THE GERMAN POLICY

The policy of Germany is to control if not to absorb all the states bordering on that country and obtain the return of the colonies taken from her at the close of the war. That has been made plain by German statesmen. It also has been intimated that Germany is prepared to fight to obtain what she wants, if not now, in the near future. By keeping this policy to the front, the German leaders hope to continue their control of Germany indefinitely. Without some such policy the German people might become introspective and decide on a change of government in spite of the present lack of freedom there.

MAKES CHANGES GRADUALLY

Even the Soviet government of Russia is finding it desirable to make changes slowly. In the large grazing areas where the owners of herds of cattle killed them a few years ago to prevent the state taking them, the people are now allowed to own their own cattle, horses or goats and the government is counting on education and steady pressure from above to bring about a condition under which no person is allowed to enrich himself by employing labor. At present the cattle owners are allowed to have a few herders to help them in some regions.

WHO WOULD BE A JEW?

One of the books that most boys read is "Ivanhoe" by Sir Walter Scott in which the trials and tribulations of the Jews are so ably pictured and which shows how in those early days England was a party to Jew baiting. Today our attention is again drawn to the attitude of the Fascist countries in their treatment of this race. Italy is forcing out of the country all Jews who have been there less than twenty years, and, of course, they will leave their money behind them, just as they are doing in Austria under German rule.

It seems that mankind is still somewhere very close to the jungle state in development. The Jews are traders and, as with others, their trading is not always exactly ethical. They are willing to take a chance but they look ahead and figure out the possibilities with the result that many become rich. This makes some of them disliked by their neighbors. Shylock was a mythical character created by his enemies. There are Shylocks in every country and in every race. We feel that Italy is making a grave mistake in following in the footsteps of her ally. What the world needs today is more toleration instead of less.

PITTSBURG LOSES TWO

Buccaneers Lost Double Bill to Chicago Cubs Yesterday But Still Have Four Game Lead

PITTSBURG, Sept. 6. (CP)—Pittsburgh Pirates dropped both ends of a double bill to the Chicago Cubs yesterday and had their margin of National League leadership reduced to four games over the Cincinnati Reds who took a double-header from the St. Louis Cardinals. The Reds and Cubs had been tied for second place up to Saturday when the former took a double-header from the latter. The Cubs came back on Sunday to take a single game from the Reds.

In the American League yesterday the leading New York Yankees, enjoying a fourteen-and-a-half game margin of leadership and continuing almost invincible, defeated the lowly Philadelphia Athletics twice yesterday. The Boston Red Sox and the Cleveland Indians are still waging a merry battle for second place with the former taking a double bill from the Washington Senators yesterday while the latter did the same to the Chicago White Sox. The Red Sox are still one full game ahead of the tribemen.

A team of Dutch cricketers played four one-day matches in London recently. It was the third successive year a Dutch team came to England, members saying the game has become popular in recent years.

Harry James, 64, ship's fireman was found dead in his bunk at Hull, England recently. He was one of five brothers brought from Wales to play for Broughton Rangers in the Northern Rugby Union years ago.

Autographed by England's test cricketers, a bat has been presented to Finchley Memorial Hospital by Eric Stephens, Gloucestershire player, who was treated there recently.

Said to be the first man to sprint 100 yards in 10 seconds, H. W. Wadsley died at Crewe, England, aged 62. The feat was performed at Stourbridge in 1901.

While playing golf at Crews Hill course, Rev. C. E. Story, 55, vicar of St. Augustine's Hackney, since 1923, collapsed and died.

A magistrate in Watford, England, let himself in for something when he said "a woman never hits what she aims at." Sportswomen from cricketing, automobile and rifle-shooting bodies protested and the judge affirmed his remark was made "in lighter vein."

England beat Scotland by seven games to three with two halved in the one-armed golfers' international match recently.

Two Australian test cricket veterans—Hugh Trumble and J. J. Kelly—died recently. Trumble, demon bowler, played in 31 games against England and Kelly, wicket-keeper, 36. Both were 72.

A bequest of nearly £40,000 (\$196,000) to golf is contained in the will of Francis Jackson of Walton, England. The money will be given on death of his wife.

DAVIS CUP TO STATES

Coveted International Tennis Trophy Is Regained by Americans, Bu'ze Clinching It Yesterday

GERMANTOWN, Pennsylvania, Sept. 5. (CP)—Don Budge clinched the Davis Cup for the United States Monday by defeating Adrian Quist of Australia 8-6, 6-1, 6-2.

