PROTEST TO JAPAN  
WASHINGTON, D.C.—The United States government has sent a strongly worded note to Japan demanding that it stop unprovoked interference with American rights in China, it was announced today.

**FIRST LORD NAMED**  
LONDON—The Earl of Stanhope, president of the Board of Education, was today appointed First Lord of the Admiralty in succession to Alfred Duff-Cooper, who resigned owing to differences with Premier Chamberlain over foreign policy.

**ALMA GLUCK DIES**  
NEW YORK—Alma Gluck Zimmelschlag, famous opera singer of former years, died today at the age of fifty-four years.

**ENGLEWOOD ACCIDENT**  
VICTORIA—Ernest Furlanitte was killed and four others injured yesterday in a collision between a speeder and a locomotive on the Englewood logging railroad near Alert Bay, provincial police headquarters were informed today.

**Moving Pictures Enjoy Freedom**  
NEW YORK, Oct. 27.—Will Hays, commissioner of the United States moving picture industry, said here today that American moving pictures reached their height because there had never been governmental interference with them. There had been no attempt, as in foreign countries, to use the movies for propaganda purposes.

**United States Is Big Navy**  
Adequate Protection by Aggression, President Roosevelt

**WASHINGTON, D. C., Oct. 27.**—(CP)—Speaking last night on the eve of Navy Day, President Franklin D. Roosevelt declared that United States naval power must be made adequate to maintain protection of the country against any aggressor.

**HOLLYWOOD, Oct. 27.**—(CP)—Burns suffered by Lyle Talbot, screen star, in saving Franklin Parker from Talbot's blazing home on Tuesday will not prevent his return to the screen in a few months, doctors state.

**SHANGHAI, Oct. 27.**—(CP)—Fighting was reported early today to have broken out southwest of Hankow as the Japanese army and navy forces "mopped up" following occupation of the former provisional capital. The fighting was of a sporadic guerilla character.

TORONTO, Oct. 27. (CP)—Sir Cedric Hardwicke will not be surprised if the human race becomes deaf and dumb in the next 30 or 40 years if it continues to receive entertainment through the microphone. **German Liner Deutschland Coming in Without Assistance Following Fire Nightmare**  
NEW YORK, Oct. 27. (CP)—Fire aboard the ship in perilous seas of the north Atlantic remain a nightmarish memory for 591 passengers and 392 members of the crew of the German liner Deutschland as the ship, with fire controlled, plods towards port here with No. 2 hold and other inner parts of the vessel charred. The steamer, which is westbound from Hamburg on a regular voyage, is coming in without assistance which was found by the captain to be unnecessary after frantic "S.O.S." calls had been at first sent out.

**PATTULLO WARNING**  
Any Infraction of Petroleum Board's Orders Will Result In Prosecution

**VICTORIA, Oct. 27.**—(CP)—Premier T. D. Pattullo warned the British Columbia public yesterday that any infringement of the Provincial Coal and Petroleum Board's orders would be followed by prosecution. He did not mention any specific form of violation but some interpreted it as a warning that, even if a continuation of the temporary injunction is granted to oil companies today by Mr. Justice A. M. Manson in Supreme Court at Vancouver against the reduction in gasoline prices, the government intends to enforce the order until the entire Fuel Act is declared ultra vires by the courts.

**MEANTIME IN VANCOUVER**  
VANCOUVER, Oct. 27. (CP)—Senator J. W. deB. Farris argued before Mr. Justice A. M. Manson today that "inherent rights" of British Columbia's major gasoline companies should not be "ruthlessly destroyed" by government-ordered retail price reduction before the validity of the provincial Coal and Petroleum Control Board Act could be tested in the courts.

**PLODDING TO PORT**  
German Liner Deutschland Coming in Without Assistance Following Fire Nightmare

**CHRISTIANS MUST BE READY TO MAKE SACRIFICES IF DEMOCRACY IS TO PREVAIL, ASSERTS CLERIC**  
Totalitarian principles as exemplified by the dictatorships of Mussolini in Fascist Italy, Hitler in Nazi Germany and Stalin in Communist Russia are incompatible with the principles of Christianity but, if Christians cannot live what they believe and are unwilling to make sacrifices for their principles, then they should stand out of the way and give the Communists or the Fascists a chance to solve the problems of the world.

