Mayor Dore was for years a colorful figure in the life of Seattle. He was prominent as a criminal lawyer and a public speaker.

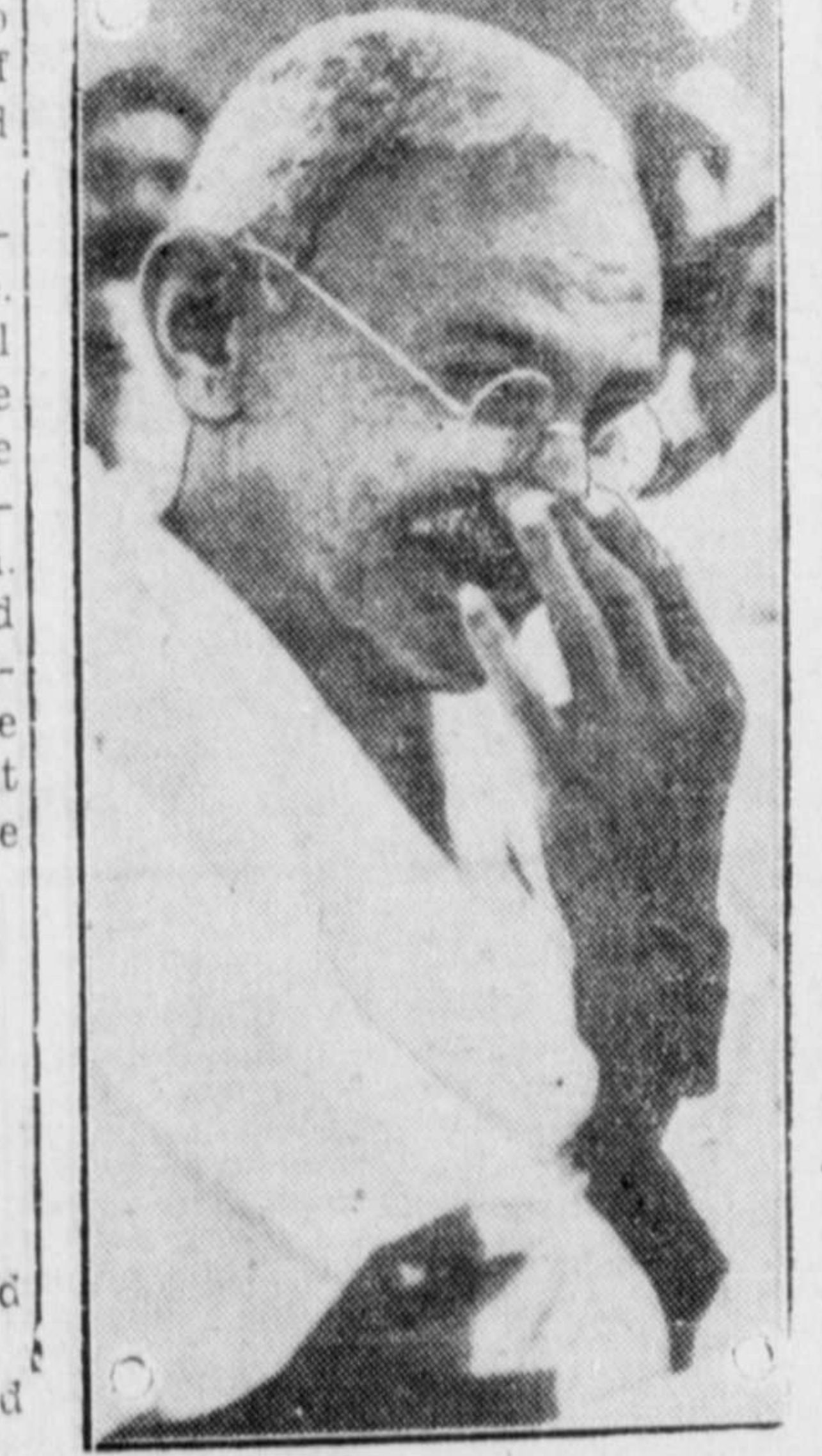

LONDON, April 19: (CP)—British government representatives will visit Canada soon to investigate the possibility of having armaments manufactured in that Dominion.

