## Der Fuehrer Hears From London

### NEW BOARD IS DELAYED

Transport Commission deferred from October 1  
OTTAWA, Aug. 31: (CP)—Canada's new Transport Commission, which is to take over the Board of Railway Commissioners and having supervision over inland water and air transport as well as railways, will go into operation on October 1, it has been expected. Hon. Clarence D. Howe, minister of transport, announced yesterday. Circumstances have arisen which delay necessary.

### Canagan Getting Peach Crop

Hundred Thousand Crates To Be Shipped From Valley By End of Month  
PRINCE RUPERT, Aug. 31: (CP)—The Canagan Valley is now harvesting of the largest peach crops on the coast. Already some 200,000 crates have been shipped to market and at the end of the month it is expected some 400,000 crates will have been shipped.

### AFRICAN DEFENSE

Parliament Declares Inadequate  
PARLIAMENT, Aug. 31: (CP)—A motion of censure against the government of South Africa's defense was passed by the House of Assembly. The motion, introduced by Mr. J. H. van der Merwe, criticized the government's defense plans during the past few years and expressed the opinion that anything of value would be achieved even if those plans did not come into effect. Apart from the guns in Table Bay, said van der Merwe, the entire coast from Walbaai to Durban could be shelled by a comparatively small raiding force. The Union's friends lost control of the sea, the harbors and the air, he said. The South African government would in that event be unable to assist in land operations but also to play a part in the coastal defenses, for which the present strength was inadequate. The only protection was the Royal Air Force.

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### Sailing Ship On Long Trip

Valkerie Leaves Victoria For Voyage Which Will Last Two Years  
VICTORIA, Aug. 31: (CP)—The sailing schooner Valkerie, with Capt. and Mrs. Hanna and two Tahitians on board, has left Victoria for a two years' cruise.

**POST OFFICE COLOR**  
In response to local protests at the present hue, Olof Hanson, M.P. for Skeena, has wired the chief architect for the federal government at Ottawa recommending that, if possible, the new Post Office building be painted white as originally planned. It would cost \$400 to repaint the building, it is estimated.

**SPECTACULAR ACCIDENT**  
GOLD BEACH, Oregon—A spectacular motor accident killed Mrs. Godfrey Moxham of New Westminster yesterday, seriously injuring her husband who is now in hospital. Police said that, on rounding a sharp curve, their automobile left the road, plunging 150 feet down a steep decline.

**DROWNING IS FEARED**  
VANCOUVER—Police are starting investigation into the possibility of an unknown British Columbia fisherman being drowned. Distress signals flying from a deserted and water-filled dory led to belief of a drowning accident. The derelict was found by the tug Polar Force of Nanaimo.

**SPANISH GOVERNMENT STRIKES**  
HENDAYE—Government dispatches today said loyalist troops were striking at mountain positions linking the insurgent base of Castuera and the rebel advance positions before Cabeza del Buey on the southwestern front.

**SPEED UP WAR PLANES**  
WASHINGTON—Great Britain and France, facing the European crisis, are making every effort to hasten delivery of war plane reinforcements ordered in the United States, informed persons indicated. The craft are not expected to be ready for shipment for the next four or five months.

**DR. BRYDONE-JACK DIES**  
VANCOUVER—Dr. W. D. Brydone-Jack, former Vancouver coroner and doctor here since 1889, died last night after a month's illness. He was seventy-eight years of age and last year won the Native Sons of British Columbia good citizenship medal.

**COMPLETING AGREEMENT**  
WASHINGTON—United States officials said today that the Anglo-American trade agreement was nearing completion, the formal signing being considered only a matter of weeks removed. There is possibility of a Canadian-United States agreement being signed at the same time, general clauses having been already agreed upon. It is said some concessions will be made by and given Great Britain.

### TRAINING CRUISES

Police Chiefs Hear Novel Suggestion for Treatment of Problem Children  
TORONTO, August 31: (CP)—A novel new method for the treatment of problem children was proposed at the International Police Chiefs' Congress here yesterday. It was suggested that old battleships might be used to take 1000 boys for six month cruises on which they would be trained in trades and professions.  
It was also proposed that training for police work should be along professional lines like medicine and the law.

### Young Kispiox Farmer Missing

Otto Adler Left His Home A Week Ago Today And Has Not Been Seen Since  
Otto Adler, well known young rancher of the Kispiox Valley near Hazelton, has been missing from his home since Wednesday of last week and search parties are now out looking for him, having reported no success up to last night. Adler, a young man and about thirty years of age, simply left his home as far as can be learned, and failed to return. He has a brother named Lee Adler.

