# Four Mothers Will Divide Fortune

## Hospital Board Calling For Tenders For Construction Of New \$100,000 Modern Building

Having received the plans and specifications from the provincial architect at Victoria, the local hospital board decided last night to call for tenders for the proposed new \$100,000 hospital unit. Tenders will be returnable March 31 and will be opened shortly thereafter. Meanwhile, the finance committee will go into ways and means of raising money required for the project over and above the \$50,000 which has been pledged by the provincial government and the \$50,000 which the board has in its building extension fund. The intention appears to be to issue baby bonds secured by life insurance policies. Subscriptions from any firms or persons who felt disposed to make them will also be welcomed.

The plans, which were studied in some detail by the board last night, call for a three-storey L-shaped structure, of reinforced concrete, fireproof and fully modern throughout. The length, facing on Fifth Avenue immediately to the east of the present building, is 116 feet and the width at the greatest point eighty feet. There will be a ditch roof. The original capacity will be fifty-five beds but there will be space for expansion to seventy-five bed capacity.

The decision to call for tenders was made on motion of W. M. Brown, seconded by G. V. Wilkinson. Tenders will be invited through the local press and a Vancouver trade publication. Plans and specifications will be available here and in Victoria.

The question of financing was also discussed and finally was left to the finance committee to devise ways and means.

## Was Principal Business

The matter of the new hospital was the principal business taken up at last night's meeting which was the initial one of the 1938 board. Routine business included the receiving of the monthly report from Fire Chief H. T. Lock which stated the hospital and nurses' home were in good order from a fire protection standpoint.

Miss Jean Harrison R. N., lady superintendent, reported the hospital moderately busy at this time. Two spring air mattresses had been received from the Women's Auxiliary. Miss Harrison informed the board.

Mrs. H. L. Landry, reporting for the Women's Auxiliary, stated that the recent auxiliary dance had been a success, almost attaining its objective which was to clear \$100. For the house committee, Frank Dobb reported that some new beds had been purchased locally.

It was left to the grounds committee to see to the burning of brush left from the clearing of the new hospital site.

In regard to the recent ruling of the provincial government that it would not pay the per diem grant on indigent patients who had been in the hospital for over three hundred days without requiring active hospital treatment, the board was informed that already 31 days had been deducted from the account of one patient who had died.

## ENCOURAGE BUILDING

City Commissioner W. J. Alder To Endeavour to Create Interest Locally

The principal object of the trip to Vancouver next week of City Commissioner W. J. Alder will be to interview building loan companies with a view to having one of them interest itself in Prince Rupert by making money available for home building here under the new Dominion Housing Act.

The Dominion Housing Act is a measure something like the old Soldiers' Housing Scheme. The rate of interest is five per cent and twenty years allowed to repay. On the basis of a \$4000 loan, the repayment every six months on principal and interest would be \$158.53.

## WILL LOOK INTO CASES

Premier King Gives Assurance To Aberhart Re Powell and Unwin

OTTAWA, Feb. 12: (CP)—Speedy investigation of the cases of G. F. Powell, Social Credit expert from England, and H. J. Unwin, member of the Alberta Legislature for Edson, Social Credit party workers who have been sentenced to terms of imprisonment for defamatory libel, will be carried out by the remission branch of the Department of Justice. Prime Minister William Lyon Mackenzie King assured Premier William Aberhart of Alberta last night.

Meanwhile, the Alberta Legislature, voting 46 to one, passed a resolution asking for remission of the sentences. All Opposition members except Dr. Peter Campbell, Unity member for Lethbridge, absented themselves when the vote was taken on the grounds that a clemency resolution was not proper and not debatable in the Legislature.

The principal advantage is that it is a large expanse of completely sheltered water. It could also be completely shut off as far as surface craft is concerned to facilitate the operation of aircraft. A branch road could be built from the present island highway.

