Two Years For Howard Keefe

Sentence Passed in Theft Case Today-Defence Counsel is not Satisfied

Howard Keefe, aged 23, was sentenced by Judge W. E. Fisher in County Court this morning to two years' less one day imprisonment for theft from the person of Ben Kolmes, a fisherman, the offence having occurred on Comox Avenue. His Honor recommended that Keefe be sent to a Borstal Home. Application for a certificate of appeal was refused and T. W. Brown, defence counsel, stated today that it was the intention to take the case to the Court of Appeal.

Keefe had been convicted earlier in the week and was remanded for sentence. His counsel asked for immediate liberation of his client by sentencing him to the time he had already served or by suspending sentence. The judge, however, passed the two year sentence.

Mr. Brown, who expressed dissatisfaction with the conviction, applied for a certificate allowing appeal on mixed grounds of law and fact. On motion of crown counsel, who held that it was not a proper case for appeal, the judge refused the application. Mr. Brown claimed that he had at least four grounds in law for appeal.
