AT OCEANIC Jack White, Port Simpson Indian, Victim of Accident at Nearby Cannery Yesterday Afternoon

The provincial police boat left this morning for Oceanic to invesfatal shooting yesterday afternoon of Jack White, a Port Simpson Indian. According to telephonic advice received at divisional headi quarters of the provincial police which his body was later brought
