

FIRE SCENE

Two Most Serious Conflagrations Now At McBride and Quesnel

VANCOUVER, July 28.—(CP)— The most serious forest fires now burning in British Columbia appear to be those in the Beaver River area near McBride and in the Cariboo between Quesnel and Horsefly.

GRAIN BUSINESS SHIFTY

The port of Buffalo is much concerned over the loss of its grain business. It has twenty large elevators and four a of them have been almost out of business this past year, stromdahl, Chandler. less grain having passed through them than through them than through Prince Rupert's elevator. The cost of handling grain at Buffalo is said to have been the factor which caused the diversion to public elevators at Oswego and Brooklyn. The grain business at Buffalo has shrunk from 287,000,000 bushels in 1924 to 87,000,000 bushels last year. This may be partly due to Canadian crop failure and partly to the fact that the grain is now handled at Oswego.

FINE CO-OPERATION

Prince Rupert people in their efforts to increase the interest in gardening are receiving fine co-operation from the provincial government. Each year since the Horticultural Society inaugurated the annual flower show, the Department of Agriculture has sent an expert to the city for the special purpose of judging the show and the gardens. The announcement that Professor Buck of the University of British Columbia is being sent will be very satis-! factory to flower growers. He is an outstanding flower; expert and landscape gardener and will doubtless prove very helpful to those who are trying to beautify the city! by cultivating gardens.

CATS OR RATS?

In several Alberta towns ordinances have been passed providing for the belling of cats in order to save the migratory birds that pass that way. If the cats are kept only for show purposes and if there is no rat menace in those; towns the ordinance is all right but in Prince Rupert and all other seaport towns rats aften become a menace and cats are very useful to help keep down these vermin.

Cats in their natural state live on birds, mice and rats. In the process of catching the rats, some birds are bound to be sacrificed. The idea of the Alberta people is all right and there is no doubt that many homeless cast could be dispensed with, even in Prince Rupert. Yet we would not like to see the efficiency of the cats destroyed by any foolish measures such as those adopted on the prairies, unless some concerted movement was at the same time set on foot to destroy the rats by some other means than that at present adopted.

To prepare fruit, crush or grind about two quarts fully ripe berries. A. Pallant, Queen Charlotte City. Measure sugar and prepared fruit into large kettle, mix well, and James Boyes, city; M. L. Arthur, bring to a full rolling boil over hottest fire. Stir constantly before and while boiling. Boil hard one minute. Remove from fire and stir in bottled fruit pectin. Then stir and skim by turns for just five minutes to cool slightly, to prevent floating fruit. Pour quickly. Paraffin hot jam at once. Makes about ten six-ounce glasses.



Saskatchewan School Medical Officer Tells fo His Findings

SASKATOON, July 28 .- (CP) -Prevalence of goitre disease is greater among families who live in public school medical officer.

"We feel that its prevalence is due largely to the use of contamin ated water,," Dr. Binning said.

Investigation in one group showed that where there was running water no goitre was found. In another class where 54.1 per cent. running water was used 6.1 per cent. of the children had goitre. Tabulation of a third group in which 26.2 per cent, hauled water by barrels and allowed it to stand until required, showed 14.4 per hundred children suffered from the

disease. Incidence of goitre was found to be higher among Ukrainians., Russians, Netherlanders and Germans than among non-Central Europeans.


