a-half hours yesterday afternoon the House of Commons heard John Blackmore, Social Credit leader, expound the principles of his party. He moved a vote of want of confidence in the government for its failure to use the resources of the country to fight poverty.

Asked by Hon. Charles A. Dunning, minister of finance, what he would do to remove poverty, Mr. Blackmore said he would call on the banks to remove poverty and, if they failed to do so, then a Social Credit government would obtain experts to teach them how.

The productive capacity of the country should be used to supply the people with all their needs and end poverty.

LOANS MADE IN PROVINCE

Number of Outside Points Participate In Dominion Housing Act Privileges

Official figures issued from Ottawa show that the total number of loans issued in British Columbia from the inception of the Dominion Housing Act until the end of January, 1938, was 278, the amount loaned being \$1,105,241. As three of these loans were for apartment houses, the total number of family units provided amounted to 354.

Loans were placed as follows: Abbotsford, 1 loan \$ 2,750 Chilliwack, 4 loans 13,100 Kelowna, 3 loans 9,500 New Westminster, 8 loans 29,450 Penticton, 3 loans 11,300 Greater Vancouver, 241 loans 970,873 Greater Victoria, 17 loans 65,748 Vernon, 1 loan 2,520

The list indicates that loans are being made at various points outside the big cities, the total amount being loaned being \$1,105,241.

MARITIME SURPLUSES

Budgets Balanced Both in New Brunswick and Nova Scotia, Legislatures Hear

FREDERICTON, March 9: (CP)—The minister of finance, presenting his budget in the Legislature, announced receipts highest in the history of New Brunswick and an anticipated surplus of \$17,000.

NOVA SCOTIA TOO HALIFAX, March 9: (CP)—Premier Angus MacDonald, presenting the budget in the Nova Scotia Legislature yesterday, reported his second successive surplus amounting for the current fiscal year to \$62,389.

FIRST ONE DAY TRIP

Pilots George and Imrie Cover Distance Between Vancouver and Winnipeg in Good Time

WINNIPEG, March 9: (CP)—The first complete flight in one day between Vancouver and Winnipeg in the new TransCanada Airways mail service was made successfully yesterday by Pilots Ron George and Don Imrie.

General Drive Along Aragon Front Started By Gen. Franco Today

Rebel Forces Smash Full Force Against Government Lines For Distance of One Hundred Miles North Of Teruel

ROME, March 9: (CP)—General Francisco Franco launched a new general offensive along the Aragon front in eastern Spain at 9 o'clock this morning, Stefani (Italian) News Agency dispatches from Calantocha announced. Insurgent forces smashed in full force against government lines along a one hundred mile front extending northeastward from the city of Teruel.

DENIES HIS CONFESSION

Former Head of Dreaded Soviet Secret Police Testifies From Moscow Prisoner's Box

MOSCOW, March 9: (CP)—Gendrikh Yagoda, once the most dreaded chief of the secret police the Soviet has ever known, stood yesterday in the prisoner's box where he had put so many others and retracted part of his pre-trial confession of treason and murder only to later admit complete guilt. One of twenty-one defendants facing probable death, Yagoda admitted that he had ordered the deaths of Maxim Gorky, the writer, and Valerian Kuibisheff, chief of the first Five Year Plan. He denied, however, that he had ordered the "medical murders" of Gorky's son Zinova Perchhoff and Vyacheslav Menzhinsky, his own predecessor as chief of the secret police. Later he admitted the "medical murderers" and said he had accepted \$100,000 from Leon Trotsky. Previously all these deaths had been considered due to natural causes. Dr. L. G. Levin testified earlier in the trial that Yagoda had bribed him with foreign wines and luxuries to kill Gorky.

