Germany Much Interested In War

Fisheries Research Board Executive To Spend Four Days In Rupert Next Week

The full executive of the Fisheries Research Board of Canada will spend four days in Prince Rupert next week. It will be the first time that the executive has met in a body on the Pacific Coast. Arriving here next Tuesday night by train, the members of the executive will be in the city until Saturday evening when they will sail on the steamer Prince Rupert for Vancouver and the Island. The Pacific Experimental Station will be the scene of a number of sessions which the executive will have while here. The executive consists of: Prof. A. T. Cameron, University of Manitoba, Winnipeg, chairman; J. J. Cowie, Ottawa, secretary-treasurer; Prof. (Father) Alexandre Vachon, Laval University, Quebec; Prof. G. B. Reid, Queen's University, Kingston; A. H. Whitman, Halifax; W. A. Clemens, director of the Pacific Biological Station, Nanaimo, at present in the Babine district; and Dr. Neal Carter, director of the Prince Rupert Fisheries Experimental Station, due back next week from a trip to the Old Country will be here for the meetings. Miss Nona Grimes, secretary to Mr. Cowie, will also be here. John Dybhavn, local member of the Fisheries Research Board of Canada, has been looking after arrangements for the visit locally. There will be a trip to Carlisle Cannery on the Skeena River next Wednesday while Thursday, Friday and Saturday will be largely devoted to business sessions with time being taken to show the visitors around the port.

SHOT FOR DESERTION

"Two-Gun" Wang, Former Young Woman Leader of Chinese, Chose Dishonor For Love

NANKING, August 10.—"Two Gun" Wang, noted young woman leader of Chinese guerrilla forces, was executed before a Chinese firing squad yesterday for desertion to the enemy Japanese. She met her fate together with a former Chinese general for love of whom she went over to the enemy. In the early days of the Sino-Japanese war the comely "Two Gun" was an interesting figure at the head of irregular forces.

AIR FORCE PROMOTION

Col. Bishop Is Named Honorary Air Marshal and Col. Rogers Honorary Brigadier

OTTAWA, Aug. 10: (CP)—Officials of the Department of National Defence last night announced the promotion of Honorary Air Vice Marshal W. A. Bishop V. C., Canada's No. 1 ace of the Great War, to Honorary Air Marshal and Col. J. Bartlett Rogers C. M. G. to Honorary Brigadier. Bishop, who is now 44 years of age, joined the Royal Flying Corps late in 1915, starting a career that saw him among the highest ranking aces of the Great War during which he shot down seventy-two enemy aircraft.

Promotion of Lieut. Col. L. R. LaFleche, deputy minister of national defence, to the substantive rank of major general also was announced today. With the advance of the deputy minister to substantive rank were also announced promotion of many senior naval and air force officers. Only one promotion was announced in the permanent force but it is understood further changes in the militia are contemplated. The promotions reflect the far-reaching development taking place in Canadian defence forces.

English Crops Are Suffering

Heat Followed by Excessive Rainfall Causes Damage

LONDON, Aug. 10.—England suffered from heat and excessive rainfall yesterday. Hay crops in Lancashire were ruined, some meadows being under five feet of water.

Are Unable To Agree In Arbitration

VANCOUVER, August 10.—(CP)—Unable to reach an agreement on vital points, fishermen's and cannery representatives, sitting to arbitrate the salmon price dispute, adjourned from Tuesday to Thursday. An independent audit of packers' books has risen as one in addition to other contentious points. Division of costs has been proposed.

BULLETINS

TRUCE REPORTED TODAY MOSCOW.—It was reported in Japanese circles here today that the Soviet commissar of foreign affairs and the Japanese ambassador had agreed to a suspension of hostilities in the Far East effective immediately.

CHINESE CLAIM VICTORY HANKOW.—Chinese claimed another victory at Lion Hill on the north bank of the river Tuesday. The Japanese were driven back and Chinese troops well established in fortified entrenchments on the crest. The report also stated the Japanese were checked in front of Hankow and some units were isolated from the main body. Many bombs were dropped by Japanese planes today within 500 yards of Shawan Island which has an international settlement. It was the second raid in as many days and the death toll is believed to be high.

LOGGING RESUMED VICTORIA.—Logging on Vancouver Island and the Lower Mainland, which has been under ban for the last three weeks owing to the serious forest fire situation, may be resumed this week. Hon. A. Wells Gray, minister of lands, announces, however that strict precautions will be observed in future and, in the event of further fires, another shutdown may be ordered.

READY FOR FIGHT NEW YORK.—Both Henry Armstrong, challenger, and Lou Ambers, champion, are reported to be in the pink of condition for their lightweight title fight here tonight. If Armstrong wins, he will be the holder of three titles.

