British Government Orders Large Bombers From Canada: To Be Ready To Make More

LONDON, November 16: (CP)-Sir Kingsley Wood, Secretary for Air, announced in the House of Commons today that an agreement had been signed between the government and Canadian aircraft manufacturers for an initial order from the United Kingdom for larger bombers.

The air minister said that Canadian aircraft firms concerned had undertaken during the next ten years to maintain manufacturing capacity available for further potential orders of similar character if required.

An aircraft associate company will control the whole scheme and will provide two central establishments at Montreal and Toronto. These will develop manufacturing facilities at the same time as serving as a central erecting establishment fed by six associated companies- Fleet Aircraft, Canadian Car and Eoundry, Canadian Vickers, Fairchild Aircraft, National Steel Car and Ottawa Car Manufacturing.

Negotiations are also progressing with Vancouver and Fort William firms.
