### EDUCATING FOR FASCISM

"Every Communist vote is also a potential Fascist vote," according to a writer on international problems. The reason for this is that the Communists spend most of their time attacking the democracies. They cannot say much about the European dictatorships because the methods they use are so near like the Russian methods. It is in each case, according to this authority, a government by brute force. The result of the constant harping on the sins of the democracies and of capitalism in those countries is that the ground is well prepared for national socialism which is Fascism. People learn to hate their own country and its methods and are ready to adopt anything which they think will give them relief.

According to the same authority communists make a great show of strength. They form innumerable societies overlapping each other, presumably of a popular kind, and they make a loud noise but its real strength is a childish delusion. That is what happened in Germany. The world had an idea that Communism was very strong there and wondered why it did not assert itself and take charge of the government. As a matter of fact it was not as strong as it seemed and everything was ready for the advent of Hitler. A similar condition existed in Italy before the Blackshirts marched on Rome. Communists had educated the people to despise the old and to expect something new and that something new came in the form of Fascism and the corporative state.

As a matter of fact the fighting spirit of Communism had been directed against the wrong people. Too much time is spent by them in hammering down the democracies and preparing them for dictatorships and in every case but Russia they failed to install a dictatorship of the proletariat but have chosen instead a national socialist dictatorship.

The old line political parties help in this work by continually abusing the party that is in power. While the Liberals are administering affairs the opposition groups are continually hounding them and see no good in anything they do. On the other side when the Conservatives are in power the Liberals are just as bad in denouncing every act of the other side. As the opposition is always more vocal than the administration supporters the result is that thousands of people say "all politicians are bad," "politics is rotten," "there is not one honest statesman in the country." As a matter of fact, politicians are just as human as other people with all their failings as well as their good points. They have just as fine a code of honor as those in private life and much higher than a great many people who are always trying to get something for themselves. With half of the upper strata of the country berating the other half and with the lower third united in berating all the rest, the ground is always ready for the advent of a clever demagogue such as they have in Germany to seize the reins of power and make himself a dictator.

respect to the Canadian National Railways and Mr. Walton. The railway was owned by the government and so was the elevator and the grain. The government had the power to take his boy and put him in the trenches in a foreign country and he could not see why it had not power to move its own grain to its own elevator here over its own railway. It was a disgrace and a shame.

Theo Collart was even more outspoken. He thought the whole matter should go to the government at Ottawa. He suggested that Olof Hanson should be asked to resign as a protest if no action was taken.

Jack Johns was convinced that the member was impressed with the importance of getting grain moving this way. However, the public was not in a state of mind to tolerate such a state of things as existed today.

Dr. J. H. Carson said he had talked with Mr. Hanson about this matter and Mr. Hanson had said he would be glad to make a special trip to Ottawa if it was thought it would do any good. He had already taken the matter up with several of the big elevator people. They were now considering the matter.

Mr. Mills read a letter from Mr. Hanson to Mr. Euler in regard to the elevator.

Mr. McCaffery told of the time this same Mr. McIvor wanted to take over the elevator and the government would not let him have it.

Mr. MacCallum urged that they go the limit just now. He thought Mr. Hanson was doing his utmost.

Mr. Collart did not agree with that. He thought that, if he could not get action, Mr. Hanson should resign in protest.

Mr. Nickerson said he realized that the member was in a peculiar position. This was an isolated district and Mr. Turgeon was the only other member interested who could back him up. This had been done. He felt sure that Mr. MacKenzie King had given orders to have the elevator at Churchill filled and he could do the same here. There was no one to blame but Mr. King. It was Mr. King who had refused to sanction a subsidy for this port.

Eventually it was decided to continue the campaign, leaving it in the hands of the executive as to whether a public meeting of protest should be called.

## Waterfront Whiffs

Salmon Canning Season in This District Pretty Well Over Now—Exceptionally Light Week for Halibut Landings—Harbor Defence Work

Except for Namu on the mainland and Pacofi, Lagoon Bay and Old Masset on the Queen Charlotte Islands, all salmon canneries in Prince Rupert district have now closed down for the season. The canneries still remaining open are running on chums from the Queen Charlotte Islands and the run of these is proving disappointing. Seining was ordered discontinued in waters of the south end of the Queen Charlotte Islands, except in Skidegate Inlet and on the west coast of the Islands between Buck Point and Skelu Point, as from last evening. Fishing remains open at Massett Inlet and elsewhere around the north end of the Islands. After a three weeks' suspension, salmon trolling again becomes permissible in Prince Rupert district this Sunday.

The past week was exceptionally light for halibut landings at Prince Rupert with a mere 187,500 pounds being brought in of which 93,500 pounds was from eight Canadian boats and 94,000 pounds from four American vessels. With landings in light, prices went up considerably

above average. For Canadian fish the best price of the week was 12.4c and 5c which the Joe Baker and Pair of Jacks received for catches of 2,500 and 3,000 pounds respectively while the low was 10.1c and 5c which the Oslo was paid for 19,000 pounds. The high price of the week for American fish was 13.4c and 6c which the Foremost received for 14,500 pounds and the low 10.7c and 6c which the Leviathan was paid for 33,000 pounds. Landings for the season up to and including yesterday had reached a total of 12,296,050 pounds in comparison with an aggregate of 12,762,350 pounds at a corresponding date last year. The Canadian total for this year is 5,696,150 pounds in comparison with 6,437,350 pounds

and the American 6,599,900 pounds as against 6,325,000 pounds.

### Harbor Defence Plans

Activities of the hydrographic survey steamer William J. Stewart in Prince Rupert at this time are understood to be in connection with the defence program being contemplated for Prince Rupert, particularly in regard to the establishment of an aerial base. Some time ago it was understood that Morse Basin was the favored site for such a base. Now Seal Cove and a site across the harbor are prominently mentioned. There is talk of a large scale work in this connection. Little information is to be gleaned in official quarters, however. Meantime work proceeds on the gun sites at either side of the entrance of the harbor and will continue.

The charge against the local halibut boat Joe Baker, on being fined \$100 this week for an infraction of international fisheries regulations, was that of "unlawfully possessing halibut while fishing for other species than halibut in an area closed to halibut fishing." The vessel was not actually charged with illegal halibut fishing.

## Asks Appointment Of Western Man As Deputy Minister

After some discussion, the Prince Rupert Chamber of Commerce last night decided to ask the federal government that, in event of the resignation of the present deputy minister of fisheries, he should be replaced by a British Columbia man.

The fisheries committee reported against taking this action but the Chamber decided otherwise.
