Czech Tension Is Eased Somewhat

INSURGENTS ADVANCING

Rebels Take Villages East of Teruel—Several Killed in Madrid Bombardment

BARCELONA, May 23: (CP)—The insurgents are again on the advance in the Aragon front after a brief counter-offensive by the loyalists. Rebels have occupied several villages east of Teruel towards the Mediterranean coast.

At least twelve persons were killed in a bombardment of Madrid on Saturday.

POLICY IS APPROVED

Premier King Lauds British Government for Efforts Towards Peace and Goodwill

OTTAWA, May 23: (CP)—In view of the promise of Prime Minister William Lyon Mackenzie King that he will make a statement to Parliament this week on the government's foreign policy, particular interest was taken in an address made by Mr. King at a gathering Saturday night when he approved the endeavours of the British government to foster goodwill and peace among the nations. This attitude, Mr. King felt, had met with approval throughout the Empire as witnessed by the agreement which had been reached between the British government and Elre.

Wage Cut Would Impose Loss On Needy Workers

NEW YORK, May 23:—Union executives, in threatening a general strike of all organized labor in the United States should the American railways go ahead with their proposal to effect a fifteen percent wage cut, state that such a cut would involve a loss of millions of dollars by a class of people who had never been overpaid. The general opinion is that some sort of an agreement will be reached before the making of the fifteen percent cut results in a general strike being precipitated.

Italy Is Having Wheat Shortage

ROME, May 23: (CP)—A serious wheat shortage is developing in Italy owing to drought. The price has been advanced from \$1.94 to \$2.15 per bushel.

Ian Eisenhardt Is In Ontario

Setting Up Of Physical Education And Recreational Department There Being Considered

TORONTO, May 23: (CP)—Ian Eisenhardt, director of physical education and recreation for the Province of British Columbia, is in Toronto for consultation with the provincial government in regard to the setting up of a similar idea in Ontario. Before returning to British Columbia, he will also confer with Hon. Norman Rogers, federal minister of labor.

EDMONTON, May 23: (CP)—The newly appointed oil and gas board of the province of Alberta held its first meeting at the end of the week. One of its objectives will be the development of markets for Alberta oil.

SITDOWN CONTINUED

Single Workless Occupy Vancouver Lobbies Over Week-End—No Violence

VANCOUVER, May 23: (CP)—Single, jobless men of Vancouver, continuing their sitdown strike in demand for an "adequate works program," were still occupying the lobbies of the main Post Office and civic art gallery Saturday evening but had withdrawn from the Hotel Georgia.

In view of the situation, leaves of Royal Canadian Mounted Police officers had been cancelled and the city police was contemplating taking similar action.

Meantime the men continued quiet and orderly, co-operating in permitting business to proceed in the occupied buildings.

The three hundred men filed quietly out of the Hotel Georgia after the Vancouver city council had agreed to give \$500 to provide them with food and lodging over the week-end. They had occupied the building for twenty-seven hours.

There is hope that the federal government may soon take some action to relieve these single unemployed men who have been cut off relief.

Hon. George S. Pearson, minister of labor, reiterated that the province had no intention of providing relief for men who had just recently arrived in the province.

Hon. Norman Rogers, federal minister of labor, from Ottawa stated that no action would be taken there which would conflict with provincial policy.

Troops Still Facing Each Other On Frontiers But Leaders Of Two Opposing Elements Are Meeting

Possibility Seen of Differences Being Ironed Out Amicably—Both Sides Charge Each Other With Border Incidents

PRAHA, May 23: (CP)—With troops frowning at each other across the borders as heavy mobilizations on the frontiers continue, the atmosphere between Germany and Czecho-Slovakia over the Sudetan German minority question in Czecho-Slovakia continues tense although eased somewhat tonight as Conrad Henlein, leader of the autonomy seeking German minority, and Premier Milan Hodza met to make a preliminary effort to settle the whole dispute. There were no serious untoward incidents over the week-end as voting took place in certain municipal elections in Czecho-Slovakia which it was feared might lead to trouble. The German and Polish borders continued closed.

Archie Watt, for many years district master mechanic for Canadian National Railways with headquarters at Prince George, died at Chilliwack Sunday night. He had been in failing health for some time and last June retired on superannuation. He was well known in Prince Rupert, having come here with the first locomotives during Grand Trunk Pacific construction days. His passing will be widely regretted and sympathy will be extended to his widow and daughter, Evelyn. Mr. Watt was born March 5, 1873, at St. Louis, Quebec, and joined the service of the Grand Trunk Railway in July 1890 at Point Charles, Quebec, as engine wiper.

ONE ALIVE; OTHER DEAD

Mystery Surrounding Missing Man And Woman Cleared Up Over Week-end

The week-end brought solution of mystery attaching itself to the disappearance of two Prince Rupert people—a man and a woman. One is dead; the other, alive.

Charles Darwin Frech, 72-year old prospector, who had been missing from his cabin between Kalen and Billmor, about seven miles along the railway track from the city, for four days, was found dead on a nearby island. Having been ill, he evidently collapsed in the woods while on his way to town Tuesday morning and death is believed to have been from natural causes. Following report of the finding of the body by Tony Hinihica of Billmor who was out looking for his goat, the police boat P. M. 8 went out Sunday morning and brought the remains into the city, turning them over to the B. C. Undertakers. The body was found about 50 yards from deceased's cabin beside a trail.

Born in Dixon, Illinois, March 4, 1866, and a naturalized Canadian, Mr. Frech had been in this province for over forty years. He was a life-long prospector and had been in practically every mining area in the province including the Siocan and Portland Canal. He had been here for twenty-seven years. He was unmarried and there is no information as to relatives.

Mrs. Ida Hansen, missing from her home in Prince Rupert since a week ago Saturday night, was located Sunday afternoon in a bathing shelter beside a lagoon alongside the railway track at the west end of the city. She told a somewhat incoherent story of having trudged to Port Edward, about ten miles from the city. During the week she had had only four slices of bread, she said, on the strength of information received, police officers went out to the lagoon and brought her in to town. She was returned to her home and given medical attention.