Failure Of Big Company

One of Most Spectacular Events in Wall Street History—Reaction of Market

NEW YORK, March 9: (CP)—Soon after announcement of the suspension of Richard Whitney & Co. from the New York Stock Exchange for failure to meet obligations came intimation yesterday of the failure of the company. Due to prominence of the principals, the collapse was one of the most spectacular in the history of Wall Street. An auditor has indicated questionable activities of the company. Richard Whitney, senior partner of the bankrupt brokerage firm which bore his name, today shouldered full responsibility for the conditions which led to the sensational failure of his company. Leading issues slipped moderately in reaction to the Whitney failure but firmed up again later.



### WE ALL KNOW WHAT IS WRONG

We all know there is something wrong with the world today but we do not agree about what it is. There are just a few who do not think there is anything wrong, if people only made the best of what they have. The feeling of a great many people is that, if they had more money, they would be happy. Some people imagine if they were millionaires everything would be lovely but it would not. Many people, if they became millionaires, would spend too much money on themselves and soon die from the effects. It is not reasonable to think a person could live on a million dollars a year without being trained for the job.

We have in mind an Alberta man who inherited a huge English estate. He went to take over his property and found himself thoroughly miserable. He had had no training for the position and did not fit in. He was one of the most lonely of men.

Usually it is found that, if a man is unable to live on thirty dollars a week, he finds it just as difficult to live on fifty. As the income increases so do the desires. The result was that year by year his financial position became more involved. Being able to live within one's means is largely a mental condition.

One man dreams that, if capitalism were abolished, he would be all right but he might find an even worse taskmaster was in charge. In Russia when they abolished the capitalist they had to invent a system to make the people work and the person who fell below the quota found life not very pleasant. Let us suppose that, as in Russia, most of the capitalist class were killed off, we should find that those who were left were the same kind of people imbued with the same ideas of getting as much as possible for as little effort as possible.

For many years women fought for the right to vote. There were martyrs in the cause and yet today women are not happier and no better off for being given the right to vote. It is not so very long ago that some of us thought it might be a better world if we could abolish liquor. We abolished it and found we had a huge crop of bootleggers on our hands.

We all think we know what would be good for us. Some of us are very keen to have the city of Prince Rupert prosper and grow but but we should not be any happier if the population were to increase by five thousand tomorrow. We should not enjoy life much more if we were able to drive our cars through to Terrace, if halibut were fifteen cents a pound or if the salmon run was twice as great. If we can't be happy and enjoy life under present conditions, we would probably never enjoy ourselves after they are changed.

We would not have anyone assume that we are not in favor of advancement or improvement. We believe that general living conditions can be much improved and we look forward to Prince Rupert becoming a prominent seaport, actively engaged in world trade within the lives of the young people now here. We favor anything that makes for growth and improvement but, more important than all, is to make the most of what we have and enjoy the privileges that are ours here and now.

## PENALTY IS METED OUT

Paul Runge Fined \$50 and Suspended for Two Games for Attacking Red Horner

MONTREAL, March 9: (CP)—The most severe penalty issued so far this season in the National Hockey League was dished out yesterday by President Frank Calder in fining Paul Runge of the Montreal Maroons \$50 and suspending him for two games for slashing Red Horner of the Toronto Maple Leafs over the head in Saturday night's game at Toronto. As a result of the attack, Horner had to have five stitches put in. Calder said that, had it not been for his previously good record, he might have dealt a good deal more severely with Runge.

## PACEMAKERS WIN GAMES

Boston Bruins and New York Rangers Both Victorious in National Hockey League Last Night

BOSTON, March 9: (CP)—Boston Bruins put on a great display of power last night to defeat New York Americans by a score of seven to nil. The Americans were completely overwhelmed. At New York, the Rangers defeated the Toronto Maple Leafs four to three in the second scheduled National Hockey League fixture.

## CANADIANS LOSE GAME

Sudbury Wolves Beaten in London For First Defeat in Course of Tour

LONDON, March 9: (CP)—Sudbury Wolves, touring amateur Canadian hockey team, suffered the first defeat of their trip through Europe yesterday when they lost by a score of 4 to 3 to a British team here.