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### HENDERSON TO BERLIN

British Ambassador Returns To Germany With Message For Hitler  
LONDON, Aug. 31: (CP)—Carrying the representations of the British government in regard to Czechoslovakia to Chancellor Adolf Hitler, Sir Neville Henderson, British ambassador to Germany, left today on his return to Berlin after having come home to confer with the cabinet. The exact nature of these representations has not been made public but the general understanding is that a final appeal is being made to Hitler to assist in bringing about a peaceful settlement of differences between the Czechoslovak government and the Sudetan minority without active outside pressure.

COLLEYMOUNT, Aug. 31:—Donald Smith, forest ranger of Southbank, is having many troubles as the fire risk has been at its peak during the past two weeks. Many small blazes have been nipped before any serious damage to either timber or other property had been done.

By 10 p.m. they had the fire under control and resumed the battle at 3 a.m. on Thursday working until there was not a single wisp of smoke visible.

But Don Smith's smoke clouds had a silver lining for on Saturday night at midnight Mrs. Smith presented him with a charming baby daughter born at Burns Lake Hospital where both mother and baby are doing nicely. Could the child have postponed its entry into a troubled world for another 24 hours it would have been born on the wedding anniversary of its popular parents.

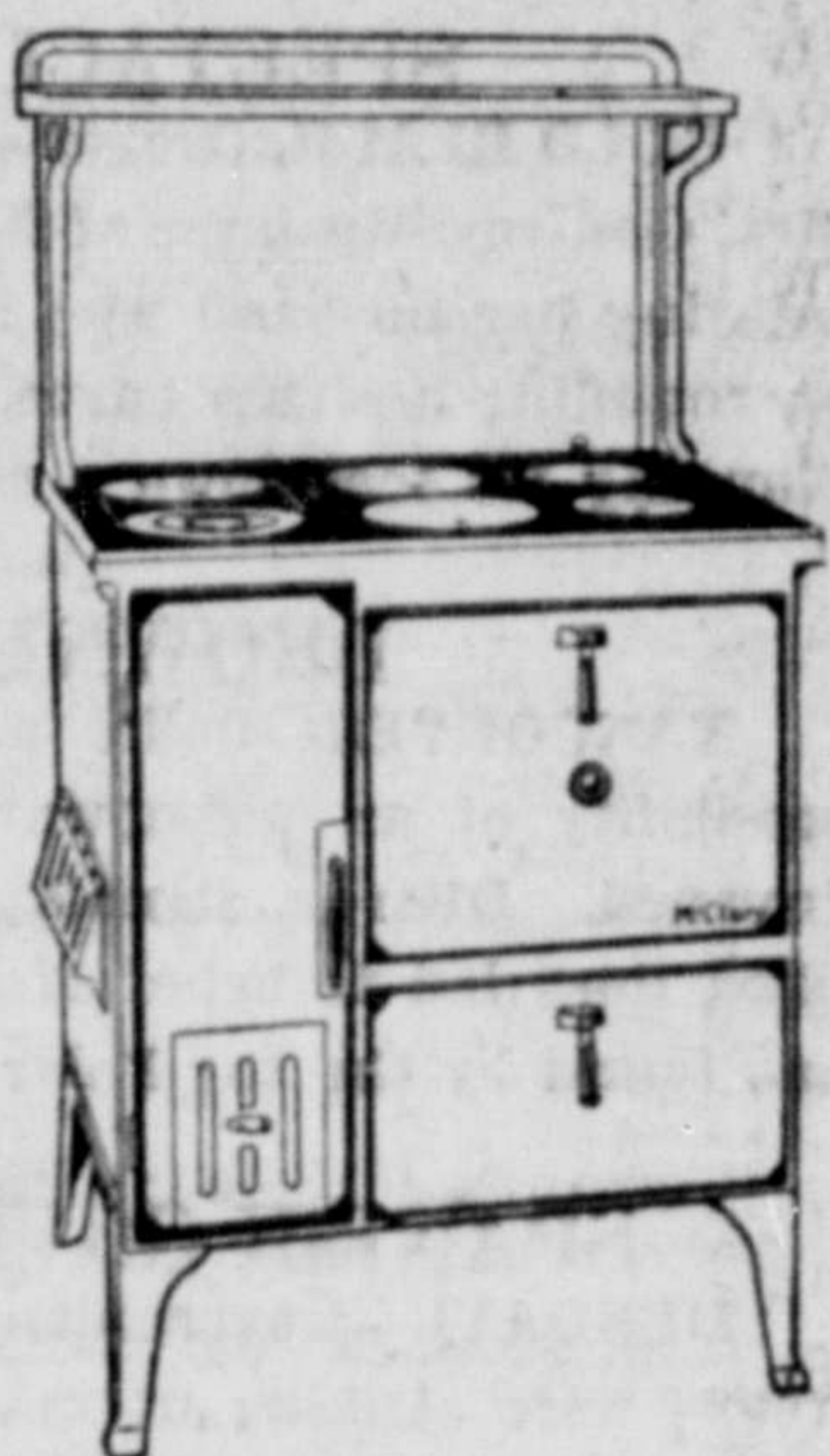

**MANY ARE ON RELIEF**

CHICAGO, Aug. 31: (CP)—Twelve thousand five hundred woman-one-person families on relief here in November, 1936, presented a picture far from satisfactory. The Chicago Relief Administration was eager for more information regarding these women than appeared on its records so it enlisted the help of the Women's Bureau.

The relief administration had hoped to develop a program of treatment benefitting the women themselves as well as making more effective the administering of relief. A representative group, 604 women, comprising about five percent of the total and selected almost at random in 14 relief districts, were interviewed in their homes.

Three-fourths of the women were at least 40 years old. Four-fifths were native-born, about equally divided between white and negro. Two-fifths were widowed nearly two-fifths separated or divorced and about one-fifth single. More than two-fifths of the foreign-born were not citizens.

Almost one in seven of the women were reported as having a mental illness. More than three-tenths had some disease of the body as a whole, syphilis being most frequently reported and disability due to menopause being the next largest group. Disease of the musculoskeletal system, mostly arthritis or rheumatism, were reported for not far from three-tenths; and illnesses of the cardiovascular system affected the same number, most of this group having heart trouble.

