AS FAR AS LETHBRIDGE LETHBRIDGE Is Revealed In First Of Memorandums Today

Total for Year is £102,000,000-Strength is Greatly Increased and Personnel is Correspondingly Greater

LONDON, March 2: (CP)-The Royal Air Force will cost the taxpayers the huge sum of £102,000,000 during the coming fiscal year. This represents an increase of £20,000,000 over last year and is a record total. It compares with £50,000,000 in 1936, £27,000,000 in 1935 and £17.000,000 in 1934. The Speech from the Throne referred to the general economic condition of the province as satisfactory, comparing more than favorably with other parts of the Dominion. Amendment of the Education Act was forecast. Twenty-three bills were introduced after the opening.

It just shows how far reaching is the effect of one man trying to make good by settling an old account.

THREE WEEKS IN ONE

In addition to being "Save the Vision Week" this is also "Traffic Safety Week" and with a good many it seems " as if it was "Pay Your Debts Week." That seems a terrible way to usher in the first week of spring but they are all good objects.

The Junior Chamber of Commerce is drawing special attention to traffic safety this week. It synchonizes with the beginning of the traffic year when the owners of cars purchase their new licenses. What seems yet more important is that they cross at right angles and avoid jay-walking. The street often seems clear when a person starts to cross but, by the time they are on the other side, half a dozen cars may pass. Jay walking is always dangerous. That may be why so many people do it.