In one blazing afternoon at Ann Arbor, Mich., May 25, 1935, Dusky Jesse Owens won four Big Ten championships with performances that caused his name to be listed six times in the world record books. He ran 100 yards in 9.4, 220 yards in 20.3, the 220-yard low hurdles in 22.6 and broad jump 26 feet, 8 1/4 inches. This was the Ohio negro's peak day but he cleaned up in subsequent title competition.

Over a range of years as well as distance the names of Joe Ray, Hannes Kolehmainen and Alfred Shrubbs loom large in foot-racing. Each held just a bit short of the Nurmi super-touch but they were undisputed kings in their prime. Shrubbs, greatest of English runners who now lives in Toronto, once held all world records from two to 10 miles and was unbeaten from 1903 to 1909 at any distance until he essayed the marathon. Kolehmainen, triple Olympic winner for Finland in 1912, embellished his reputation with a long series of distance records and victories in his adopted country, the United States, before going back to capture the classic marathon at the 1920 Games. Ray failed in three bids for Olympic honors but for a decade the "Kankadee Kid" was king of American milers before bowing to the incomparable Nurmi in 1925.

Glenn Cunningham, who has just established another new record on the records alone, is the most consistent miler of all time. His achievements over a five-year period, indoors and out, have no equal in foot-racing history. The "Iron Horse" has run nearly as many miles under 4:10 as all other competitors combined. He still holds the official marks for the mile, indoors and out, though Sydney Wooderson of England chipped one-ninth second off the outdoor record last summer in a paced mile, being timed in 4:06.6. On at least three notable occasions, including the 1936 Olympic 1500-metre final, it took a world record to beat Cunningham. His conqueror at Berlin, Jack Lovelock, has looked unbeatable at times or when the spirit moved him, but the slender New Zealander's record on the whole cannot compare with the American's.

Three athletes of extraordinary all-round ability might complete the all time top 10. It is regrettable that not even the record books preserve the performances of one of them and, probably the greatest of them all—Jim Thorpe. The Indian turned in his Olympic medals, by request, after the discovery in 1912 that he had played a few ball games for money without either subterfuge or knowledge that this affected his amateur standing in track and field athletics. Thorpe's decathlon records, though finally surpassed by such Olympic winners as Jim Bausch and Glenn Morris, warrant the conviction he needed only the advantages of more modern technique and more concentration to leave indelible marks.

Alvin Kraenzlein of the University of Pennsylvania, like Jesse Owens, was an all-round "specialist." He was not only the best college sprinter, jumper and hurdler of his day but he also won four Olympic events at Paris in 1900. Harold Osborn, only athlete in Olympic history to win the high jump and decathlon in the same meet

Almost everyone knows that the agile branch of the human race addicted especially to track and field sports has consistently been jumping or vaulting higher, tossing sundry implements further, and running faster than ever before. The last decade has witnessed extraordinary attacks upon time and space. Fully three-fourths of the current world records for standard events have been broken since 1930. Yet it does not follow that an athletic "Hall of Fame" should be picked from the latest list of approved record-holders. The top 10 may fairly include the names of Alfred Shrubbs, Glenn Cunningham and Jesse Owens.

The truth, of course, is that improvement in method, coaching, equipment and competitive conditions—rather than betterment of the breed—accounts for the continual cracking of track and field records. Notwithstanding the contrast in their times it is not likely the crop of milers in recent years, including Lovelock, Bonthron, Cunningham, San Romani, Venzke and Wooderson, possesses any more natural speed than the pre-war group comprising John Paul Jones, Norman Taber, Mel Sheppard, Abel Kiviati, Jole Ray and A. N. S. Jackson. Nurmi could have probably shown his heels to either group and was in a class by himself—the one runner capable of the "Four-Minute Mile."

Nurmi gave foot-racing its greatest all-time stimulus. Seven of the world marks he set in a dozen standard events remain on the book. He set records from the mile, in 1923, to the marathon, in 1932. He revolutionized theories of pacing as well as training, triumphed in three Olympiads (including four victories in 1924) and exemplified a high degree of amateur spirit, notwithstanding his disbarment on the eye of the 1932 Olympics.

