PROVINCE OF B. C. CONGRATULATES CONNAUGHT

LADY VOYAGER WILL TELL MANY READERS OF RUPERT

MISS ELLEN SCARBOROUGH, FOR LEADING LADIES' JOURNALS IN THE STATES, IS HERE RECORDING HER IMPRESSIONS AFTER TOURING THE WHOLE ALASKA COAST.

Traveling alone as she does with the independence of the true American girl, Miss Scarborough, who can still claim the English ancestry her name indicates, will remain for a little time in Rupert before returning to the headquarters of the great publications she represents.

RAPID PROGRESS WITH THE STEEL

Good Work Being Done Up River Between Present End of Steel and Hazelton—Tunnel at 44 Complete—Snow Hinders.

TEN YEARS WITH HAYS ON TRANSCONTINENTAL

A DECADE IN HISTORY OF THE PROGRESS OF THE GRAND TRUNK PACIFIC—SOME EPOCHS OF INTEREST AFFECTING THE LINE.

It is now approaching ten years since Charles M. Hays of the Grand Trunk Railway made the formal announcement that the company with which he was identified in Eastern Canada had been considering for some time and was prepared to go ahead with a project for the construction of a line from the east to the Pacific coast. The statement of Mr. Hays was made on November 24, 1902, and aroused deep interest, especially in the western provinces. The Canadian Gazette of the same year, December 20, contained the application of the company for a charter.

On March 27th, 1903, the house of commons received a petition asking for the incorporation of the company with a capital of \$75,000,000, with the following incorporators: Hon. George E. Cox, E. R. Wood, and Col. H. M. Pellat, of Toronto, Hon. William Gibson Beamsville, John R. Booth, Ottawa, Ian, H. B. Rainville, Quebec; C. M. Hays, Frank W. Morse and William Wainwright, Montreal, and John Bell of Belleville. The route proposed was from Quebec to Gravenhurst or North Bay, north of Lake Nepi-

gon, through or near Battleford, Edmonton and Dunvegan, through the Rocky Mountains to Port Simpson or Bute Inlet.

On July 14, 1903, Sir Wilfrid Laurier introduced his now famous act to provide for the construction of the railway and the assistance of the Government was pledged under a definite arrangement. Under this agreement the Government was to build the line from Moncton to Winnipeg, and a commission was appointed to have the supervision of this section in hand. The portion from Winnipeg to Prince Rupert was to be built by the Grand Trunk Pacific Company. Survey work was begun in the same year and the work of the surveyors and the construction companies and contractors has gone on steadily since that time. The cost of the work, owing to the extraordinary and unexpected increase in the cost of labor, has largely exceeded the original estimates, but it is conceded that the line will be operated at a very low cost and the savings from this source will within a comparatively short time compensate for the increase in the price.

THREE MATTERS OF IMPORTANCE

City Sewerage Problem, the Site for the Isolation Hospital, and the Attitude of the Press

DISCUSSED BY PROPERTY HOLDERS

City Engineer's Views on Sewer Problem—Medical Health Officer on the Isolation Site—Citizens are Anxious to Have Newspapers Boosters Rather Than Knockers—Daily News is Out to Boost the City

Amongst the questions of public interest discussed at the meeting of the Property Owners' Association of Prince Rupert, held last night in the Presbyterian Church hall, were the following: "The situation of the proposed isolation hospital."

"The attitude of the local press during the coming year."

"The trunk sewer problem before the city."

On these subjects there was considerable discussion, and the views of men in a position to give opinion of weight were heard by the assembly. On the isolation hospital matter Dr. J. O. Reddie, medical health officer for the city, spoke. He pointed out the need that now exists and grows more urgent for the establishment of such a building, and explained that an isolation hospital is not as is commonly wrongly supposed a menace to its district, but a safeguard. Isolated as the building is, it prevents the spread of

contagious disease by keeping the patients apart from the healthy citizens. The site chosen is well retired, at the far end of McBride street, across Hays Creek, and by properly fencing the building and keeping its grounds private in the recognized way no prejudicial effects could possibly accrue to the neighborhood. The ground for the site is city owned freehold property. An isolation hospital is a necessity in Prince Rupert to deal with cases of smallpox, diphtheria, etc., which may come in at any time by boat or from the surrounding districts, however healthy the city itself may be.

On the attitude of the press during the ensuing year, Mr. J. Roerig of The Daily News said, on behalf of his paper, that the attitude of The Daily News would be that of a good booster for the city. Nothing calculated to knock Prince Rupert or to convey the impression outside that Prince Rupert is a poor place to live and do business in would be

published by The News. Mr. Roerig agreed in his address that harmful effects had resulted from the knocking of the city by its own press in the past.