In the fifth and last match of the series Jack Bromwich of Australia defeated Bobby Riggs of United States 6-4, 4-6, 6-0, 6-2 to make the final series three matches to two in favor of the United States.

Australia had stayed in the Davis Cup tennis final on Sunday when Adrian Quist and Jack Bromwich came back to defeat Budge and Gene Mako in the doubles 6-6, 6-3, 6-4, 6-2.

On Saturday United States had won opening singles and virtually regained possession of the cup when Riggs defeated Quist 4-6, 6-0, 8-6, 6-1 while Budge laced Bromwich 6-2, 6-3, 4-6, 7-5.

FEWER ARE IN SCHOOL

More Than 2,000,000 Children Are Registered in Canada

TORONTO, Sept. 6: (CP)—Canada's future statesmen, doctors, generals, craftsmen, lawyers and bankers, having dusted their school books, today trudged past inviting playing fields to modern versions of the little red school house.

About 2,100,000 sturdy Canadian boys and girls with a healthy happy summer behind them, resume their training. There are fewer pupils in the lower grades with an increase in high school registration.

Most famous of this year's students are five young ladies from Callander, Ont., the Dionne quintuplets, whose chubby fingers will trace out letters under the guidance of Miss Gaetane Vezina of Ottawa. Probably the children will be taught in French only, at first, as desired by their father, Oliva Dionne.

Provincial departments of education have estimated a slight decrease in the total school population this year, probably about 60,000 less than last year's total.

Canada's peak school attendance year was 1934 when 2,527,000 children overcrowded the nation's school facilities. Attendance trends in most parts of Canada have been dominated by two main factors, economic conditions and a falling birth rate.

Manitoba's elementary school attendance last year of 95,563 was 28 per cent less than 10 years ago, but the high school attendance of 44,970 was 81 per cent higher. As in many other parts of the Dominion fewer children are starting school, but they stay longer, because fewer jobs are open.

Average attendance in Ontario last year was 604,734 compared with 512,175 just 10 years ago. Attendance in secondary schools was 104,804 last year, 55 per cent higher than 10 years ago.

Saskatchewan schools, hampered by years of drought-caused poverty, were attended by 215,600 students last year, divided 180,148 in elementary schools and the remainder in secondary schools.

Alberta's school attendance last year was 167,950. British Columbia increased by 2,000 last year to 120,360. Nova Scotia, where some rural schools opened last week, leads the Maritimes with 117,000 students last year, with New Brunswick school attendance at 86,946 and Prince Edward Island's at 18,146.

Better Teachers

While summer vacations are over for Canadian school children, for many of the nation's 700,000 teachers school opening means something like a holiday.

Schools from coast to coast constantly demand a higher educational standard for teaching staffs, which means the final term's school bell for the children summons roughly half the teachers to summer schools for extra training.

The summer schools, geared for fast-paced teaching, often make their pupils work harder than the same teachers work when they return to the school rooms.

Two Canadian provinces, Manitoba and Alberta, have raised the requirements for normal school students this year. They now must have grade 12 standing, equivalent to roughly first year university.

Prince Edward Island will demand a higher standard next year. Two years' training, one year academic followed by one year of normal training will be required to obtain a lowest class teacher's licence.

Raise School Age

New regulations going into effect in Prince Edward Island include raising of compulsory school-attendance age from seven to 13 years to seven to 15. Charlottetown principals are to be given additional help to enable them to concentrate on duties of a supervisory character.

Dr. Robert Fletcher, Manitoba deputy minister of education, believes increased high school registration is due to realization of pupils it is to their benefit to remain in classes rather than go out into a world in which jobs are scarce.

Changing curricula make heavy demands on teachers. Ontario and

Alberta both are undergoing major revisions of their teaching courses, meaning extra work for their teachers.

Saskatchewan teachers face a brighter prospect of higher wages and better school equipment than they have for several years, through improved returns from prairie farmlands.

Throughout the rest of the Dominion other teachers report generally an upward trend in their salaries.

Timely Recipes

RIPE GRAPE JELLY AND BUTTER

To prepare fruit, stem about 5 pounds fully ripe Concord grapes and crush thoroughly. Add 1/2 cup water, cover, and simmer 5 minutes. Separate juice from pulp by placing fruit in 2-quart sieve. FOR JELLY: Run enough juice through a double layer of cheesecloth held in a small sieve to obtain 4 cups of strained juice. FOR BUTTER: Rub through sieve grapes from which juice has drained to obtain 4 1/2 cups pulp. Use the excess juice or water if necessary to fill up last 1/2 cup.

