F PRACTICAL EDUCATION Mussolini Suspicious of Hitler's Move—Bolsters Up Austrian Frontier-Quitting Spain

> LONDON, Feb. 8: (CP)- The diplomatic editor of Lord Beaverbrook's Daily Express wrote today that Premier Benito Mussolini of Italy has decided to bolster up his forces in the region of Brenner Pass between Austria and Italy because he fears events of the past weekend in Germany may presage a Nazi putsch in Austria.

It is added that Mussolini has decided to withdraw forty thousand Italian troops from Spain and to resume negotiations for + conclusion of improved relations with Great Britain.





Firestone Capitalized Interest-His Rise to Fame and Wealth

DETROIT, Feb. 8: (AP)-Interest manifested by the people of Detroit in a rubber-tired buggy, which he was demonstrating, convinced Harvey S. Firestone, who died in Florida Monday, of the dawning of a new industry.

That was in the early '90's. The noiseless feature of the vehicle at once appealed to all. Some with broadened vision of the possibilities of the new idea realized the shockabsorbing qualities of the rubber tire as compared with the steel band in general use on the wheels of all vehicles.

Up to the time of the demonstration, Mr. Firestone was concerned about the rubber tires principally as a means of selling more buggies, in which he then was engaged as sales manager. But it occurred to METLAKATLA tires on buggies was merely a forerunner of their use on wagons and other vehicles, and he decided to devote himself to tires.