The question of sewerage was introduced by Mr. E. Flexman, secretary of the association. He emphasized the importance of the early securing by the city of better sanitary conditions. Laterals as well as trunk sewers were needed.

To this portion of the discussion Col. Davis, city engineer, contributed practical opinion. It was his view that trunk sewers should be paid for by the citizens at large, and that the laterals should be put in as required by local improvement taxation. For laterals a minimum diameter of eight inches was recommended by Col. Davis, who added that already twelve drainage areas have been mapped out for the city, though these have not yet been surveyed.

POISONING MYSTERY DISCOVERED IN CHICAGO

Mrs. Louise Vermilya Suspected of a Series of Crimes---Bodies of Supposed Victims Exhumed by Order of the Police

The picture is that of Mrs. Louise Vermilya and her son by her first marriage. His body has been exhumed and it is being examined for poison. Miss Elizabeth Nolan, who was engaged to marry the son, has made an affidavit in which she mentions the name of Undertaker Charles C. Boyson and declares that Mrs. Vermilya named him as having paid premiums on certain life insurance policies. The body of Richard T. Smith, who died in Mrs. Vermilya's house after a short, mysterious illness, has also been exhumed for analysis.

SHOULD BE AWAKE TO OPPORTUNITIES.

Pioneer Brynildsen's statement in yesterday's News that the people of Bella Coola desired to trade with Prince Rupert instead of Victoria created quite a ripple of public interest. It is to be hoped that its swell had its due effect upon the members of the Board of Trade, for it is to that august body the public looks with confidence for a careful and considerate handling of such matters.

Bella Coola does seem away to the south of us, but if one of its pioneer merchants comes here and distinctly says, as he does, that he believes it would be to his commercial advantage to deal with this port rather than with that of Victoria, his suggestion that Prince Rupert might readily capture all the trade of that section is certainly worthy of the close consideration of the representative merchants who have seats in the Board of Trade. Furthermore, as Bella Coola sends here for aid in obtaining a better mail service it shows that she recognizes this as the metropolis of Northern British Columbia and has confidence in the political power of Prince Rupert to render her a signal public service. In this regard the representations of the Board of Trade on such a subject would have as much and probably more weight with the Government than the representations of a purely political body.

It is hoped the Board of Trade will take timely action on this matter of better mail facilities for Bella Coola. It would only be a neighborly act in any case, but if it should result in bringing here the trade of Bella Coola so much more to the credit of our Board of Trade.

Bella Coola, from all accounts, is likely to be no inconsequential port. And there is another point to the south, but much nearer, that is likely to become an important port and an important tributary to the trade of Prince Rupert. This is Kitimat, once spoken of as the terminus for the Grand Trunk Pacific before Kaien Island was selected, and since scarcely heard of. The Grand Trunk is about to resume work on the Omineca branch, running due south from Copper River to Kitimat, and make the latter the port for the shipment of coal to the outside and minerals to the smelters. This will create another trade tributary to Prince Rupert, about the securing of which the Board of Trade might profitably busy itself.

A MAN WHO MADE GOOD AS RUPERT MEN ARE DOING

BUSINESS MEN IN THE FIGHTING LINE OF TRADE IN THIS CITY AND UP RIVER WILL READ THIS WITH INTEREST IN THE LIGHT OF PERSONAL EXPERIENCE.

Five years ago a young man arrived in Winnipeg with a return ticket in his pocket to a little obscure town in Nova Scotia and \$3 in cash, and after three days of tramping the streets of Winnipeg secured a job in one of the leading wholesale houses in the city as assistant shipping clerk at a salary of \$15 per week. During the course of his duties in this capacity it was necessary for him to address boxes of merchandise to western points, and in the course of a year he was familiar with the names of all the small western towns where the company had customers. The next six months was spent in the packing department, where the same names were before him and in addition to this was the bill of goods bought by the customer. From this department he was transferred to the general office. The final page in the history of his old friends, the company's customers in the west, was here revealed to him, this being their manner of making payment and buying goods on time.

Got Good and Busy.

Precisely two years from the date of his arrival in Winnipeg (this young man left for the west with \$100 in his purse, a full fledged business man, or at least in possession of the knowledge of how goods might be obtained with a small amount of capital, which had been unconsciously taught to him by his last employer, the large wholesale house. He went to a small western town which had not been invaded by the railway as yet, but where the grade was surveyed, and he had the distinction of being the fourth man in the town and the owner of the third tent which comprised it. He did not hesitate to tell his comrades that he was a merchant of some experience and that he intended to open up in his tent roofed house a general stor. Using a fictitious name

for reasons only known to himself, he wrote a letter to his former employers couched with the necessary information that he knew would be looked upon favorably by them and asked them for a credit of \$800.

