Two Dictators Are In Conference

Railway Transportation Safest Method Of Travel; Canada Lines Are Defended By Local Official

Have Been Responsible For Development of Country and Creation of Wealth—Canadian National Has Not Been Given Credit it Deserves

"Railway transportation is today and always has been the safest method of travel," declared W. H. Tobey, C. N. R. divisional superintendent, in an interesting address before the Junior Section of the Prince Rupert Chamber of Commerce at its regular monthly dinner meeting last night. "Vital statistics conclusively prove that a person is far safer travelling by passenger train today than he is in his own home. With the modern air-conditioned passenger equipment, containing every comfort in furnishings, ventilation, heating and dining facilities together with the great reduction in fares, there is no question concerning the greater ease, comfort, convenience, speed, safety and ultimate economy in travelling by rail, particularly over the longer distances."

The great problem of the railways on this continent today, said Mr. Tobey, was competition with other forms of transportation such as was found on the highways, the rivers and oceans and in the air. The competitive forms of transport were free from very severe restrictions and regulations which were imposed upon the railways. These various types of transportation developing without interference or restriction since the railways had become established, threatened to sap the life blood of the railways. These other types of transport were quite a necessary, economical and desirable adjunct to the railways but they should be confined to their proper sphere of activity. The various governments now appeared to be slowly realizing the seriousness of the situation and through enabling legislation for the railways and restrictive legislation against competitors, were gradually bringing all the various forms of transportation near to a state of equilibrium and stability.

A great deal was heard, said Mr. Tobey, of Canada being "over railroaded." Critics pointed out that, on a population basis, Canada had the lowest figure of population per mile of railway in the world. "Tell me," went on the speaker, "how can a country go through a development period without a low population per mile of railway? If population per mile were required to justify the building of a railway, how many miles of railways would there be in Canada today? The railway must precede population and development.

Statistics of population per mile tell nothing of the usefulness of a railway. The real test of a railway is the use that is made of it. Measured on the basis of transportation performed per capita, Canada and the United States stand on an equal footing at the head of all the railways in the world. This is simply another way of saying that per capita wealth production in Canada is high and that, in wealth production, the railways play an important part.

The history of the development of capital wealth in Canada parallels the growth in railways but at a much greater rate. Historically, for every dollar of railway capital invested, Canada has increased her capital wealth twelve dollars.

Inasmuch as scientific planning was not a part of the railway building in Canada, there was, of necessity, some duplication of railway lines but, on the whole, the mileage which could be considered unnecessary because of duplication was much less than might be expected. Generally speaking,

CLAIMS ARE CHECKED ON

Neutral Observers Endeavouring To Confirm Exact State Of Affairs in Shantung

SHANGHAI, May 4: (CP)—Neutral observers are endeavoring to confirm the claims of the Chinese that the Japanese campaign in south Shantung Province is on the verge of collapse. That the Japanese have suffered heavy reverses is conceded but whether these have been as complete as claimed is a question that has not been entirely confirmed.

Today a general Chinese offensive all along the south Shantung front was declared by the Chinese command to have smashed through the centre of Japanese lines at Talerchwang and to have advanced twelve miles.

JR. CHAMBER IN SESSION

Committee Reports and Correspondence Among Matters Dealt With at Meeting Last Night

With an address by W. H. Tobey, C. N. R. divisional superintendent on the subject of "Railways" at the feature of the evening's proceedings, the Junior Section of the Prince Rupert Chamber of Commerce held its regular monthly dinner meeting last night in the Commodore Cafe. President J. C. Gilker was in the chair and guests, besides Mr. Tobey, were Stanley Saville and Allan D. Vance. Business, largely of a routine nature, included the reading of correspondence and the receiving of committee reports.

The executive brought before the meeting the condition of an open sewer originating on English Hill and branching off from McBride Street towards Cow Bay. It was proposed to take up the matter with the civic authorities but, after some discussion, no action was taken. It was suggested that there were other places in the city where sewage and drainage conditions were none too good.

