"I discovered that Soviet Russia is the grandest fraud of history. I learned that there is still nothing mightier in the world than truth. But I am as convinced as ever that there is another road to a free and classless humanity, a road which is worth the quest and which can be found only by minds liberated from the worship of false gods and by spirits strong enough to face the truth in the quest for the truth."