## SUGGESTS PACKING MEETING

G. V. Wilkinson Thinks Interest Of Hospital Association Should Be Better Protected

Expressing the opinion that, under the constitution as it stood at present, the interests of the Prince Rupert General Hospital Association were not sufficiently protected from such a movement as had been apparent at the recent annual general meeting of the Association whereby a group of people, by payment of a \$ membership fee each, had attempted to get together and seize control of hospital assets amounting to \$135,000 by electing a slate of directors the majority of whom had previously shown little, if any, interest in hospital affairs, G. V. Wilkinson gave notice at last night's meeting of the hospital board that he would offer a motion at the next general meeting of the Hospital Association to change the constitution whereby there would be six elected directors instead of five, three to be elected for two-year terms and three for one year, thereafter three being elected each year for two year terms. Such a method of electing directors, Mr. Wilkinson felt, would ensure continuity of policy.

W. M. Brown was not prepared to agree with criticism of any person showing a sudden interest in hospital affairs. He felt that all who paid their fees should be entitled to vote without question. He was, however, in favor of continuity of board policy and felt that it might be advisable to change the method of electing directors in such a way as suggested by Mr. Wilkinson.

In the course of discussion, it was suggested that some persons had voted at the annual meeting who were not the requisite 21 years of age.

Mr. Wilkinson will proceed with his notice of motion with which the board was, apparently, in sympathy.

OTTAWA, Feb. 12: (CP)—The King government emerged yesterday with a majority of ninety in the first test of strength of the present session. Liberals, behind the administration, smothered a want of confidence motion proposed by Conservative Leader R. B. Bennett by a vote of 132 to 42.

The vote in the House of Commons climaxed the debate on the Address from the Throne and cleared Parliamentary Decks for the legislative program. The debate had lasted ten days.

The Bennett motion criticized the government for lack of constructive policies to remedy distress conditions in the country.

## ATTENTION FOR NORTH

With Canadian Naval Strength Increased, There Will Be More Cruising in These Waters

There will be an increase in the amount of cruising in northern waters under new plans of the Department of National Defence, according to word which has been received from Olof Hanson, M. P. for Skeena, who is at present in Ottawa.

A letter received from Mr. Hanson announces that of the six destroyers which will shortly be in the Canadian naval service, including the two new ones which are to be purchased, four will be stationed on the Pacific Coast and two on the Atlantic. Also stationed on the Pacific will be two new mine sweepers in addition to the old Armentieres. This will make four destroyers and three mine sweepers on the Pacific.

A new classification in the Royal Canadian Naval Volunteer Reserve is to be created. It will be for the purpose of retaining contact with personnel who have received not less than six years training in the Royal Canadian Navy or one of its reserves and who, through civil occupation or residence, are unable to attend drills but who may be able to give some time to reserve matters. To such men it may be possible to give some training if members of the ordinary Royal Canadian Naval Volunteer Reserve are not available.

Mr. Hanson's letter also mentions the \$75,000 which is to be spent on the development of an air station at Prince Rupert and the \$75,000 to be expended on slipway facilities and quarters for an airplane base at Allford Bay, Queen Charlotte Islands.



### CONSIDERABLE SALARY

Recently we heard a few mild criticisms of British Columbia's Premier in accepting an increase in his salary bringing it to something like ten thousand dollars a year. Yet only a few weeks later the head of the United Mine Workers' Union in the United States, John L. Lewis, had his salary increased from twelve thousand five hundred dollars to twenty-five thousand dollars. That was a considerable jump considering it is provided by men who have to work very hard for a living. Possibly Mr. Lewis earns his money. At any rate he is taking it.

### LOSS TO PROVINCE

Just as Dr. Patterson, leader of the Conservatives in this province, was beginning to make his influence felt in the reorganization of his party, he is called by death and the work will have to be carried on by some other person. He was a man of known integrity of purpose. He was giving his services to the public without thought of the monetary loss to himself. Had he lived he might have been premier. With such high hopes for a useful future it is regrettable that he should have been cut off in so untimely a manner.

### FOLLY OF MANKIND

Most of us will agree with Prime Minister Neville Chamberlain of Great Britain when he said "The spectacle of this vast expenditure upon the means of destruction has inspired me with a feeling of revolt against the folly of mankind." It is folly indeed but the way out does not seem to be by means of letting others grow strong while we grow weak. When we are strong we are in a position to discuss disarmament with some hope of success.