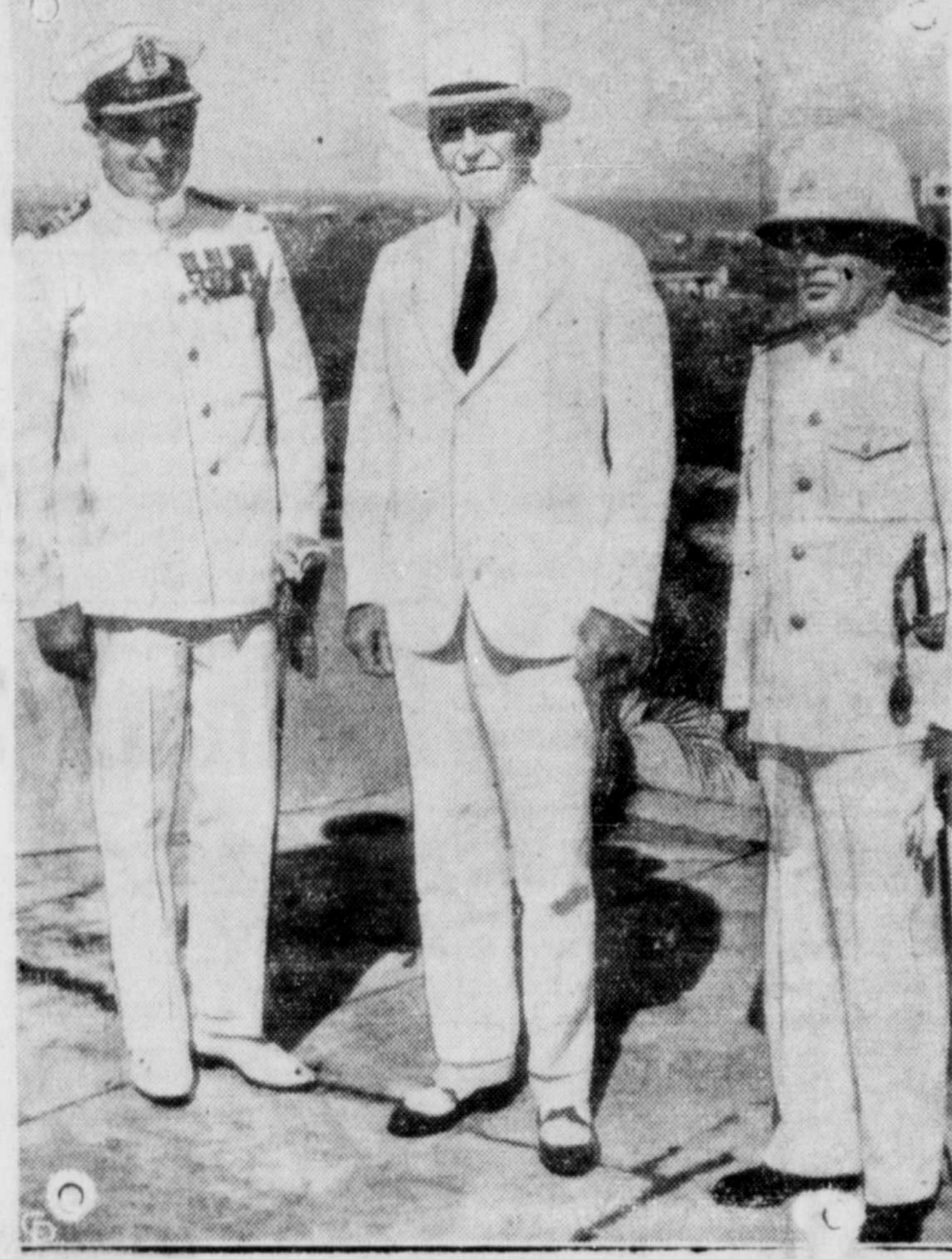

CIVIL WAR IN RUSSIA

Demaree Bess, Moscow correspondent of the Christian Science Monitor, describes the purgings which have been going on in Russia as a "civil war." Hundreds of thousands of persons have been either shot or imprisoned or sent to concentration camps during the past two years while the mass of the people looked on and wondered what it was all about. The reason for the trouble, the correspondent says, is not quite apparent. It seems to be either that Joseph Stalin deliberately set out to destroy all possible rivals or that there was an organized movement in high communist quarters to get rid of Stalin and this purpose has been defeated. At any rate the under-cover war has had the effect of weakening Russia to such an extent that neighboring countries have been taking advantage of the opportunity to make moves which prior to two years ago would not have been tolerated, such as the threatened invasion of Lithuania by Poland.

During the early days of the Communist movement in Russia an effort was made to spread Communism to all countries of the world and especially to European countries. Of late this effort has practically ceased and Russia is now turning her attention to China. She has withdrawn from Spain and turned her back upon the warring nations of Europe with the result that nations which formerly looked to her for support are just beginning to realize that no such support will be forthcoming.

One effect of the internal struggle in Russia has been the alienation of sympathy for Communism in the United States and other countries. The international Red movement has been almost destroyed by Moscow.