There were communications from Olof Hanson M. P. in regard to fish traps and Japanese immigration. As for the fish traps, Mr. Hanson stated that nothing could be done this year as the licences had already been granted. Personally, he was opposed to fish traps and had made his opposition known at Ottawa. In regard to Japanese immigration, the government had taken the view that it would be inadvisable, in view of present unsettled international conditions, to introduce legislation that would prove offensive. However, he (Mr. Hanson) was personally in sympathy with the proposal to impose a ban on such immigration.

A communication was read from the Prince Rupert Retail Merchants' Association expressing support of the move to impress upon the civic authorities the necessity and importance of having the road from Sixth Avenue on the east bank of Hays Creek completed through to the fishermen's floes including the crossing of the railway tracks. This will be taken up again with City Commissioner W. J. Alder.

William Bremner reported on the recent "Clean Up Week" campaign, outlining what had been done including the disseminating of propaganda. There had been co-operation with the city in this matter.

The Junior Chamber decided to sponsor a "Klondyke Night" this Saturday in the Prince Rupert Club, the affair to be in the nature of a farewell to Jack Roaf who is about to leave the city for Vancouver. Max Asemissen is co-ordinator of the affair.

TAX RATE SET

In his capacity as a city council, City Commissioner W. J. Alder was in session this morning and set the tax rate for the year at fifty mills, the same as last year. The division of the rate is: general, 10.4 mills; schools, 17.6; money debts, 22. Another meeting will be held tomorrow to finally reconsider and adopt the rate.

PACT NEGOTIATED

OTTAWA—A new trade treaty between Canada and Eire (the former Irish Free State) has been signed and will come into effect in ten days. Under the pact, there are similar favorable tariff relations such as were recently closed between England and Eire.

POLICE TO CARRY ON

OTTAWA—The Dominion government yesterday declined to comply with a request of the Alberta government to terminate the arrangement with the Royal Canadian Mounted Police for the policing of the province. Hon. Ernest Lapointe, minister of justice, stated that the present agreement did not expire until 1940 and the federal government did not intend to terminate it until that time.

CROP OUTLOOK FINE

CALGARY—Three days of rainfall in Saskatchewan and Alberta have made 1938 crop prospects this spring the best for any year since 1928 when there was a bumper harvest. In some of the drought areas there has been as much as an inch of rain and ground moisture conditions throughout the prairies are now reported to be excellent.

FIGHT IN TORONTO

TORONTO—The next fight of Tommy Farr, British Empire heavyweight champion and former contender for the world's title, will be an all Empire affair. Farr's opponent will be Maurice Strickland of New Zealand and the bout will take place in Toronto in June or July. Farr's British Empire heavyweight crown will be at stake.

WORKLESS DEFIANT

CALGARY—Despite twelve arrests yesterday and warnings against further demonstrations, Calgary unemployed are planning another mass parade for this afternoon.

TERRACE—Death of Felix Chassin de Kergommeaux at the age of 76 from the effects of asthma took place Saturday at 10 p.m. at his son John's home in Terrace.

ANOTHER GOLD RUSH

NEW WESTMINSTER—A gold rush started near Point Roberts, 24 miles south of here by road, when road workers obtained mining licences and began staking claims just north of the international boundary line. The "rush" started when a workman noticed yellow particles in a shovelful of gravel. A sample brought here was described as "probably gold."

NANAIMO—Allan M. Davies of Prince Rupert was yesterday elected Grand Master of the Grand Black Chapter of the Orange Order in British Columbia at the thirty-fourth annual sessions here.

Colonies Discussed

Der Fuehrer is Doing Most Of Talking With Duce Listening

ROME, May 4: (CP)—Five hundred thousand people packed the route between the railway station and the Quirinal Palace, where Der Fuehrer is staying, on the arrival yesterday of Chancellor Adolff Hitler of Germany for his visit to Italy. The attitude of the crowds was described by observers as one of "polite enthusiasm." In addition to Premier Benito Mussolini, King Victor Emmanuel also took part personally in the welcome to the German chancellor.

The chief note of the official welcome was that friendly relations between Italy and Germany were as strong as ever although the belief of neutral political observers is that the Rome-Berlin axis may not be as stable as before since it was not so essential to Italy following the negotiation of friendly agreements with Great Britain and France.