For the 521 women in employment, the usual occupation of the majority, 60 percent, had been in domestic and personal service. About two-thirds of these women had worked in private families and the remainder in hotels, restaurants, or kindred establishments.

Difficulty in stretching over the required time the food allowance of \$9.25 a month for single woman was mentioned by nearly every one interviewed. The retail sales tax was a heavy burden on those with low incomes, for they bought in small quantities and the

percentage tax amounted to a considerable figure. Several women seemed able to have only one meal a day; others reported two as the maximum, and the majority were "hungry all the time."

Five percent of the women lived alone. About 14 percent lived in a family group not related to them. Usually they had separate rooms for sleeping purposes but had the privilege of sitting in the family living room, cooking in the family kitchen and participating in the family life. Sometimes they were accustomed to eat with the family, to share the housework and to assist with care of the children. In other households they ate separately, cooking at times when the kitchen was not otherwise in use and felt less free to use the living rooms of the household.

**WHIFFLETS From The Waterfront**

Inaugurating the Canadian National Steamship's fall and winter schedule of coast steamship service, the steamer Prince George, Capt. Edward Mabbs, arrived in port at 11:15 this morning from Vancouver, Powell River and Ocean Falls and will sail at 4 o'clock this afternoon for Anyox and Stewart whence she is due back here at 8 o'clock tomorrow evening, sailing at 11:15 for Vancouver via Ocean Falls and Powell River.

Two western vessels and two local boats sold halibut totalling 83,000 pounds at Seattle yesterday. The western vessels were the Kodiak and Pacific, each with 40,000 pounds, which sold at 10 1/2c and 9 1/2c, the former to Whiz Fish Products Co. and the latter to the Washington Fish & Oyster Co. The Chancellor sold 1,000 pounds of halibut at 10 1/2c, 23,000 pounds of sablefish at 4c and 2300 pounds of cod at 4c to San Juan Fishing & Packing Co. and the Forward 2,000 pounds of halibut at 11 1/2c, 18,000 pounds of sablefish at 4c and 4,000 pounds of cod at 4c to New England Fish Co.

There will be no sale of halibut on either the Seattle or Prince Rupert Fish Exchanges on Labor Day next Monday.

Recently the American fishing boat Norman picked up a quantity of peculiar looking substance which it was thought might have been ambergris, a rare secretion of the sperm whale which on occasion has yielded fortunes to those lucky enough to find it. However, it has been found that the material found by the Norman was not ambergris but rather some sort of nondescript mixture of lard and refuse of no value which it is supposed was probably thrown overboard from some passing steamer.

Armour Salvage Co.'s steam tug Fearless is busy these days hauling in gravel from Porcher Island for use in connection with the construction of the new Prince Rupert General Hospital building.