Another interesting move on the part of Russia is the cutting off of the nation from all neighbors by removing all Russian inhabitants far from the borders and strengthening of the border defense. This will isolate the country more than ever. Already it had been learned that many of the foreign legations had been closed and immigration from Europe discouraged. Even tourists are no longer welcomed as they were. The country is being deliberately cut off from Europe and converted into a hermit country and in the meantime aid is being extended to China where the Chinese troops are being drilled by German officers.

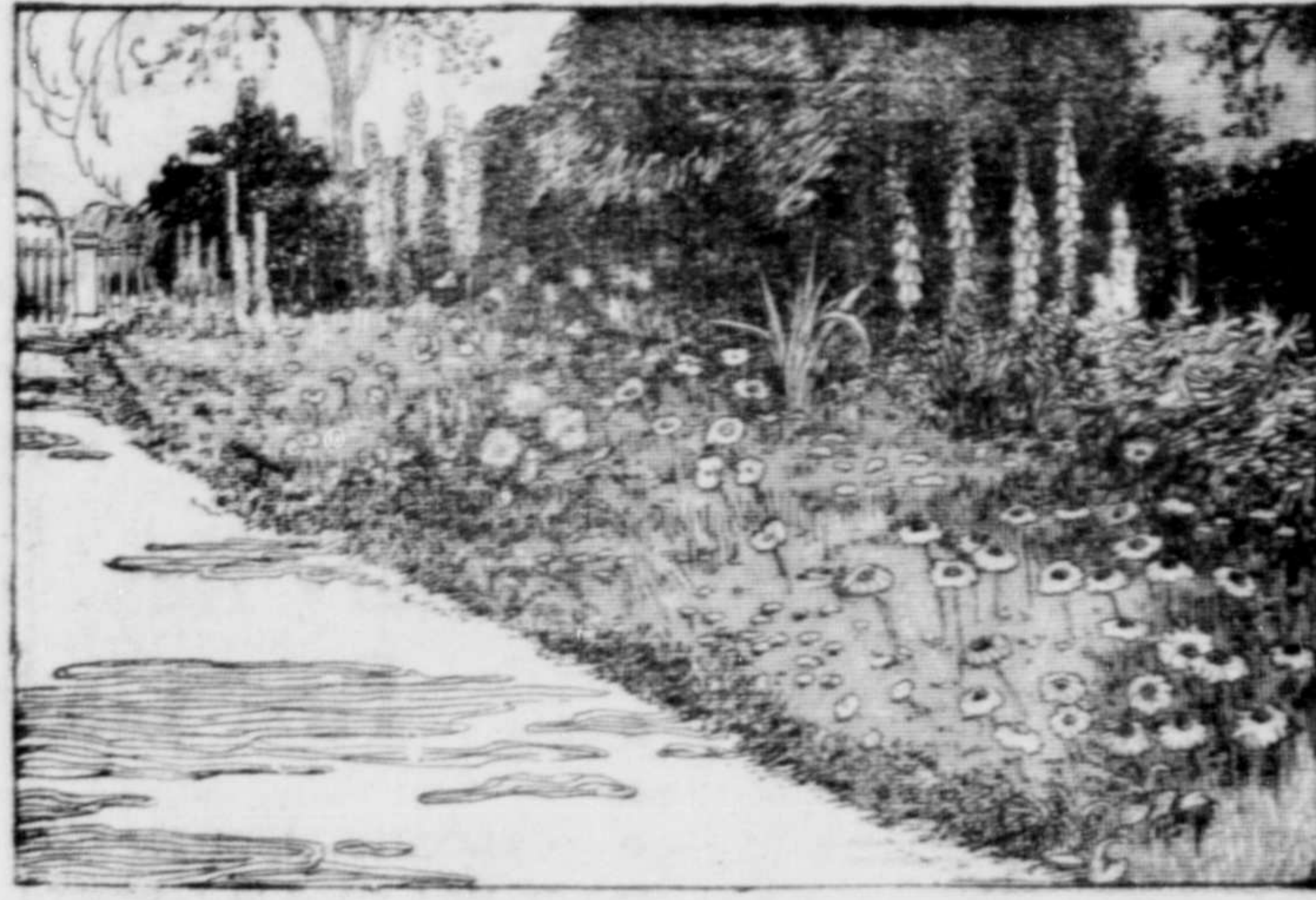
THE ORIENTAL MIND

In studying Russia it must be remembered that the country is more Oriental than Occidental. In some communities in European Russia they had a form of self-government many years ago but it was not quite the same as we understand self-government. There was always a restraining hand either visible or invisible. Much of the country knew nothing of self-government until after the revolution and today they have no real knowledge of it. The powerful political police and other restraining influences are even stronger than ever. The Oriental mind works differently from ours. Possibly the Oriental may understand us but we have not tried to understand him so find it difficult to realize what is going on in Russia, Japan and China. If today China and Russia are drawn together they may prove to be a very powerful world influence but the disintegration that is constantly in process in Russia is having a weakening effect. It is still going on.

