Decisive Gains For Republicans

BUDGET IS PRESENTED TO LEGISLATURE TODAY BY FINANCE MINISTER

Surplus is Estimated — Showing Last Year Was Better Than Expected—Relief for Municipalities Is Forecast

VICTORIA, November 9: (CP)—Hon. John Hart, minister of finance, told the Legislature today that he had budgeted for a surplus of \$55,184 on current account for the fiscal year beginning April 1 and that no taxation changes were contemplated pending the report of the Royal Commission on intergovernmental relations. The report, similar to last year's, which showed a surplus of \$80,182, does not make provision for unemployment relief expenditures or for making fund payments except to provide for certain inscribed stock in London.

Estimated revenue for next year placed at \$28,820,641 and expenditures at \$28,765,457. This is an increase of \$755,300 in revenues over the current year's estimates, and is an increase of \$89,218 in expenditures.

Last year, the minister of finance reported, there was a sufficient operating surplus to pay \$3,364,899 in relief costs and Mr. Hart said he expected a "material portion" of \$1,400 relief costs would be paid this year.

The fiscal year ended last March and the budget speech continued. The record volume of revenue returns on current account amounting to \$31,036,942, this being \$1,000,000 over the estimates.

The minister said that it was felt that a unanimous plea of all municipalities for readjustment of fiscal relations with the province cannot be made in anything but remedial measures being brought about to greatly reduce the burden falling on property owners.

For the last year surplus on operating account had totalled \$9,773,357 could now be announced, he said. As it was, he reported a reduction of \$2,082,568 in the fiscal net debt which now stands at \$149,080,089.

Reports from the field indicated that economic conditions were improving, said Mr. Hart, and the extent of unemployment should lessen as the extent of closing the year about due disparity from last year when relief costs were \$5,172,000.

Mr. Hart expressed hope that the Royal Commission report would show the province to the advantageous position it formerly occupied before the Dominion entered the Dominion income tax field.

Palestine Partition Plan Abandoned; Jewish And Arab Conference Is To Be Called

LONDON, November 9: (CP)—The British government has reversed its Palestine partition policy and will attempt to find an amicable settlement at a conference in London with Jews and Arabs.

In a statement issued concurrently with the report of a royal commission, the government announced it had reached the conclusion that "political, administrative and financial difficulties in the proposal to create independent Arab and Jewish states inside Parliament are so great that this solution (by partition) of the problem seems impracticable."

HANDICAP FISHERIES

New Regulations Would Work Hardship on Halibut Fleet So Protest Is Made

New Shipping Act regulations adopted at Ottawa which will greatly affect the local halibut fleet were the subject of discussion at the meeting of the Prince Rupert Chamber of Commerce Monday evening and the matter was left with a committee to investigate further. The fisheries committee had already taken action by writing the minister of transport, Hon. C. D. Howe.

The following letter has been sent to Mr. Howe by the fisheries committee:

"The local halibut fishermen are very much perturbed over a regulation connected with the new Canada Shipping Act which calls for vessels being equipped with hardwood lifeboats beginning in 1939 with vessels of 40 tons and over, the following year vessels of 25 tons and over and the year after that, vessels of 15 tons and over. They claim that it will seriously affect their operations for the reason that there is no room on their vessels for such a boat. The halibut vessels now carry one or more dories, according to their capacity, which are used both as work boats and life boats in case of need. These dories are so built that they fit snugly on the halibut vessels and can be nested where more than one is needed and the inside of the top one used for storing buoys, etc., used in fishing operations. As all deck space on halibut vessels is used for the carrying on of operations, the carrying of a lifeboat as now specified in the regulations would work a severe hardship on the fishermen. Such a lifeboat would appear superfluous as, in any event, the fishermen would need to carry dories. The fishermen have been using these dories for many, many years and they feel safer in them than in anything else and records will prove that loss of life through their use is very small indeed and will compare more than favorably with any other boat used for life saving purposes.

"In view of the situation, we would respectfully suggest that reconsideration be given this matter and the regulation cancelled insofar as it concerns halibut fishermen.

"We also understand that compulsory examination of fishing vessels is also to become effective. In regard to this, as the fishing season is very short and it is necessary for the vessels to work with precision in order to make enough money to carry over the winter, it would be advisable for an examiner to be located in Prince Rupert who would be available at any reasonable time.

United States Election Results Indicate Waning In Popularity Of Roosevelt's New Deal Policy

G.O.P. Gains in Agricultural Midwest and Such Industrial Sectors as New England, Michigan and Pennsylvania—Democrats Retain New York

NEW YORK, November 9: (CP)—Decisive Republican gains were shown in New England, industrial sectors such as Michigan and Pennsylvania and the agricultural Middle States in yesterday's elections in the United States. The Solid South remained Democratic despite the defection in some important quarters from President Roosevelt and the New Deal. Most notable strength for the New Deal was found in the Far West although results generally indicate its waning popularity. With a few exceptions, the results were to a large extent as had been anticipated by neutral political observers. Democrats retain control of the federal Senate and House of Representatives but mounting returns indicated the Republicans cutting sharply into their majorities.