### JUNIOR HIGH NEEDED

The announcement made yesterday by City Commissioner W. J. Alder that he planned to establish Junior High School at the opening of the next school term will be a welcome one to those who would like to see more technical instruction and that kind of education in which pupils are particularly interested and which will help in the kind of life they expect to lead. It is the modern method of education and must be adopted sooner or later. As was pointed out by the principal of the High School recently, there are already twenty-six cities in British Columbia that have junior high schools operating.

SYDNEY, Aust., Feb. 12: (CP)—English swimmers took two more titles in swimming at the British Empire Games here yesterday. Robert Leivers of England swam to championship in the 1650-yard free style to clip 17.2 seconds from the Empire record, narrowly defeating Bob Pirie of Toronto. England's women's team easily won the 330-yard medley relay. Percy Oliver won the 110-yard backstroke for Australia, defeating Gordon Kerr of Windsor, Ontario.

## Canada Wins Again

Canada gained one more championship today, one of the last thirteen decided on the last day of the Empire Games. 

## Waterfront Whiffs

Interest in Vitamins Revived—Australian Scientist Returning Home—Which Ice is Best

A revival of interest in vitamin research work is reported by Dr. Neal Carter, director of the Prince Rupert Fisheries Experimental Station, in view of the putting to commercial use this year by medicinal manufacturing firms of the viscera of halibut and cod. Halibut viscera, exclusive of liver, represents four per cent of the total weight of the fish and 55 per cent of the viscera is made up of intestines which is the portion of viscera being actually used. Black cod viscera represents five per cent of the total weight of the fish. The viscera will be handled in much the same way as is the fish liver and, as already announced, it has been decided by the boat owners to sell the viscera on the open market instead of contracting with any particular firm. Dr. H. N. Brocklesby and Dr. Leonard I. Pugsley of the Prince Rupert station staff are concentrating on vitamin work at present. Dr. Brocklesby is engaged more especially just now in an endeavour to ascertain the cause of and check a loss of vitamins during manufacture of vitamin oils from the liver and viscera. Dr. Pugsley is engaged in general vitamin work.

C. C. Kuchel, senior research student of the Council for Scientific and Industrial Research of the Australian government, after spending a few months studying methods at the Prince Rupert Fisheries experimental Station, will leave Prince Rupert on February 22 for San Francisco where he is to sail March 1 aboard the steamer Monterey on his return to his home in Adelaide, Australia. Before coming to Prince Rupert, Mr. Kuchel spent considerable time in Great Britain and Eastern Canada. One of the matters in which he has interested himself has been the making of a survey of the amount of salt used in the fisheries and other industries of British Columbia with the objective of obtaining a share of this market for a good solar salt which Australia produces.

Otto C. Young, research engineer of the Prince Rupert Fisheries Experimental Station staff, is at present looking into the perennial question of which ice is best in connection with the handling of fish—natural, glacier, green (newly made) or aged ice. There has long been differences of opinion among fishermen on this subject of ice. Mr. Young will make known his findings in an early progress report of the Fisheries Research Board of Canada.

A marine exhibit of more than usual interest was recently turned over to the Prince Rupert Fisheries Experimental Station by Squadron Leader T. F. Stevenson of the Royal Canadian Air Force and F. A. MacCallum, manager of the Prince Rupert branch of the Bank of Montreal. It was a perfectly formed unborn sea lion pup which was taken from a huge sea lioness which Messrs. Stevenson and MacCallum had shot in Prince Rupert Harbor. The unique specimen, which is quite a large baby and which in the normal course of events, it at present

being pickled at the Prince Rupert Fisheries Experimental Station prior to being turned over to the Prince Rupert Museum.

With Indian Agent W. E. Collison, Dominion Constable A. J. Watkinson and Engineer Tom Moorehouse on board, the Indian Department cruiser Naskeena left this morning for Vancouver where a new Vivian engine is to be installed in place of the present Standard motor.

Northland Transportation Co.'s motorship Norco was in port early this morning discharging two carloads of frozen fish for transshipment East over Canadian National Railways. From here the Norco continued her voyage to Vancouver.

Next week the program for children from 9 to 12 years will be in charge of Mrs. J. A. Barry, Mrs. Neal Carter and Eileen Hamblin.