MINISTERS WILL VISIT

Hon. C. D. Howe and Hon. Ian Mackenzie Are Expected In Prince Rupert This Fall

Hon. Clarence D. Howe, minister of trade and commerce, and Hon. Ian Mackenzie, minister of national defence, both of whose departments are especially interested in the port of Prince Rupert, are expected to visit here in the course of the present summer or fall, it is stated by Olof Hanson, M.P. for Skeena, who arrived in the city on last night's train from Smithers and will spend a few days in town. The definite dates of the ministerial visits are not yet known.

Mr. Hanson states that the Federal Government is starting mining trail work in the Driftwood Creek and Hudson Bay Mountain areas near Smithers.

INCIDENT IS SERIOUS

Different Interpretations of Slaying Of Sudetan German

BERLIN, Germany, Aug. 10:—Nazi party headquarters view the fatal stabbing of a Sudetan German member at Hartmanitz, Czechoslovakia, as the major incident in the German-Czech crisis. Meanwhile British radio commentators said the Nazi propagandists had neglected to state the man was killed in a brawl between Sudetan Germans and German Social Democrats. It was also noted that Polish radio stations repeated German press attacks on Czechoslovakia without comment.

NEW DRIVE UNDER WAY

Fresh Offensive Being Launched Both by Loyalists and Insurgents In Spain.

MADRID, August 10.—A new offensive has been started by loyalist forces sixty miles north of Gadesa on the Ebro front, the government announcing that it is "only the beginning." Meantime, General Francisco Franco, the insurgent commander-in-chief, has launched a new drive near the Portuguese frontier. Madrid was shelled yesterday by the insurgents.

Government of India Beaten

Promotion of British Army Officers Has Repercussion

DELHI, India, Aug. 10.—Because Great Britain promoted 2,000 officers the government of India was defeated by a vote of 71 to 43. A division occurred on discussion of centralized control of India's military forces, when India has to pay all salaries. The recent promotions increased budget requirements and the additional amount required became a bone of contention.

FIGHT IN RED-HEADS

PLYMOUTH, England, August 10.—(CP)—Anaesthetist Dr. C. J. M. Dawkins told the British Medical Association conference that red-heads give the most trouble. They could be made unconscious in 68 seconds, he said, 16 seconds slower than fair-haired people and 6 seconds slower than dark-haired.

Japanese Ambassador Keeps Berlin Informed On Crisis With Soviet

Conflict Near Changkufeng Is Assuming Proportions Comparable With That of Great War—Nipponese Claim Reds Repulsed.

TOKYO, August 10.—(CP)—A Japanese Army communique said that a charge of Soviet infantry and tanks on Hill 52, half a mile south of Changkufeng, was repulsed today and that a four-mile Siberian border front was comparatively quiet this morning after twenty-hours of Soviet shelling. Severe bombardment, comparable with artillery barrages of the world war, destroyed a village at the foot of Changkueng hill on the Korea-Siberian-Manchukuo border yesterday. Veterans said it was the most terrific shelling since the dispute started on July 11. Meanwhile the Japanese ambassador in Berlin kept Germany informed on the situation. Germany, as a partner in the anti-comintern pact with Japan and Italy, is vitally interested.

New Dealer Victorious

Senator Alben Barkley Overwhelms Governor "Happy" Chandler in Kentucky Democratic Primary

LOUISVILLE, Kentucky, August 10.—Senator Alben W. Barkley, New Dealer, seeking re-election with the personal support of President Franklin D. Roosevelt, scored an overwhelming victory over Governor Albert B. (Happy) Chandler in the Democratic senatorial primary.

CLEVELAND MOVES UP

Indians and Browns Divided American League Double-Header At St. Louis Yesterday

ST. LOUIS, Aug. 10: (CP)—Cleveland Indians divided honors in a double-header with the Browns at St. Louis yesterday and clipped half a game off the American League leadership of the New York Yankees who dropped a decision to the Washington Senators at the Yankee Stadium. The lead of the Yankees over the Indians is now five full games. In the National League, the first place Pittsburgh Pirates won a thrilling one to nothing victory over the St. Louis Cardinals at Pittsburgh and held their six-and-a-half game margin over New York Giants who were winning a close verdict from the Bees at Boston. The Chicago Cubs blanked the Cincinnati Reds at Cincinnati and assumed exclusive possession of third place, the two teams having been previously tied for this position. The Brooklyn Dodgers, defeating the Phillies at Ebbets Field, took over the lead of the second division from the Boston Bees.

Another Air Force Crash

Four Fliers Feared to Have Lost Lives in Disaster in England

LEEDS, Eng., Aug. 10.—Four men of the Royal Air Force were feared dead today following disappearance of a plane of the 233rd Squadron believed to have crashed in the bay at Bridlington, Yorks.