Many old-timers insist long-legged Lawrence (Lon) Meyers never had a foot-racing equal for versatility. From 1878 to 1886 he won 14 national championships at distances

## Synopsis of Land Act

VACANT, unreserved, surveyed Crown lands may be pre-empted by British subjects over 18 years of age, and by aliens on declaring intention to become British subjects, conditional upon real residence, occupation and improvement.

Full information concerning pre-emption is given in Bulletin No. 1, Land Series, "How to Pre-empt Land," copies of which can be obtained free of charge by addressing the Department of Lands, Victoria, B.C.; Bureau of Provincial Information, Victoria, or any Government Agent.

Records will be granted covering only land suitable for agricultural purposes within reasonable distance of road, school and marketing facilities and which is not timberland, carrying over 5,000 bears/acre east of the Coast Range and 2,000 feet per acre west of that range.

Applications for pre-emption are to be addressed to the Land Commissioner of the Land Recording Division in which the land applied for is situated, on printed forms obtained from the Commissioner.

Pre-emption must be made for five years and improvements made to value of \$10 per acre, including clearing and cultivation at least five acres, before a Crown Grant can be received.

Pre-emption carrying part time conditions of occupation are also granted.

### PURCHASE OR LEASE

Applications are received for purchase of vacant and unreserved Crown lands, not being timberland, for agricultural purposes. Minimum price of first-class (variable) land is \$5 per acre, and second-class (grazing) land, \$2.50 per acre. Further information is given in Bulletin No. 10, Land Series, "Purchase and Lease of Crown Lands."

As a partial relief measure, reverted lands may be acquired by purchase in ten equal instalments, with the first payment suspended for two years, provided taxes are paid when due and improvements are made during the first two years of not less than 10% of the appraised value.

Small factory or industrial sites on timber land, not exceeding 40 acres, may be purchased or leased, the conditions including payment of stamp duty.

Unsurveyed areas, not exceeding 30 acres, may be leased as homestead, conditional upon a dwelling being erected in the first year, title being obtained after residence and improvement conditions are fulfilled and land has been surveyed.

For grazing and industrial purposes areas not exceeding 60 acres may be leased by one person or a company.

Under the Grazing Act the Province is divided into grazing districts and the range administered under grazing regulations amended from time to time to meet varying conditions. Annual grazing permits are issued based on certain monthly rates per head of stock. Priority in grazing privileges is given to resident stock owners. Stock-owners may form associations for range management. Free or partially free grazing, up to ten head, may be obtained, up to ten head.

Mulford. They proceeded from here early this afternoon to Ketchikan by a plane piloted by Bob Ellis which arrived at 1 p.m. to pick them up. They expect to be back here in a few days and will visit the Portland Canal district.

**ROAST BEEF**

Place roast in hot oven of 450 degrees F. and sear 15-20 minutes. Reduce heat to 375 degrees F. and continue roasting, allowing 15-18 minutes to the pound, according to how well done the roast is desired. If a roast thermometer is used—and this is very advisable—it should read 130 degrees F. for a rare roast; 155 degrees for a medium roast, and 175 degrees F. for a well-done roast. Serve with horse radish sauce or Indian chutney.

## WHIFFLETS From the Waterfront

Pacific halibut fishery regulations for the 1938 season have just been issued by the International Fisheries Commission. The catch of halibut to be taken from Area No. 2 this year is limited to 25,700,000 pounds and from Area No. 3, 25,300,000 pounds, making an increase of two million pounds in total. The close season, as already known, ends at midnight March 31.

The regulations to a large extent are similar to those of last year, additions including the banning of dory fishing in Area No. 2 and the prohibition of use of set nets for halibut.

Armour Salvage Co. started work this morning on an addition to the Home Oil Distributors wharf on the local waterfront. The approach is being widened out for a distance of about seventy feet inside the "L." It is a pile driving and decking job and will take about ten days to carry out.