Ripe Grape Jelly

Four cups (2 lbs.) juice, 7 1/2 cups (3 1/4 lbs.) sugar, 1/2 bottle fruit pectin. Measure sugar and juice into large saucepan and mix. Bring to a boil over hottest fire and at once add pectin, stirring constantly. Then bring to a full rolling boil and boil hard 1/2 minute. Remove from fire, skim, pour quickly. Paraffin hot jelly at once. Makes about 11 eight-ounce glasses.

Ripe Grape Butter

Four and one-half cups (2 1/4 lbs.) pulp, seven cups (3 lbs.) sugar, 1/2 bottle fruit pectin. Measure sugar and pulp into large kettle, mix well, and bring to a full rolling boil over hottest fire. Stir constantly before and while boiling. Boil hard 1 minute. Remove from fire and stir in pectin. Pour quickly. Paraffin hot butter at once. Makes about 11 eight-ounce glasses.

that He might have used anything else but that he took wine.

"It is not in my judgment," he continued, "the proper thing to ask our children to consider as vile, something outlawed, that which we use day after day in our worship. If immorality flows out of intemperance, there must be prohibition but that doesn't mean that such prohibition should apply to all."

Before the establishment of the Free State an Irish leader said: "Whatever Ireland gets will be due in a measure to the efforts of Archbishop Hayes."

After the Free State came into being, Cardinal Hayes continued his efforts to bring about peace between the government and the followers of De Valera. When civil war seemed imminent he sent a message to Archbishop Byrne of Dublin warning both sides that such a conflict would shock America and cost Ireland the loss of many sincere friends on this side of the Atlantic.

If the Cardinal possessed one trait more outstanding than another it was his sympathy for charitable causes. What was considered by many as his most important achievement was his development and co-ordination of Catholic charities. In this federation work he directed a campaign to raise more than \$3,500,000 through the clergy and people of the archdiocese.

Was Patriot

Cardinal Hayes was a champion of patriotism and made frequent public appeals for his country. During the world war, while he was still auxiliary bishop of New York, he served as a member of the National War Council and was appointed by the Pope bishop of the American army at the front, the appointment carrying ecclesiastical jurisdiction over Catholics in the service wherever the American flag was raised.

As chaplain general he visited virtually every army camp and naval base in the United States and was prepared to go to France when the illness and death of Cardinal Farley made his trip overseas impossible.

His other war work included activities in behalf of the various Liberty Loans and in helping raise a fund of \$500,000 to aid French Catholic victims of the war. In 1920 he was decorated with the Order of the Crown of Italy for his work on behalf of Italians during the war.

The call to Rome to receive the hat of Cardinal came so suddenly in March, 1934, that Cardinal Hayes had to cancel plans to celebrate mass in St. Patrick's Cathedral on St. Patrick's Day. He sailed three days later with Archbishop Mundelein of Chicago, also a native of New York, who was to receive similar honors.

The return of the new Cardinal to New York was marked by an enthusiastic welcome by the Catholics of the city. A pontifical mass was celebrated attended by foreign diplomats, federal, state and city officials, educators, financiers and leaders of the bench and bar.

FIGURES ON FISH PACK

Total in This District for 1938 Shows Substantial Increase Over Year Ago

The salmon pack in Prince Rupert district for the 1938 season up to the end of August totalled 658,892 cases as compared with 457,481 cases in 1937 to a corresponding date, 866,393 cases in 1936, 556,681 cases in 1935 and 584,382 cases in 1934.

The sockeye pack for the Prince Rupert district this year was 210,034 cases against 177,854 cases in 1937, 183,200 cases in 1936, 239,627 cases in 1935 and 193,047 cases in 1934.

The pack of pinks in the district for 1938 had reached a total of 279,361 cases in comparison with 162,112 cases in 1937, 487,525 cases in 1936, 187,333 cases in 1935 and 266,360 cases in 1934.

The Skeena River pack total for this year to the end of August stood at 270,623 cases as against 159,377 cases in 1937, 329,913 cases in 1936, 191,898 cases in 1935 and 218,208 cases in 1934.

The Skeena sockeye pack was 70,500 cases in comparison with 53,975 cases in 1937, 96,174 cases in 1936, 61,690 cases in 1935 and 69,268 cases in 1934.

The pink pack on the Skeena this year stood at 133,419 cases as compared with 66,962 cases in 1937, 175,640 cases in 1936, 93,155 cases in 1935 and 108,880 cases in 1934.

The Naas River pack showed trends similar to those on the Skeena in individual varieties.
