In summing up his impressions of Russia and the Communist movement, Mr. Lyons says: "The international Communist movement is soaked through and through with a fetid Machiavellism that lies to its own adherents and to the rest of the world. Prevarication becomes a lopsided virtue instead of a fault. The whole movement is committed to a theory of multiple truths, each diluted; and doctored for the palate and stomach of the recipient. This is the most enlightening of a number of books on Russia that have come to us. It is well written and, throughout the volume, the author makes an effort to be fair, giving the Soviet authorities the benefit of the doubt when doubt exists.