Three Canadian National steamers arrived in port during the morning. At 2:30 a.m. the Prince John, Capt. James Watt, arrived from Vancouver via Murchison Island, Queen Charlotte Islands, having brought north to the T. A. Kelley Logging Co. a party of loggers for the company's camp which is reopening there. The Prince Charles, Capt. Neil McLean, arrived at 7:50 on the regular run from Vancouver via the Queen Charlotte Islands and will be tied up for overhaul at the local dry dock. The Prince Rupert, Capt. H. E. Neidden arrived on time at 10:30 from Vancouver, Powell River and will sail at 4 o'clock this afternoon for Anyox and Stewart whence she will return here tomorrow evening southbound.

## Possibility Of Bigger And Better Anyox Than Ever Is Seen By Northern Argonaut

Is Anyox, smelter town of the Observatory Inlet district, coming back "bigger and better" than ever? For a considerable time unofficial reports have told of a substantial crew of men, under the direction of Consolidated Mining & Smelting Company geologists and mining engineers, prospecting and diamond drilling over the area which produced the great Hidden Creek copper deposit. Recent stories have been to the effect that considerable encouragement was being obtained by the company and that re-opening of the milling and smelting operation was a possibility.

In recent weeks heavy shipments of mining supplies have gone to Anyox, indicating that more than a diamond drilling program was to be pursued. The start of excavation mining would indicate that Consolidated had disclosed enough in drilling to warrant sinking and drifting.

Should Anyox come back to its one-time prominence in the mining industry of British Columbia, a great "lift" would be given the mining industry of British Columbia, particularly since Consolidated holds some large low grade ore deposits in northern B.C.

Thus the work of the Consolidated Mining & Smelting Company largest mining organization in Canada and the most aggressive force in "cracking open" Canada's northland, will be watched with no little interest.

Although the company customarily talks rather of accomplished facts than of what it hopes or expects to do, visitors say that a fine new body of ore has been at least partially proven, lying between the old Hidden Creek mine and the townsite, with part of it running under the townsite. The average grade of copper thus far indicated is better than seven per cent.

Mining circles in Vancouver, which have accepted as a likelihood that "there was something doing" at Anyox in view of the continuous employment of about 100 men there during the past winter, are inclined to await more definite news from the north or from Trail before presuming that Consolidated has done more to carry on the logical effort which would be made by any such

organization finding itself in possession of a complete mining layout, a worked-out mine and some geologically favorable ground.

### Mining Practice

It is common practice in mining today to look in the vicinity of large ore occurrences for additional ore bodies which have not come to the surface. This is the program upon which Consolidated Mining & Smelting Company, after picking up the Anyox property from Grandencourge, is proceeding.

Should Consolidated prove the existence of previously unknown ore warranting the rehabilitation of the smelter and the rebuilding of the concentrating mill, partly dismantled to furnish material for the Big Missouri mill near Stewart, history would repeat, perhaps on a larger scale, just such an incident as has marked the successful revival of the old Nickel Plate mine at Hedley.

For years Consolidated Mining & Smelting Company has considered the possibilities of establishing a smelter on the British Columbia coast treating copper ore as its base material and doing a custom and private business for independent and Consolidated mines.

The Coast Copper and Sunloch properties on Vancouver Island, the company has repeatedly pointed out, are awaiting favorable circumstances to operate, and these circumstances, it has been generally presumed, would be the establishing of a smelter by the company somewhere on the B. C. coast.

When Consolidated bought the Anyox smelting plant, it was agreed that the company was merely taking a step toward the fulfilment of its long-term plans for an operating smelter on the coast.

If ore is found at the very site of the smelter, another brilliant triumph would be added to the outstanding accomplishment of Consolidated in giving Canada the huge industry at Kimberly and Trail, B.C. Consolidated would then be in the market with copper as well as lead and zinc to sell.—Northern Argonaut.