The Democrats retain New York after an intense struggle but dropped governors in Pennsylvania, Michigan, Ohio, Kansas, Connecticut, Massachusetts and Rhode Island.

One of the most interesting individual fights was for the governorship of New York State in which Governor Herbert H. Lehman, who declared that he did not believe the issue was important enough to fight about. Since the colonies had not been justly taken away from Germany, he believed their return could be obtained by peaceful means.

GOV'T IS ASSAILED

Laborites and Liberals Criticize Chamberlain For Lack of Policy

LONDON, Nov. 9: (CP) Laborites and Liberals criticized Chamberlain yesterday in their attack upon the National government's program as indicated in the speech from the Throne at the opening of Parliament yesterday.

Clement Attlee, Labor leader, declared that the Throne Speech proposals failed to give any assurance that the government would preserve the rights of the nation at home or abroad. There was no clear-cut policy either on domestic or foreign affairs. The proposals were those of a "weary, tired and feeble government." The lack of any stiffening in policy was deplored.

Prime Minister Neville Chamberlain denied that the government program was "vague and indefinite."

ANTI-JEW MEASURES

Shooting in Paris of Embassy Official Results in Further Repressals in Germany

Expulsion of all foreign Jews from the Reich is being considered. Jewish children will not be permitted to attend schools and there will be further restrictions against Jews in business.

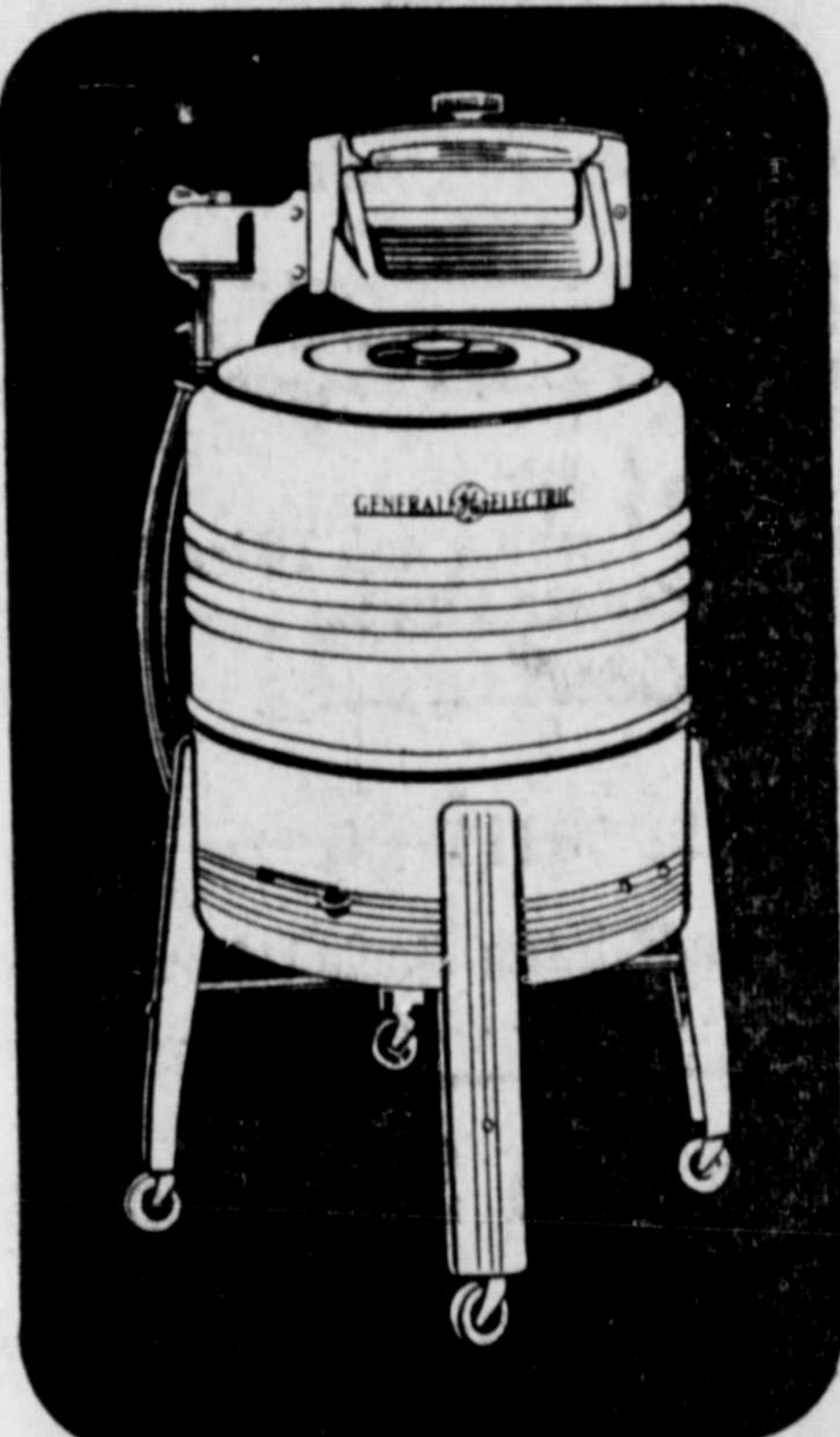