GARDEN NOTEBOOK

Moss in the lawn is one of the difficulties to be overcome in the gardens after the planting is done. Prince Rupert. 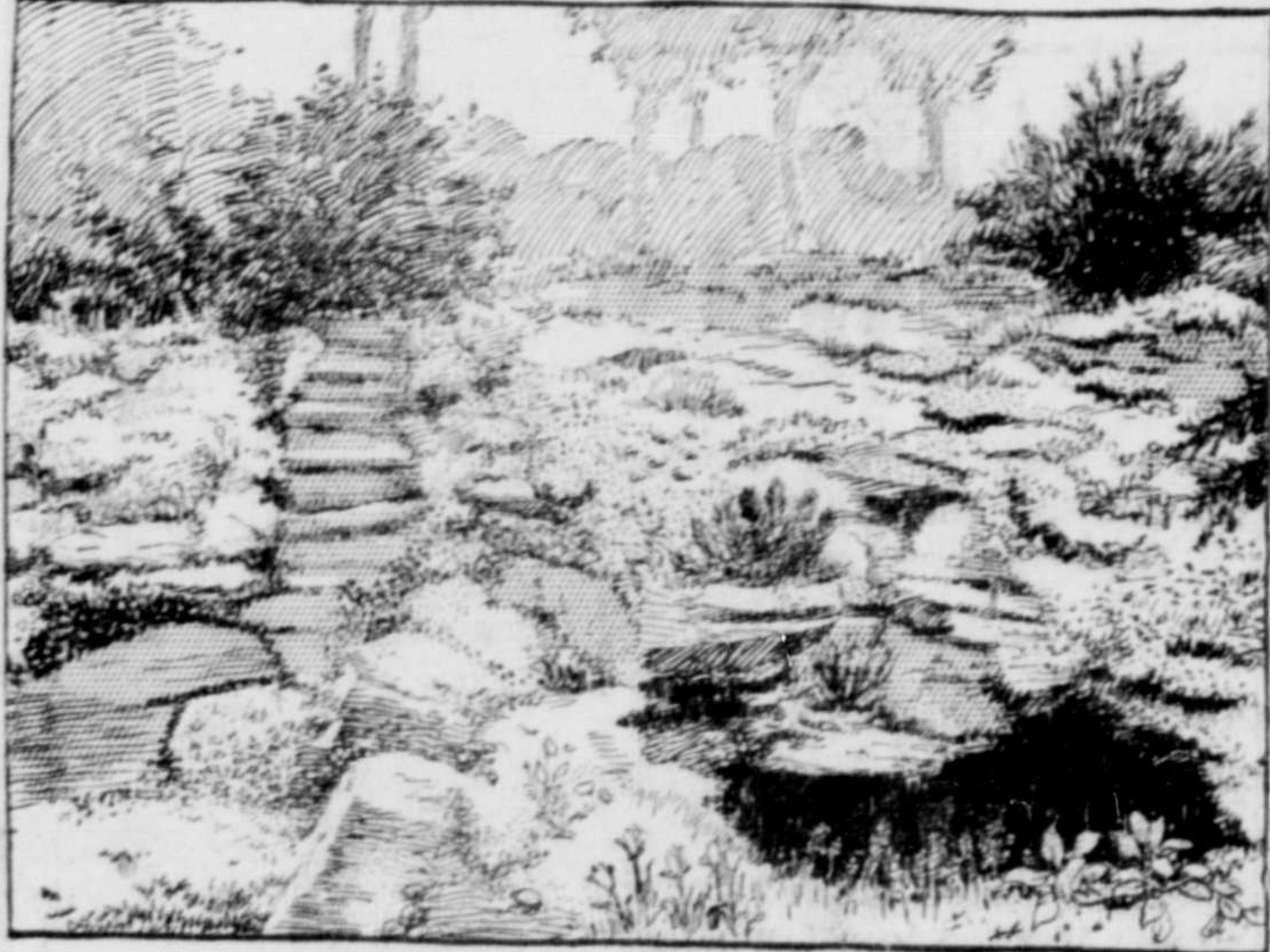


This picture shows what may be achieved by a little intelligent effort.

remedy it if there is anything wrong. Then improve the fertility of the soil by the application of a complete balanced plant food. Rake thoroughly and apply the plant food at the rate of four pounds to the hundred square feet. Reseed the bare spots if any and, if the lawn is shaded, use a seed mixture especially adapted to shade. Repeat the operation every six weeks until the lawn is in good condition.