DELAY TO REARMING

Three Hundred Workers On Strike And More Threaten

MELBOURNE, Australia, Aug. 10: Australia's rearmament program was threatened with delay Tuesday, as a result of a strike of 300 workers at the Commonwealth Aircraft Corporation and the threat of a sympathetic strike by all munition workers. Representatives of the strikers asked immediate intervention by Prime Minister J. A. Lyons in an attempt to reach a speedy settlement of the matter.

Newfoundland Having Fires

One Thousand Rendered Homeless As Result of Conflagrations In Forests

ST. JOHN'S NEWFOUNDLAND, August 10.—One thousand persons have been rendered homeless by extensive forest fires which are sweeping Newfoundland following a spell of exceptionally warm, dry weather. Much damage has been done to timber stands.

Roosevelt At Warm Springs

President of United States Spending A Couple of Days in Georgia—Back at White House Friday.

WARM SPRINGS, Georgia, August 10.—President Franklin D. Roosevelt arrived today from Pensacola, Florida, where he landed early yesterday following his cruise of Pacific waters. He will make a couple of speeches at Georgia State points tomorrow and is due back at the White House on Friday.

WINNIPEG WHEAT DOWN

WINNIPEG, August 10.—(CP)—Winnipeg wheat futures showed a drop up to three cents. October was down 2 1/2 cents at 71 1/2 cents per bushel.

LONDON, August 10.—(CP)—The London gold price was off 1 cent, closing at \$34.90. Copper, zinc and lead prices showed upward trend.

ARE THEY DIVIDED?

Information has been received in Madrid that the insurgent forces are rather badly divided and that this difference among the main factions is a weakness in the Franco camp. According to the stories that come through there are two main groups among the Franco forces. On one side the Traditionalists are the ultra conservatives who seem to be the main strength of the movement. They support the aristocracy and the church and will undoubtedly be the chief power if Franco wins. The other chief group is the Falangists. These support the church but not the landlords and are opposed to foreign interference with the affairs of Spain. While the Traditionalists would like a dictatorship of those who believe they have a traditional right to dictate, the Falangists would like a dictatorship representing the masses such as took place in Italy. The north of Spain is generally speaking very Traditionalist while the south is Falangist.

It is said that negotiations are going on between the Falangists and the Republicans or loyalists with a view to possibly ending the struggle but whether this movement is strong enough to affect the outcome seems rather doubtful. If the Falangists go over to the government it will undoubtedly weaken Franco.

The information that comes through the lines is very meagre and Franco keeps such an iron grip on his following that it seems doubtful if it means as much as it might appear.

DR. JEKYLL AND MR. HYDE IN RUSSIA

The story of Dr. Jekyll and Mr. Hyde, which many people considered to be an impossible one, is being re-enacted in Russia today. Maxim Litvinoff, commissar of foreign affairs, assures the British Foreign Secretary that Russia will co-operate in a movement to bring about a general settlement of European differences. Almost at the same time G. Dimitroff, secretary general of the Communist Internationale, with the full consent and approval of the Russian Government, issued instructions to communists in all countries urging that they bring pressure on their governments to prevent any compromise with fascists anywhere and promising full support of the Soviet government in its efforts. He would 'break the back of Fascism once and for all.'

The difficulty with these new forms of government is that they are not content to let other nations alone. They must interfere. There is little to choose in this respect between fascism and communism. Each seems to think it has a call to rule the world and each will probably be disappointed.

From The Waterfront

Union steamer Catala, Capt. James Findlay, having been delayed by loading salmon at Naas River points, arrived in port at 10:45 last night from the north and sailed at midnight for Vancouver and waypoints.

With a full list of passengers consisting largely of round trip tourists for Alaska, C. N. R. steamer Prince Rupert, Capt. James Watt, arrived in port at 11 o'clock this morning from Vancouver, Powell River and Ocean Falls and sailed at 1 o'clock this afternoon for Skagway and other northern points whence she will return here next Monday southbound.

Two western schooners sold 51,000 pounds of halibut at the port of Seattle yesterday. They were Thor, 36,000 pounds, Sebastian-Stuart, 11½c and 9½c, Superior, 25,000 pounds. Booth Fisheries 12½c and 11½c.

Capt. John Skarpness has disposed of his half interest in the well known Seattle halibut boat Maddock to Capt. John Johnson formerly of the boat Lively. Capt. Johnson will become skipper of the Maddock. Capt. Skarpness' plans for the future are unsettled.

The United States Bureau of Fisheries estimates that frozen halibut stocks on July 15 this year amounted to 9,737,000 pounds, a decrease of almost a million pounds from 10,739,000 pounds at a corresponding date last year. There was a slight decrease in production this year but the principal reason for the reduction in frozen stocks this year is an increase in the movement of fresh fish direct into the market.

C. P. R. steamer Princess Alice Capt. William Thomson, southbound from Skagway to Vancouver with a full list of tourist passengers, is due in port at 3:30 this afternoon from the north and will sail at 5 p.m.
