# Encouraging Recovery Program Plan

## TELLS OF ENGLISH SCHOOLS

Miss Normanton, Exchange Teacher, Gives Interesting Address At Parent-Teacher Gathering

The regular monthly meeting of the Prince Rupert Parent-Teachers' Association was held last evening in the Booth Memorial School with Mrs. R. M. Winslow presiding.

Letters were read from City Commissioner W. J. Alder and the principals of the schools expressing appreciation of the work being done by the association in the interests of the schools of the city.

Tentative arrangements were made for the annual tea which this year will be held in conjunction with the display of the home economics and manual arts departments.

Miss Normanton, principal of Brighouse School, Yorkshire, and at present exchange teacher in Prince Rupert, in the course of an address, gave very interesting information regarding the present system of public education in England. Beginning school at the age of five, the child enters the infant school, a school peculiar to the English system.

The classroom, provided with light tables and chairs instead of fixed desks, is arranged to allow the maximum of the activities. Character training, the development of wholesome personal habits and harmonious physical development are emphasized with the object of securing the social development of the child.

A recent development in English public education has been the establishment of Junior and Senior Schools, the former for pupils from eight to eleven and the latter from eleven to fourteen.

At the end of the Junior School period pupils have the opportunity through scholarships of proceeding to the secondary or High Schools. In factory districts and congested areas nursery schools are established where children are admitted at two years of age and remain until five.

Attendance at the nursery school is, of course, voluntary. By means of play, free and directed activities, medical attention, wholesome and well-balanced meals, and rest periods, these schools supply the best possible environment and seek to create the best conditions to develop the body, mind, and character of children from underprivileged families.

Technical schools, specializing in the industry of the district, are in operation in all large industrial towns. These schools and evening classes make it possible for those students who wish to do so to proceed by scholarship to university.

Religious instruction is provided for in the schools—attendance at this being voluntary—and every pupil receives a full medical examination at least three times during his school life.

Throughout the entire school system great emphasis is placed upon the child's social development so that he will be able to adjust himself in a social life that is ever growing more complete. Miss Normanton concluded a most interesting address by describing the special types of schools: open air schools for the prevention of disease and for the building up of the health of physically defective children, schools for the mentally defective, for the blind, for the deaf and dumb—all with their special objectives and activities.

### Future Activities

Mr. Macnicol referred briefly to some future objectives that the Legion might have to face. The question of immigration required careful consideration. It was vital that the principle of democracy, for which veterans had fought in the last war, should be maintained. Indiscriminate immigration might do much to undermine that principle. The right type of immigrant should be encouraged to come to the Dominion. Another danger that might be more real than many might suppose was the rise of Fascism. ## SIGN PACT SATURDAY

### Friendship Treaty Between Italy And Britain To Be Formally Concluded Then

LONDON, April 14: (CP)—The Foreign Office announced today that the Anglo-Italian accord designed to end two years' friction between the two powers would be signed at Chigi Palace in Rome by the Italian foreign minister, Count Galeazzo Ciano, and the Earl of Perth, British ambassador, on Saturday. Drafting of the accord was completed today.

Rt. Hon. Leslie Hore-Belisha, British War Secretary, left London today for a trip to Malta. On the way home he will pay a visit to Premier Benito Mussolini in Rome.

## Safety Of Two Amateur Fliers Now Confirmed

VANCOUVER, April 14: (CP)—Confirmation was received today of the safety of two amateur fliers, Fred Ryan of Vancouver and Humphrey Svenson of Chilliwack, who had been missing since Sunday when they left here in a seaplane for Alert Bay. As expected, they had been forced down. They were located near Cape Lazo. Bob Goldie, pilot of the Wells Air Transport, is back after having engaged with his cabin plane in a search of the coast and Nimpkish area.

## Five Billion Dollars In Federal Spending And Lending and Two Billion Expansion of Bank Credit—Appeals For "United Goodwill"

WASHINGTON, D.C., April 14: (CP)—President Franklin D. Roosevelt today proposed at \$7,000,000,000 recovery program embracing \$5,000,000,000 of federal spending and lending and a \$2,000,000,000 expansion of bank credit. Setting forth to the United States Congress measures he said the government could use to help the upward "spiral," the President summoned the "united national goodwill" for a vigorous attack upon recession.

## STICKING TO FACTS

### New Zealand Premier Says His Government is Not Altogether In Agreement With British Defense Policy

WELLINGTON, New Zealand, April 14: (CP)—Prime Minister Savage of New Zealand yesterday declared that a statement made by Malcolm MacDonald, Secretary for the Dominions, in the British House of Commons that no communication had been received from New Zealand expressing disagreement with general British foreign policy "does not altogether state the facts."

