IMPORTANT MINING DEAL ON THE Q. C. ISLANDS

PORT SIMPSON RAILWAY TO START UP IN APRIL

CHIEF DUDOWARD HAS RECEIVED OFFICIAL BLUE PRINT OF PLANS—INDIAN RESERVE LAND ON RIGHT OF WAY SOLD AT \$70 PER ACRE.

Chief Dudoward and his people at Port Simpson are deeply interested at present in the projected railway between Prince Rupert and Port Simpson, the surveys for which were entirely completed early last summer. In terms of the charter granted the company to operate the line, construction must be begun by April 1st of this year, and the Indians expect to see the work well started by then. Meanwhile Chief Dudoward, who is entirely responsible for the management and administration of his settlement, is in receipt of the latest officially authorized blue print from Ottawa, showing the location of the line along the harbor of Prince Rupert and via

Tucks Inlet to Georgetown and Simpson by the coast.

Of this right of way some 160 acres in a strip 100 feet wide is the property of Chief Dudoward's people, and they are to part with this strip to the railway company for the sum of \$70 per acre. They fully realize the importance to Port Simpson of the advent of the railway.

In Prince Rupert the idea of the line to Simpson has always been looked forward to. Port Simpson makes an ideal holiday spot out of Rupert. Its scenery and situation are such as to make a trip there a pleasant change, and as Prince Rupert grows there can be no doubt that Port Simpson will grow greatly, too, in importance both for business and recreation.

NEW BUOYS FOR RUPERT

G. S. Quadra in Port Over Week-End with Additional Aid to Navigation for Waters Along Coast.

During the week-end the D. G. Quadra reached port with two new buoys on board for points adjacent to Prince Rupert harbor. In command of the Quadra was Captain McPherson, this being his last visit to the port in his new position. The Quadra lay at the wharf over Sunday, and a number of citizens took an interest in the large buoy on board which is to be placed at Hudson reef, near Big Bay. The buoy formerly there broke away and is now tethered inshore at Big Bay awaiting repairs, which will be effected by the Quadra's crew. The new buoy, which weighs eleven tons and is the largest type of buoy at present used on this coast, has a bell attachment to give warning to navigators. A smaller bell buoy with mechanically operated bell is also on board the Quadra and will be placed in position at Charles point, Digby Island, at once.

Probably the buoy which broke loose from Hudson reef will be the first subject for the repair work now rapidly approaching completion at Digby Island. Lights, beacons and other aids to navigation requiring attention will all be visited by the Quadra on this trip before her return south.

BRITISH SHIP WAS HELD UP

Italians, Pursuing War by Sea with Vigor, Bombarded Fort on Red Sea and Seized Turks from Under British Flag.

(Canadian Press Despatch.) London, Jan. 22.—According to a despatch received from Constantinople, an Italian vessel today bombarded Akaba, a fortified village on the Red Sea. A further despatch says that the Italian gunboat Voltura held up the British ship Africa last night. Italian officers went aboard the Africa and removed from her twelve Turkish officers, including Col. Riza Bey, a famous Yemen veteran.

PRINCE RUPERT CHURCH MET TORONTO CHALLENGE

GRATIFYING RESULT THAT BAPTIST CONGREGATION NOW OWN THEIR LOTS FOR CHURCH SITE FREE OF DEBT MADE KNOWN BY REV. McLEOD LAST NIGHT

Prince Rupert Baptists are well pleased today over the gratifying announcement made at the service in McIntyre Hall yesterday by Rev. W. H. McLeod that they have now secured their lots for the site of their new church absolutely debt free. The manner in which the end was achieved is interesting. A challenge was received by the congregation, especially the young men's brotherhood, from the Dovercourt Road Baptist Church, Toronto, to the effect that the young people of that church would race them, dollar for dollar, in raising each the half price of the lots for the church site. Rev. Mr. McLeod took up the challenge and with his congregation got busy. Meanwhile, the Toronto Church got busy, too. Last night the pastor was able to announce that, thanks to the efforts of his congregation, the brotherhood and their friends in Vancouver and Vic-

toria, with the gift from the British Columbia Mission Board, he has now placed in the hands of the trustees cash and good pledges to meet the challenge of the Dovercourt Road Church, Toronto.

In that church, too, there has been substantial effort on their part, and with the generous aid of Mr. S. D. Moore, who promised the young people of the church that he would furnish two dollars to every one they raise in the challenge scheme, the amount representing half of the price of the lots is ready.