Meantime, the British and French authorities follow with much interest the development of relations between the two dictators.

Colonies Discussed

The two dictators, in private conversations today, discussed the question of colonies. An informed source told the Associated Press that their exchange had dealt entirely with the colonial question Hitler doing most of the talking and Mussolini listening.

CAHAN BILL DEAD ISSUE

Looks Like Nothing More Will Be Done This Year About Privy Council Appeals

OTTAWA, May 4: (CP)—Appeals to the judicial committee of the Privy Council will not be abolished at the present session of Parliament, it was learned today. Unless the Cahan bill calling for the abolition of such appeals is discussed again in private members' bills committee, nothing more will be heard of it this session.

## Modern Schools Emphasize Value Of Sound Health

CHARLOTTETOWN, May 4. (CP)—Rapid extension of public services was one of the "outstanding social phenomena of our age," said Chief Superintendent H. H. Shaw in the annual report of the Department of Education tabled in the Prince Edward Island Legislature.

"Our educational system as one of the major public services has expanded in response to the increasing needs of the school population and has augmented its traditional offerings with a variety of services that now extend beyond the boundaries of the schools' original functions.

"Health education in particular has received increased attention, due in part to the discovery of the large proportion of young men failing to meet the requirements of physical development for enlistment in the Great War and to the recognition of the social necessity of insuring the maintenance of the well-being of every child and of providing equal opportunity of development in accordance with the democratic ideal.

"Modern education now places real emphasis on the development of sound mental and physical health. This is particularly noticeable in the modern curricula of European countries and this year a great demonstration of physical and gymnastic exercises is being featured at Prague in Czecho-Slovakia in the Sokel Demonstration which is held every six years."

The development of physical training in the schools of Prince Edward Island was chiefly due to the aid given by the Strathcona Trust, "which provides an instructor in physical exercises for all teachers in training and only those who are awarded the Grade B certificate in this work are eligible for a teacher's license."

## GARDEN 'NOTEBOOK

Don't forget to stake perennials. Just as soon as they get high enough for the wind to catch them they are liable to be injured. A few days ago I saw a clump of delphiniums badly injured by a gust of wind. They have to be staked eventually, why not now?

One of the surest of the spring flowers is the auricula, a member of the primrose family with fleshy foliage and coming in a variety of colors. John Mitchell has the best showing of these I have seen this year. They are earlier than mine and larger. No person can make a

frost and most winters are hard on aubretia. Many of the sedums and saxifrages do well and so do catnip, the trailing phloxes, the primulas, the thymes, veronicas, violas and rock pinks. As the rockeries are apt to be rather blocked out by fall it is a good plan to plant some bunches of lobelia or some other low growing annuals in the rockery.

The number of Russell lupins being raised in Prince Rupert gives some idea how up to date many of the local gardeners are. Jack Fuller has about one hundred planted

mistake in growing these for spring bloom. They will stand frost that will kill primroses or polyanthus. With roots exposed and with all sorts of ill-usage, they still seem to come through the winters.

A square deal for flowers means a square meal occasionally. Plants must be fed to obtain best results but they must not be over fed. Evidently a moderate diet is best for men and plants.

Possibly we shall know more about treating moss on lawns after this season. Frank Dibb had some bad patches of moss in his lawn and he has raked all the moss out and then applied slaked lime. Also he has cut down trees that shaded the worst corner of his place.

Rock plants are quite a problem at Prince Rupert. Some of the best of them will not stand the winter. Sun rose is apt to be killed out by

out in the garden. Walter Longwill has very close to half a hundred and Bob Yates has forty-five out of fifty seeds. Many people have small numbers and one or two have been waiting to plant their seeds out of doors. Next year the Russell lupin should be quite common in Prince Rupert.

The new slug killer "Meta" is for sale in the city. I bought a packet Saturday. The marketing of this product is said to be in the hands of H. O. Crew, formerly of this city. If it proves effective it will be a great thing for Prince Rupert gardens for slugs are a terrible pest. I have not yet seen any this year but they usually get most destructive about June or July, and sometimes in August if it is a wet season.

Although it looked as if aubretia was all killed during the past winter the fatalities are not as great as
