THE BRITISH AIR CRISIS

Among the means taken to bring the British air crisis A delegation of about 20 inmates to a point where the people of that country might realize called at the governor's office the real position and take action to set it right, in April where an address was read. Co. R. W. R. Chown, a British industrialist, issued a little publi- Burritt succeeded him. cation which he called "The Crisis," in which he showed how ridiculously inadequate was the British air fleet and how lax was the air department of the British government. This little four-page paper was distributed broadcast. It drew attention to the fact the German government knew all about Britain's weakness whereas the British people were hopelessly ignorant of it. It went into detail, showing that the British had very few effective. fighting planes while Germany was turning them out at a tremendous rate. He makes a number of charges of inefficiency such as the delivery of 67 Whitley Bombers by a well known British firm without bomb sights, bomb racks or gun mountings. These were put into store instead of being sent to airdromes. He also calls attention to the inadequate supply of gasoline.

As a result of this and other protests, the Chamberlain government has taken belated action in removing the head of the department which is put in charge of what is supposed to be a more businesslike head who will insist on results. Probably there will be a clean-up in the department following the appointment of Sir Kingsley Wood who was named to the position of air minister yesterday.

Judging from the allegations made in Britain, Sir Kingsley will have to do some fast work if he is to place the defences of London on anything like an adequate basis.