Premier Savage said that New Zealand disagreed with certain phases of British foreign policy but never allowed differences of opinion to divide the Empire.

BAKERSFIELD, Cal., April 14:—Mrs. Earhart, mother of Amelia Earhart Putman, famous American aviatrix, who was lost last year on a trans-Pacific flight, suffered a broken leg and other injuries in a freak automobile accident near here yesterday. A woman companion was killed.

**FEDERAL GOVERNMENT**

A correspondent from Terrace wants to know what is our authority for using the expression "federal politics" or "federal government." He thinks we should say "Dominion government" or "Dominion politics."

Our reply is that our authority is the British North America Act which mentions the federation of the provinces and also "Wharton's Law Lexicon" which mentions the "Federal government." We also fancy we remember a heading in one or more Canadian histories which mention the "Act of Confederation." At any rate the term is in general use and its use is a pleasant change from continually repeating the word "Dominion." Under those circumstances we shall continue to use the word and ask our correspondent to dig a little deeper and find out that he is wrong. There are other authorities if he will seek in the proper places.

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

### WHIFFLETS From the Waterfront

A Royal Canadian Air Force twin-motored flying boat, in command of Flight Lieutenant Pretty, which was forced back here last Saturday on account of mechanical trouble after having taken off on its return to Vancouver after a service flight north, is still held here, awaiting arrival of parts from the south. As soon as the parts arrive, the ship with its crew of five will leave on its return to Vancouver.

Another plane held down here is a flying boat of the Columbia Development Co. which arrived at noon Tuesday from Vancouver with E. G. Tyrer and J. H. Eastman on board. Continued poor flying conditions with almost entire lack of visibility owing to low clouds has prevented the plane from leaving in continuation of its flight to Atlin. This plane is on its way back to Atlin after having been undergoing overhaul at Vancouver during the past winter. It is an Eastman flying boat named after the pilot, J. H. Eastman, and is one of a group of five which was here some years ago bound from Detroit to Atlin.

Seattle had its heaviest landings of halibut for a single day so far this season yesterday when nine boats sold 195,000 pounds as follows: Chelsea, 40,000 pounds, Washington, 8 1/4c and 7 1/4c; Eclipse, 40,000, San Juan, 8 1/2c and 7c; Omaney, 40,000, Sebastian, 8 1/2c and 7 1/4c; Superior, 26,000, Booth, 9 1/4c and 7 1/4c; Alitak, 11,000, Whiz, 9 1/4c and 7 1/4c; Dawn, 7,500, Booth, 9 1/4c and 7c; Lane, 9,500, Washington, 10 1/4c and 6 3/4c; Evolution, 13,000, Sebastian, 9c and 7c; Unimak, 8,500, Whiz, 8 1/4c and 7c.

The halibut boat Wireless, which landed a catch at Seattle this week, turned over to the International Fisheries Commission a halibut which had been caught off Cape Scott, north end of Vancouver Island, three miles from where it had been tagged May 29, 1935. It had increased three-eighths pounds in weight which is a rather larger gain than usual for halibut.

The Seattle halibut boat Bolinda is now in her way to Seattle under tow after having suffered a broken tailshaft while fishing off Cape Omaney. The vessel was picked up and taken to Ketchikan whence she proceeded to Seattle.

The freighter Bervin, Capt. Whitworth, under charter to Frank Waterhouse & Co. of Canada Ltd., arrived Wednesday afternoon with a cargo of lumber, cement and coal for Albert and McCaffery. This is the vessel's first visit to port in two years.

The provincial cruiser P.L.M. 8 left yesterday afternoon for Port Simpson enroute to Hudson Bay Passage, Dundas Island, to check up on the finding of wreckage of a trolling boat believed to have been that of J. M. Jackson, elderly crab

fisherman, who has been missing since last October from Victory Cove, Warke Canal, and who is feared may have perished in the wrecking of his boat.

With a capacity list of passengers including many northerners going in for the season, C.P.R. steamer Princess Norah, Capt. William Palmer, arrived in port at 8:30 this morning and sailed at 10 a.m. for Skagway and other northern points whence she is due back here next Monday afternoon southbound. There were 150 in all aboard the Princess Norah. Seven disembarked here while fifteen went aboard at this port for the north. This is the last voyage of the season for the Princess Norah on the Alaska run. The Princess Louise will go on the run with the next sailing.