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**Baby Brought To Hospital By Air Passes In South**  
VANCOUVER, Oct. 27. (CP)—Seven months old Martin Dahl, with whom Pilot Howard McDonald had made a mercy flight from Alert Bay on Tuesday, succumbed yesterday in hospital here to pneumonia and spinal meningitis. The child came from Port McNeill logging camp, accompanied by its mother.

**ARABS NOW IN FLIGHT**  
Major Drive Against Rebels By British Forces at Acre and Galilee

**JERUSALEM, Oct. 27.**—(CP)—Several thousand British troops are on the move towards the Acre and Galilee districts in a major drive against Arab rebels who are reported to be on the run, sabotaging lines of communication as they go.

**CLEARING GUN SITES**  
Contractors About to Move From This Side of Entrance of Harbor to Other

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**WAR WITH NO ALLIES**  
This is What Former Premier Lloyd George Fears As Result of Munich Pact

**LONDON, Oct. 27.**—(CP)—Former Prime Minister David Lloyd George yesterday broke his silence in regard to the Munich peace pact to warn Premier Neville Chamberlain that it would end in "war without friends" for Great Britain. Mr. Lloyd George made his grim prediction as Chamberlain and his cabinet met to review vital matters ranging from home defence to the cost in colonies to satisfy Germany. No decisions were announced.

**Missing Flier Is Being Brought Out**  
Will Require Couple of Days to Complete Rescue of Glenn Day in Alaska

**ANCHORAGE, Alaska, Oct. 27.**—(CP)—Rescue aircraft are expected to bring in by tomorrow Glenn Day, Spokane pilot, who was located by a search plane hiking down a canyon in the rugged Rainy Pass country after having been missing for nine days. His two-seater plane, in which he had been flying alone, apparently had cracked up. It was expected that it would take Day at least a couple of days to reach a spot where rescuers could land and pick him up.

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**Czechs Agree To Arbitrate**  
PRAGUE, Oct. 27. (CP)—The Czechoslovakian government, it was reported in well informed quarters last night, had agreed to comply with the Hungarian demand that the territorial dispute between the two nations be submitted to Germany and Italy for arbitration.

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**BIG WHEAT SHIPMENTS FOR COAST**  
Heavy Traffic From Alberta to Vancouver With Five Ships Loading for U.K.-Continent

**EDMONTON, Oct. 27.**—(CP)—Deliveries of wheat to Alberta elevators have reached a new all time high record of nineteen million bushels for so early in the season. Heavy shipments of grain are now being made to Vancouver where five deep sea vessels were yesterday reported to be ready to load 800,000 bushels for the United Kingdom or Continent.

**Forest Fires In Northern Alberta**  
Five Hundred Men Engaged In Fighting Flames North Of Edmonton

**EDMONTON, Oct. 27.**—(CP)—Five hundred men are fighting forest fires which are raging in the Mystery Lakes district of Northern Alberta. Thirty families have fled from their homes although no residences have been destroyed.

**Two Years For Howard Keefe**  
Sentence Passed in Theft Case Today—Defence Counsel is not Satisfied

**Howard Keefe, aged 23, was sentenced by Judge W. E. Fisher in County Court this morning to two years' less one day imprisonment for theft from the person of Ben Kolmes, a fisherman, the offence having occurred on Comox Avenue. His Honor recommended that Keefe be sent to a Borstal Home. Application for a certificate of appeal was refused and T. W. Brown, defence counsel, stated today that it was the intention to take the case to the Court of Appeal.**

**THROW OUT FOREIGNERS**  
Drastic Demand Is Made By One Of Japan's Lesser Political Parties

**TOKYO, Oct. 27.**—(CP)—One of Japan's lesser political parties yesterday passed a resolution demanding that all foreign powers relinquish their interests in Central China following the conquest by the Japanese.

