TAKE CAR Great Britain Prepares For Any Eventuality In Europe; General Conflict Imminent

Adolf Hitler Enters Vienna In Triumph; Hailed "Saviour;" Schuschnigg "Safe" In Custody

VIENNA, March 12: (CP)—Hailed as the saviour of this country, Chancellor Adolf Hitler returned in triumph to his native Austria today and delivered from the City Hall Square an account to the German and Austrian people of his bloodless conquest of Austria.

Hitler, in leaving Germany for Austria, left Propaganda Minister Goebbels to read a broadcast proclamation. It declared that a "real plebiscite" will be held in Austria "within the shortest time" to convince the world that the Austrian people really desire a National Socialist government.

"I have now decided to extend the aid of the Reich to millions of Germans in Austria," Der Fuehrer proclaimed. "The Austrian people see in brethren who have hurried to their aid saviours from dire distress."

Hitler charged von Schuschnigg with having perpetuated his regime by brute force without shadow of a mandate from the people. The former Chancellor of Austria is being held in custody for his own protection.

Hitler, on entering Linz, the capital of upper Austria, was greated by crowds who yelled: "Long live the liberator of Austria, Adolf Hitler!"

Hitler Marches On-Nazis In Hungary Are Reorganizing-Czecho-Slovakian Invasion Would Involve France

LONDON, March 12: (CP)— A gravely anxious | Carrying On British cabinet gathered at 10 Downing Street this morning and faced one of the gravest crises since the Great War. On Monday the cabinet will meet again to carry further the discussions on the Mid-European crisis. Over the week-end the ministers will remain in London in readiness for an emergency call.

Germany has rejected flatly British and French protests against the use of coercion in bringing about the change in the Austrian government, the official German news agency announced. This was Chancellor Adolf Hitler's answer to what was announced a protest "in strongest possible terms" to Berlin as well as to the caution which had been delivered personally to Foreign Minister Joachim von Ribbentrop of Germany that it was felt the action of the German government was bound to have a most disturbing effect upon Anglo- Pipe Line To German relations and upon public confidence throughout Europe. The "friendship talks" between Great Bring Alberta forgotten owing to the gravity of the latest European Oil To Coast situation.

The House of Commons will probably debate the crisis on Monday.

With the Anglo-French representations against the coup in Austria availing nothing and Hitler marching on, Italy makes no move and Rome newspapers even express approval.

HUNGARY NEXT?

A Nazi movement, according to dispatches from Budapest, has started in Hungary. The police and army have been put on the alert and the guard at the Austrian border strengthened. Hungarian Nazis, excited by the Austrian nazification, have started reorganization of their illegal formations and have demanded release of arrested colleagues.

It Hitler invades Czecho-Slovakia, he may easily precipitate a European war. Great Britain has given Czecho-Slovakia no guarantees but, if Germany attacks Czecho-Slovakia, France is bound to give assistance. Great Britain and France, in turn, have given reciprocal guarantees.