Made Good All Round.

In due course of time the goods came to the nearest shipping point to the unnamed town and were freighted to their destination. Six months passed and the graders passed his store, followed closely by the steel laying gang, and three times during this period he sent for another bill of goods, having paid up his previous accounts on each new order, the last order amounting to \$1,800. Two miles beyond the town the railroad decided to make their depot. The original owner of the site where the store was located sold the homestead to the now prosperous storekeeper for \$1,000 cash and invested it in town lots in the new townsite.

Railway Came to Him.

In the meantime a round house was built in the railway company's town, but the water proved damaging to the engines and as conditions for better water farther ahead looked bad it was decided by the railroad to look the other way for relief. Finding the necessary water in the old town, they made a flattering offer for the homestead, but the former Winnipeg clerk politely refused, but offered the company the south half of the quarter section (which by the way is cut in two by the railway) free of charge if they would consent to build their depot on his half. This they did last spring, and the town is known under the fictitious name of the enterprising merchant, an opera house and a livery barn and feed store share the same fate, and \$17,000 worth of goods were shipped to the town last year by the former employers of the clerk, all of which was received by him under an assumed name.

A wounded bull moose will sometimes turn on his pursuer and his charge is as dangerous as that of an African buffalo.

Night hunting is now generally prohibited. In the mating season the bulls will respond to an imitation of the female's call, which is produced upon a birch bark horn. The perfect use of this call is possible only with long and persistent practice, but most guides have the knack, and will employ it for the benefit of their patrons.

Still-hunting is the more legitimate method of killing a moose. It is difficult, because a moose is as keen of eye and scent as a deer, and much more suspicious of danger. Once alarmed it is

British Columbia is rapidly becoming the sportsman's game resort

British Columbia is recognized as the principal hunting grounds for moose, and sportsmen are being attracted in larger numbers each year. In the eastern provinces some good shooting can still be had in New Brunswick, and Ontario has also furnished some very fine specimens. In Manitoba a few good shots can still be obtained, but it is to British Columbia that the sportsmen are now looking, for it is here that practically all other specimens of big game common to the latitude abound in large numbers. The hunter is given a wider range and greater latitude as to season.

The big railways that cut through the province will bring you to moose country, or by sailing up the coast various places for good sport are known, and with a good guide you can be landed at just the right spot. Success in a hunting trip depends mainly upon securing a good guide and a proper outfit. The hunter must be dressed to withstand possible cold weather. Plenty of heavy under flannels should be provided, with outer

WHY TEETH DECAY

If You Know This It Will Help You to Avoid the Dentist.

In the fight against any disease the battle is half won when we know the germ that produces the disease and how it does it. If parents knew just what carries or decays of the teeth is, none of them would neglect taking precautions to prevent it in the mouths of their children as well as in their own.

Caries is produced by certain bacteria or germs in the mouth. If there is an unclean spot on a tooth these bacteria are able to stick there. Once on the tooth they become covered by a gelatinous or mucoid covering, the bacteria and their covering being called a "plaque." Under the protection of this covering they act on carbohydrate foods, such as starch and sugar, and produce an acid. This acid produced right against the tooth at this point forms a small cavity.

Every cavity begins in this way. The idea that some teeth are "soft" and so doomed to decay is not correct. Neither is it the acid in the saliva that produces decay. If it were strong enough to do so what would it do to the cheeks and tongue? No tooth, whatever its structure, will decay if kept absolutely clean.

If some persons have more cavities than others it is only because there is something in the form of the teeth or the nature of the saliva that tends to uncleanliness of the tooth surface. In addition, as the acid which produces decay is formed from starch and sugar, an excess of these foods in the diet may be the cause.

THREE MILLION MERGER

Great Gas Combination Formed in the East.

A \$3,000,000 merger of oil and gas companies operating in the counties of Kent, Essex and Lambton, has been effected. The merger will be known as the Union Natural Gas Company of Canada, Limited, and a charter has already been granted by the Provincial Secretary. The new Company will take over the business and franchises of three smaller companies—the Volcanic Oil & Gas Company, Limited; the United Fuel Supply Company, Limited, and the Ridgetown Fuel Supply Company, Limited.

To Remove Grease.

Grease spots may be taken out of anything by mixing benzine, alcohol and ether in equal parts. Apply with a sponge (patting the spot), put a piece of blotting paper on each side and iron with a very hot iron; this causes the grease to be absorbed by the blotting paper.

To Prevent Colors from Fading.