Possibly I may suggest to the person with a small garden that it is better at first to buy a few annual seedlings instead of trying to raise them. Perennials may be secured from neighbors or roots purchased from the florist. Dahlia tubers can be purchased now and should be planted soon. Gladioli bulbs should go in as soon as the weather will allow. Chrysanthemums do not usually succeed outdoors but must be lifted in or sheltered when fall comes. I have decided to give up planting mums. To get best results a greenhouse is necessary in this climate. Stocks, asters, snapdragons, marigolds, Schizanthus and most of the com-

I sow seeds or buy plants? Nobody can answer these questions. Each owner of a garden must work them out according to his personal taste. All depends upon the kind of garden he wishes to have. Also much depends upon the size and degree of cultivation of the garden. To those who have not cultivated a garden before, I suggest that he do not attempt too much the first year. It is an all season job and success depends to a large extent on the amount of attention given

mon annuals can be grown successfully but I do not recommend phlox drummondii, ageratum, zinnias or any of the flowers that need a lot of sunshine. Many of these may be sown out of doors but better results are obtained from the purchase of strong seedlings about the middle of May. Violas and pansies do extremely well.

This is a good time to think about window boxes. Many people who cannot have a garden can have a successful window box. Apartment dwellers might well give this attention.—H.F.P.

