Ten Thousand In Bad Way After Being Dumped by Germany Across Polish Frontier

WARSAW, Oct. 31: (CP)-Evicted from the land of their adoption and unwanted in their homeland the language of which they cannot even speak, ten thousand VANDERHOOF -- Fire de tro ed Polish Jews, rounded up suddenly in Germany at the end of the week, have been dumped in Poland just across the German frontier German trains took them that far and left them there to shift for themselves as best they might. In many cases they are penniless with no provision for food or shelter. Residents of the Polish frontier are housing some temporarily.

Last night it was stated that Germany had agreed to suspend further deportation of Polish Jews pending negotiations between the two countries. Meantime, there was talk of retaliatory action by Poland against Germans residing in Poland.