Dissolve one ounce of sugar of lead in one bucket of water. Put the dress in the water and let it stay there about two hours; then wring it out and let it dry before washing. For black muslins, if you want them starched, make the starch with coffee water; this prevents any whitish appearance.

To Prevent Muslins from Fading.

Put three gills of common salt into four quarts of water and put the dresses in while the water is hot and leave them there till cool. This will in most cases stay the colors.

Cleaning Silver.

Never put a particle of soap on your silver, if you want it to retain its natural lustre. When it wants polish, take a piece of soft leather and whiting, and rub hard. A silver merchant once told me that it runs silver to put it in soap suds, as it makes it look like pewter.

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JOHNSON AND FLYNN SIGN UP FOR BOUT FOR CHAMPIONSHIP

Chicago, Jan. 19.—Jack Johnson, world's champion fighter, and Jim Flynn of Pueblo, Colo., the "white hope," tonight signed articles for a finish fight. The bout is to take place on or about Monday, July 22, within two hours' railroad ride from Salt Lake City, Utah, in Nevada.

Johnson is to get \$20,000, \$1,000 training expenses and one-third of the receipts of the motion pictures. Besides the pictures of the fight Johnson will also receive the lion's share of the "training camp" pictures, for which Chicago promoters have already made a bid. The total net receipts to the champion, he expects, will be more than \$100,000. The fight is for the world's championship. Five-ounce gloves are to be used and soft bandages allowed. A referee is to be mutually agreed upon. Johnson has expressed a preference for "Jack" Welch of San Francisco, but is willing to accept any "good man." Both men prefer a westerner. The battle will be under straight Marquis of Queensbury rules. Tim Sullivan of New York was agreed upon as stakeholder and forfeits of \$20,000 are to be in his hands on February 16. Of this sum Jack Curley, the Chicago promoter, who brought the men together, is to put up \$10,000 and the fighters \$5,000 each.

Should any of the parties forfeit his deposit by default, the money will be divided between the two others. Johnson is to appear in Salt Lake City one month before the fight and is to train at "The Lagoon," a mountain retreat near that city. Curley selected the quarters and Johnson consented after being told that a good track for automobile speeding is handy.

Johnson agreed not to engage in motor racing before the fight. He also agreed, with Flynn, that neither should agree to engage in any contest after May 1, 1912, without the written consent of Curley and the other fighter. The articles provide that the match shall be held during the month of July, 1912, the exact date to be decided later, and Johnson to be so notified before May 1.

Curley selected July 22 as the tentative date, subject to change, but expressed the opinion that it would stand. He figured that the Elks' convention will be held in Portland, Ore., July 15, and many of them could make it conven-

ent to be in Nevada on the date chosen. Besides, Mormon Day will be held in Salt Lake City July 24, and that occasion will draw many thousands of visitors. The champion then suggested his birthday, March 30, as a suitable date. This, he said, would get the match out of the way so he could arrange to box Sam McVey in Paris in June. This match will be for twenty rounds, in the Motordrome, probably during June. Johnson said all arrangements have been made for this fight. The Paris bout may be postponed if it interferes with the one in the United States.

Before negotiations began Johnson made a speech to the newspapermen, saying he was hurt at hints that the fight might not be on the square and said he would declare it off if such a suspicion existed. He added that he had fought too hard for his honors and did not intend to lose them by entering into agreements for fake bouts. He added significantly that two years ago he had a chance to "make a big clean-up," but that he is in the game "on the square" and not for money alone. Flynn had very little to say. He joked with Johnson about "taking up the whole page for his signature," and then the two big fighters showed each other their diamonds and jewelry. The best feeling was manifested by both.

MORE CASH FOR CHURCH

Only One-Third of the People Help Missions.

Two-thirds of the church members of Canada, it is stated, are not now regular contributors to missions, and it is the aim of the Canadian Council of the Laymen's Missionary Movement to endeavor, as their main object for the immediate future, to get these persons into the ranks of regular contributors.

Rev. Dr. R. P. MacKay, general secretary of Presbyterian Foreign Missions and moderator of the general assembly, was chosen chairman of the committee of policy to plan the work for the future of the movement.

THURSDAY'S EXPLOSION

City Engineer Davis and Mayor Newton to Go Into the Matter. Report Ready for the Colonel from His Staff.

Regarding the dynamite explosion which resulted in damage to plate glass and minor injuries to passersby on Sixth street, the City Engineer had an interview with the Mayor. A report on the circumstances of the explosion was ready for Col. Davis when he returned from Woodworth. It is evident that the accident was due to the irregularity in strength of rock to resist a shot, which caused a charge similar to the one successfully shot previously in the same place to blow out.