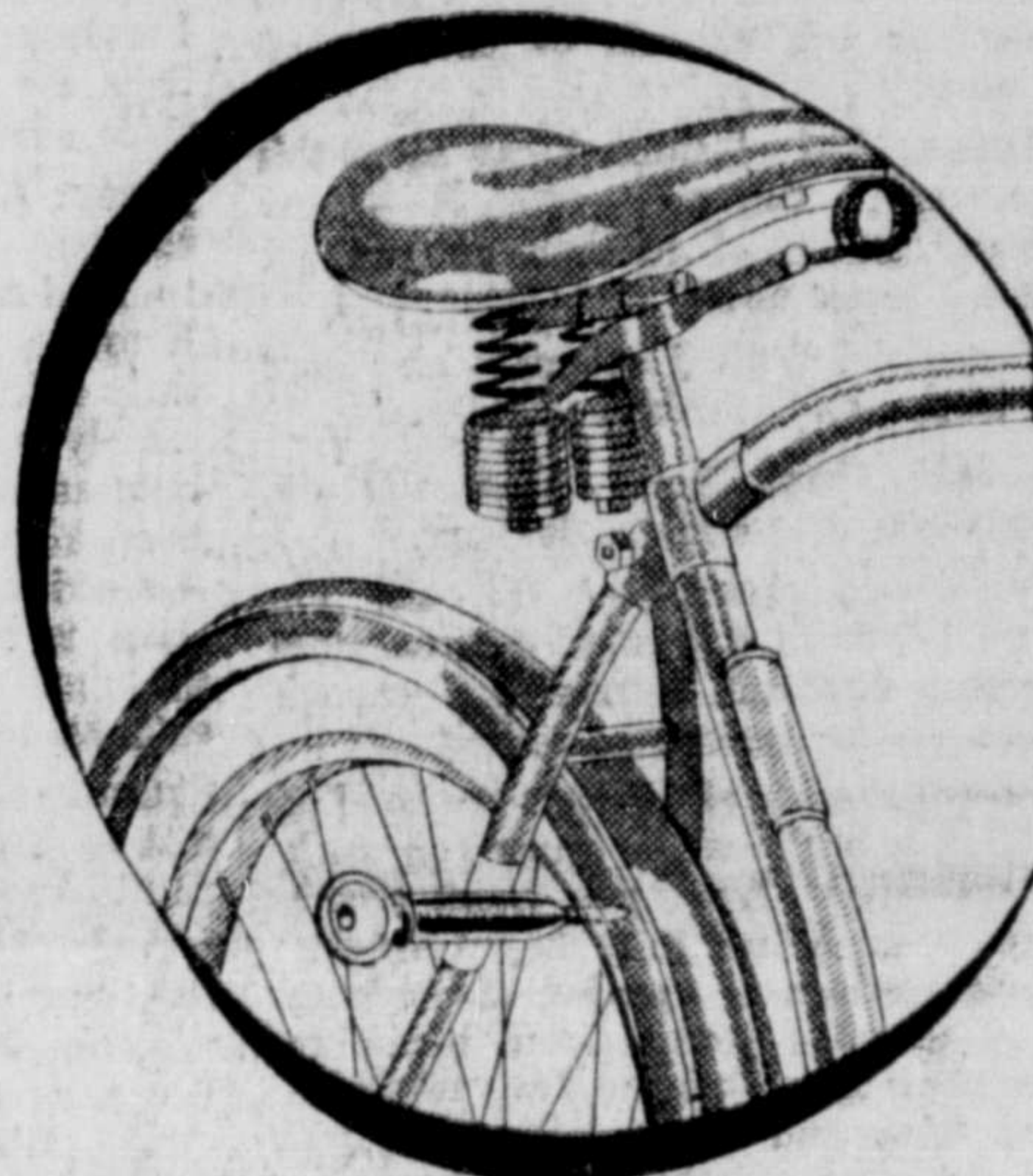

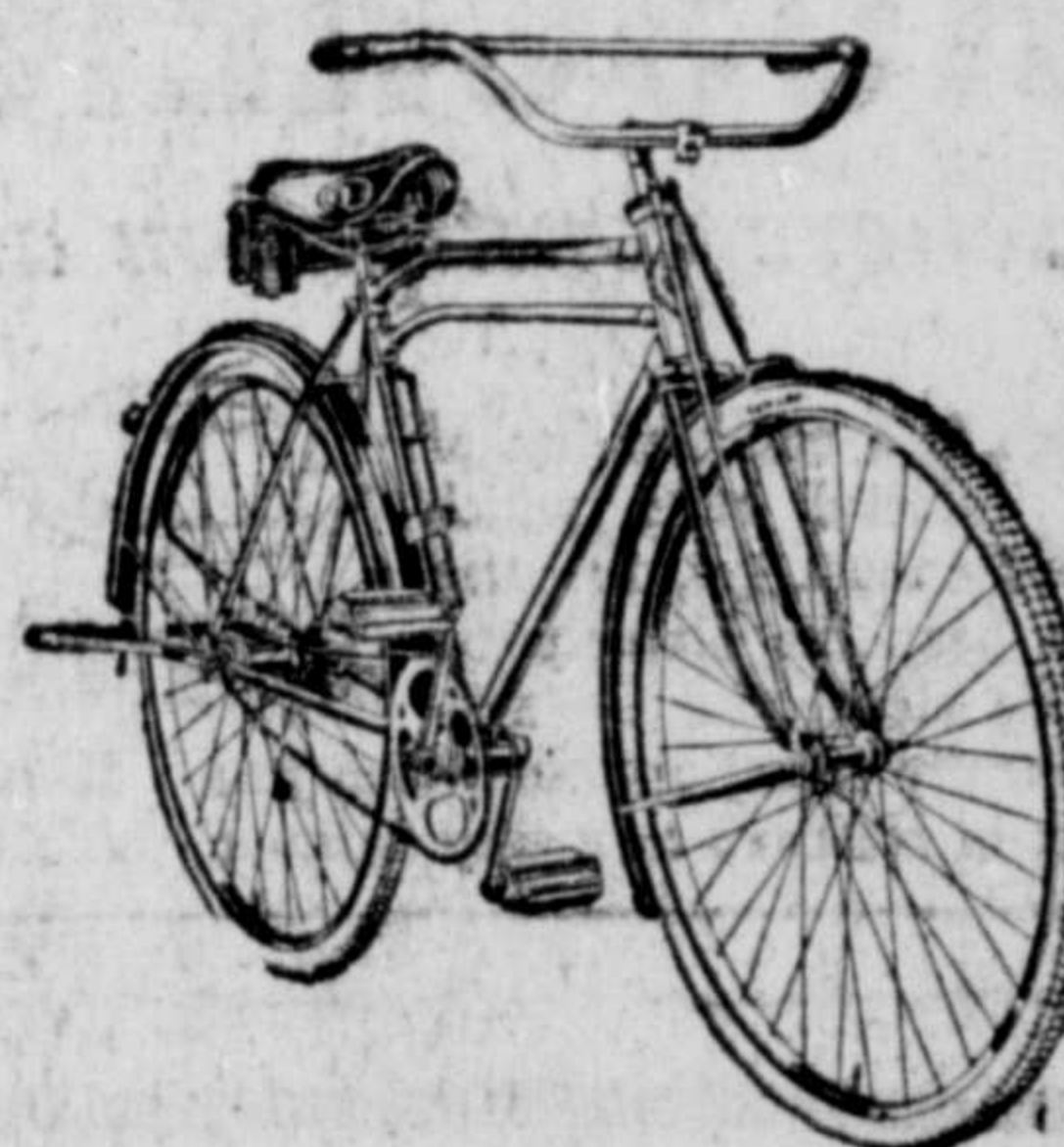

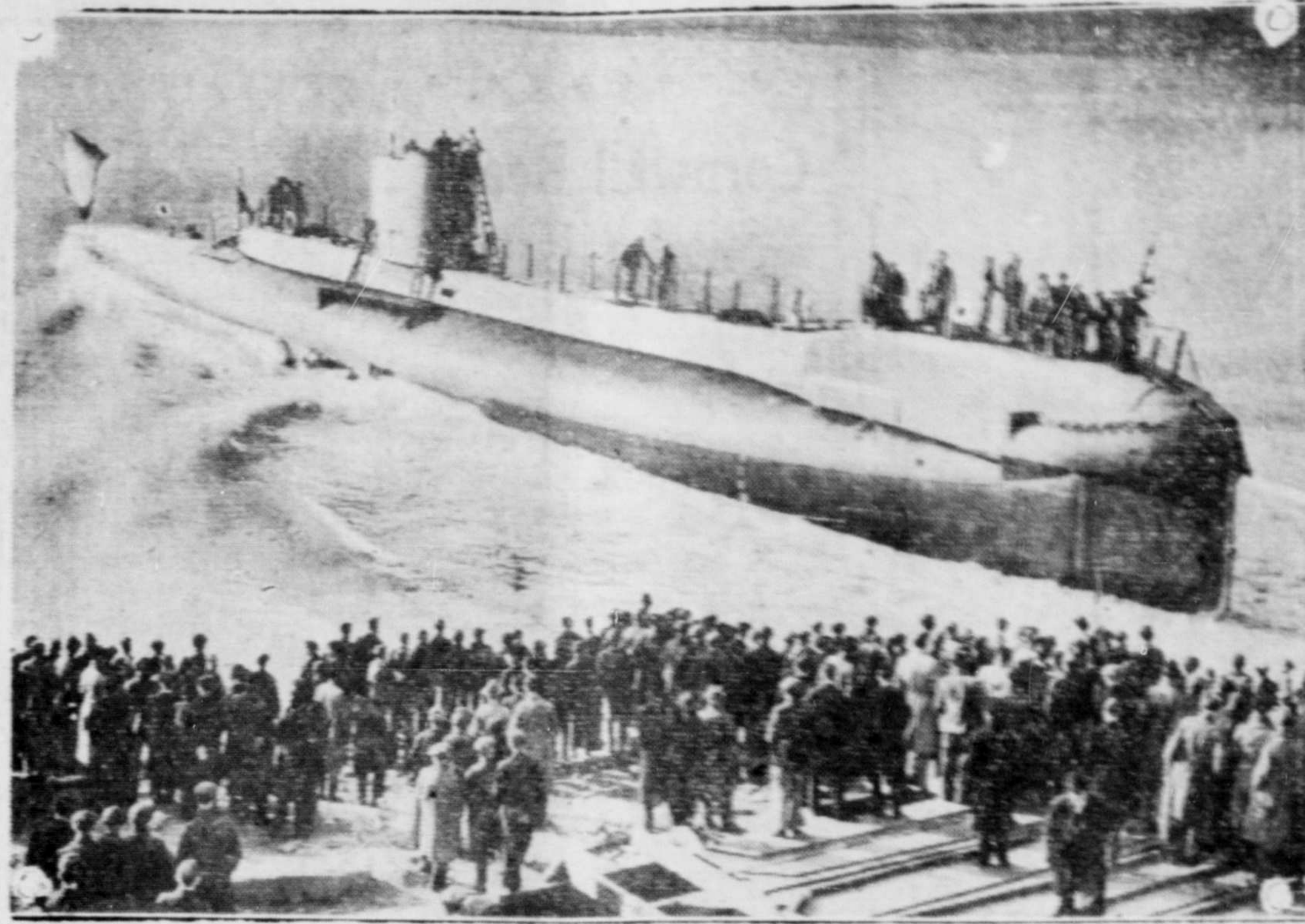

Stormy weather of the past week or so on the fishing grounds was reflected in the light catches landed by Prince Rupert halibut vessels yesterday. Some of the larger boats were not so much affected but the smaller boats, in some cases, were hardly able to do any fishing at all.

Union steamer Catala, Capt. James Findlay, returned to port at 9:15 this morning from Stewart, Anyox and other northern points and sailed at 1:30 p.m. for Vancouver and waypoints. The Catala is due at Butedale at 9:30 tonight.

Armour Salvage Co.'s service boat Pachena returned to port early this morning from Ketchikan, having made a trip there with Capt. Paul Armour and W. O. Fulton.

Owing to extremely rough weather over the week-end, the provincial police cruiser P.M.L.S. was unable to reach the point in Hudson Bay Passage, Dundas Island, where wreckage of the trolling boat of J. M. Jackson, elderly crab fisherman of Victory Cove, Warke Canal, is reported to have been found. It is now pretty well conceded, however, that Jackson, missing since last October, must have perished.

Aboard the steamer Princess Norah, which was in port yesterday afternoon southbound from Skagway to Vancouver on her final voyage of the season before going on the West Coast of Vancouver Island run, were forty-two passengers. Two persons disembarked from the vessel here while one boarded her at this port for the south.