### DON'T BE A SUCKER

Yesterday this paper told how two Canadian women won \$150,000 each on sweepstake tickets which cost them them only \$2.50 apiece. It sounds attractive but the chances of winning are so small that a person might easily buy tickets on every race for the rest of his life and yet not get near any of the money. The money goes away out of the country, if the agents are honest. If they are dishonest or incompetent, the money never gets there. The whole deal is illegal so it is impossible to avoid a swindle if any of the people who handle the money are dishonest. People are buying sweepstake tickets who need the money for other purposes and they get nothing for it and probably never will. They are attracted by the hope of getting rich quickly, so they keep on spending their money that way. If a person can afford the money and get a kick out of the gamble there is nothing to be said, but for people who need the money to take such long chances is decidedly foolish.

### IT WAS CLOSE RACE

The race between the two fishing schooners Bluenose and Gertrude L. Thebaud was very close this year. Up to yesterday each had won two races and the final went to the Canadian vessel. There were a number of days when there was not sufficient wind for a race and it was called off.

The boats are real fishing craft, one flying the Canadian flag and the other the American. They have raced on former occasions with varying results. Canadians, and particularly Nova Scotians, will be glad to see their own ship win the pennant.

### A BEWILDERD PEOPLE

Commenting on the wonderful reception given to the Chamberlain peace announcement in Britain, a writer in one of the leading American newspapers suggests that the British people were bewildered by defeatist propaganda and intimates that they should have been told that Britain, in conjunction with the American democracy, could dominate not only the seas but the world economy and on such foundations could build a guaranteed peace.

The writer criticizes a world peace based on increased armaments and then concludes:

"How democracy can recover from the blow it has sustained—rather from within than from aggressor nations—must turn on whether the British people can feel their strength once more and in conjunction with the United States take the initiative in planning a world settlement conference in such form that it will remove the menace of right by conquest and bring back to the world a regime of international justice and security for peace-loving nations."

**CHRISTIANS MUST BE READY TO MAKE SACRIFICES**

Christianity demanded that man think along his own lines, not that he become moulded along any certain line. The church maintained that man should be permitted to express himself along his own lines with freedom to express his own convictions.

In Russia Communism was just as totalitarian as was Fascism in Italy or Nazism in Germany. The Communist had a definite hatred and suspicion of religion. Karl Marx had at first admitted that religion had some social value but even he had later said that man had outgrown the necessity for religion. In the communistic state it was felt that man could stand upright, abolishing the regency of God. Forms and customs of religion were now held as clogs in the wheels of progress.

One trouble was that profession of religion had too often gone hand in hand with apparent evasions of religion. Indeed, the Russians might have had good reason to feel that way they did in view of their lack of emancipation. Members of the Communist Party might have some justification for their view that, had it not been for their agitation, there would never have been emancipation. In any event, there was always the purge, Siberia or, the firing squad for any person in Russia today who would stand out for spiritual against economic values.

"The surest road to ruin for any country is abandonment of religion," asserted the speaker.

If Jesus were to speak today the speaker believed He would advocate a clear distinction between the solidarity of state and personal freedom. Still believing that democracy was the only bulwark of freedom and liberty, He would say to answer revolution with revolution. He would say that, if Christians were not willing to pull in their belts for five years in pursuit of their ideals, then they were not as good as the Nazis, the Fascists of the Communists. If they could not live what they believed then they should stand out of the way and let the Communists or Fascists have a chance to accomplish what they failed to do.

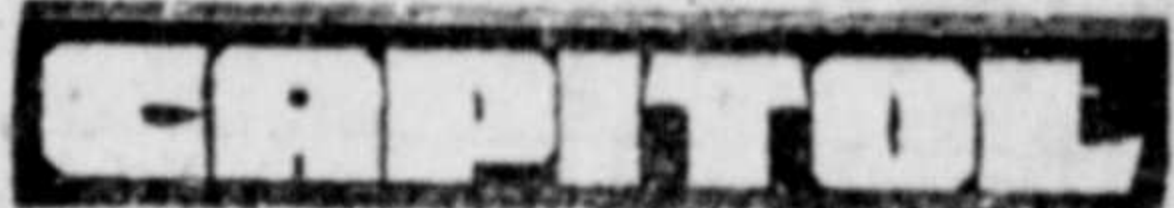
