### amatum Given By Sudeten Germans To Czechoslovakian Government Expiring Tonight

PRAGUE, September 13..— The Sudeten German party presented an ultimatum to the Czechoslovakian government demanding that martial law and extraordinary police measures imposed on the Sudeten communities be revoked by 1:30 a.m. tomorrow or 4:30 p.m. Pacific Standard time today.

The party in the memorandum stated that if martial law was continued it could not be "responsible for developments."

The entire Runciman mission staff moved into the British Legation today, abandoning their headquarters at the Hotel Alcorn and taking their baggage with them.

Six thousand Sudetens cowed the Czechoslovak border guards and tore down the frontier barriers at Varnsdorf in the extreme northern section of Czechoslovakia. Five hundred of their number then crossed into Germany where the barriers were already down in anticipation of their entry.