Seattle had its heaviest day of halibut landings so far this season yesterday when a total of 480,000 pounds of fish arrived at the Puget Sound port. The list included several of the large western schooners. The average price was 7c per pound.

CHUCK STEAK WITH ONIONS

Place five or six medium onions in a shallow saucepan, cover and cook over a slow fire for 15 or 20 minutes until tender. Use no water or fat as the onions contain sufficient moisture. Heat a frying pan smoking hot and brown about 10 rounds of chuck steak quickly on both sides. Reduce heat and turn the meat frequently until it is cooked through. Season both steak and onions and serve the meat on a platter surrounded by the onions. Add butter if desired.

MOBILE EASTER DEBATE

Fixing of Date for Christian Feast Vexed Ancient Church

Easter was late this year but it might be eight days later and on various occasions in the present generation has gone the limit in lingering in the lap of spring. This moveable feast has a wide spread for its wanderings—anything from March 22 to April 25.

Nowadays, the annual festival observed throughout Christendom to commemorate the resurrection of Jesus Christ is marked on the Gregorian calendar for the first Sunday after the full moon following the vernal equinox—when the sun crosses the equator on its way north in the spring.

Unlike some Christian festivals there is no taint of paganism in Easter's origin but the controversy over the date of celebration is as old as Christianity itself. For many centuries the so-called eastern churches argued with the western on this question. The council of Nicaea in A.D. 325 tried to settle it but the vagaries of the sun and moon thwarted the well-intentioned efforts of the ecclesiastics by appearing at varied times in different longitudes.

Corrections to the Gregorian calendar in 1582 smoothed matters to some extent but it was not until 1752 that Great Britain and Ireland and British possessions got into step with other nations for Easter. Some of the eastern churches still ignore the Gregorian calendar in this respect and their Easter may fall either before or after the date kept by the majority of Christian countries.

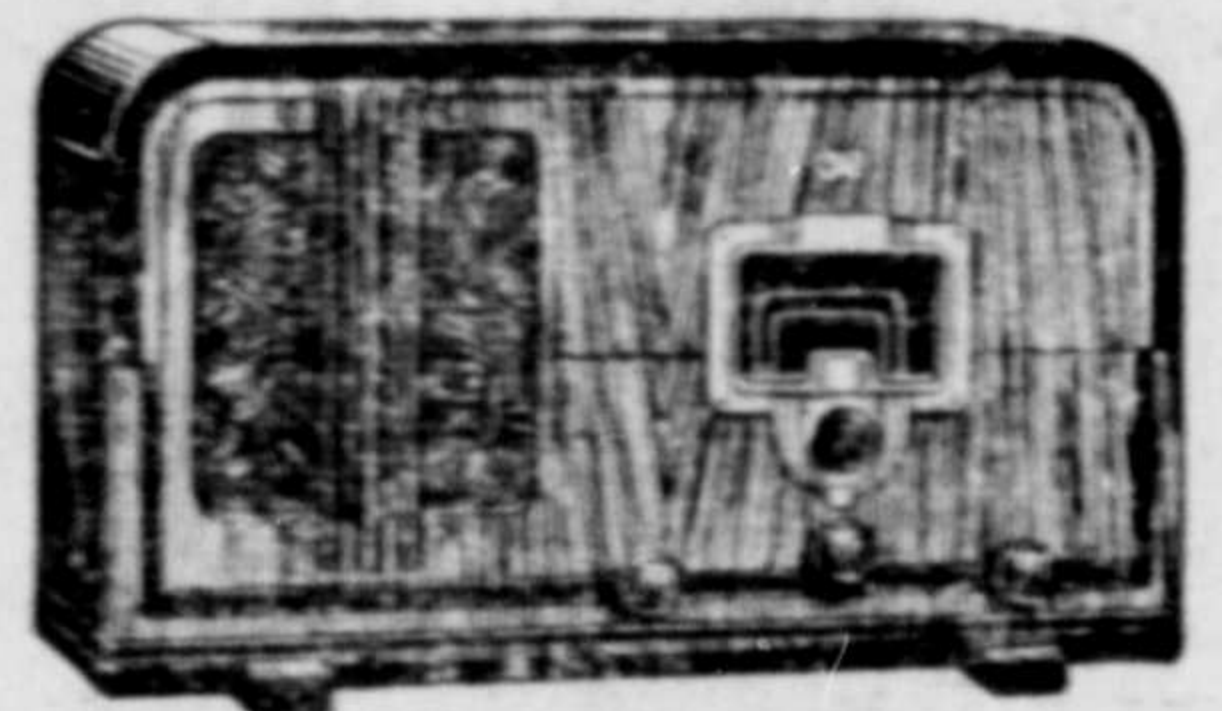