The lots are Nos. 43 and 44, block 3, section 6, on Fifth avenue, two blocks from McBride street and opposite J. A. Kirkpatrick's residence. Their price was \$4,500 when they were secured for the church by the personal pledge of the pastor in September. They are now worth a good deal more.

BUSY WHARF SUNDAY

Rail and Ship Traffic Swelled the Throng of Citizens.

Both the steamer Camosun and the Van Arsdol train blew their whistles together yesterday afternoon, and train and boat together poured forth their streams of traffic upon the G. T. P. wharf. It was a brisk scene during the time the traffic was passing. The Camosun pulled out again at 6 p. m. with passengers and mail for the south.

Millions Starving.
Washington, Jan. 22.—(Special.)—Two and a half million persons are facing starvation in China, according to advices received today at the headquarters of the Red Cross Society here.

POWERS AND THE ORIENT

Refusal to Allow Demands of Chinese Republicans That Throne Should Now Abdicate.

(Canadian Press Despatch.)

Peking, Jan. 22.—It is now declared that the foreign powers will not permit the demands of the Chinese republicans that the throne should abdicate and surrender. This decision is owing to the lapse of time that must ensue before the northern provinces could be brought under government control and the exposure of the inhabitants there to lawless soldiers and bandits.

PROVINCIAL ASSESSORSHIP

Appointment to Replace Mr. Cuthbert Not Yet Announced.

Under the Civil Service Act the position of Provincial Assessor for the district, to be vacated by Mr. Arthur Cuthbert at the end of this month, will be filled by the transfer of an assessor from some other district. So far the name of the new assessor has not been announced, but he will arrive in about a week.

BRILLIANT BOOST FOR PRINCE PUPERT IN EAST

NAME OF OUR CITY EMBLAZONED IN LETTERS OF FIRE BEFORE TORONTO AUDIENCE ALREADY WELL POSTED IN LOCAL PROGRESS BY ENERGETIC PASTOR.

In connection with the church challenge scheme, the result of which is announced elsewhere, some splendid publicity work was done for Prince Rupert. Members of the Dovercourt Road Baptist Church, Toronto, who take a keen interest in western church work, got intensely interested in Prince Rupert through the challenge scheme. Every week Rev. Mr. McLeod had a point of sending to Dovercourt Road accounts of the progress of development in all directions of Prince Rupert, with picture postcards to illustrate his letters.

In Toronto every week the progress of the challenge scheme was announced before crowded audiences, and with the aid of the stereopticon throwing the pictures of Prince Rupert on the screen, Mr. McLeod's letters were

read. The other day the Dovercourt Road Church realized their end of the challenge and the announcement of the result was made the occasion of a brilliant boost for Prince Rupert.

Twelve of the prettiest young women of the Dovercourt Road Church congregation announced each the amount realized by a section of the young people of the church in the challenge. Each young lady had one of the letters of the name Prince Rupert, and the finale of the announcement was made with the lights in the hall lowered. At a given signal the choir sang "Send Forth Thy Light," and the same instant saw every letter illuminated by electricity, the name "Prince Rupert" blazing forth brilliantly before the big crowd in the darkened hall.

COAST PORT FOR HUDSON'S BAY

Railroad Surveyed From Fort Fraser Through the Chilcotin and Bella Coola Valleys

BELLA COOLA MAY BE PACIFIC TERMINUS

Prince Rupert Board of Trade Will at Its Coming Meeting Take Action for the Securing of Better Mail Facilities and Steamer Transportation, and for Securing the Trade of This Prosperous District

"Certainly the Board of Trade will take up the matter of better mail facilities for Bella Coola," said President A. J. Morris this morning, "and we are much obliged to The News for drawing public attention to the matter. There will be a meeting of the board within the next ten days and I shall have pleasure in bringing the subject forward."

"Bella Coola is one of the best agricultural valleys in the north. It has been settled for seventeen years and during that time has progressed wonderfully. Its trade is worth going after."

"I look for Bella Coola to rapidly grow to a port of some importance. The English syndicate which has acquired a good deal of the land on the waterfront has

also surveyed a railway line running from Bella Coola along the Chilcotin valley to Fort Fraser, upon which work is to begin immediately. It is rumored that this line is to be a part of the railway from Hudson's Bay and that Bella Coola is to be the Pacific terminus of that great enterprise."

"Personally, I think the Federal Government has treated these settlers very badly. They are justly entitled to as good a mail service and steamer transportation as any point on the coast."

"The situation is this: Prince Rupert is the land registry office for the whole of this district, including Bella Coola. To do official business those people have

to come to Prince Rupert. They are getting a northbound mail, but the return mail has to go via Vancouver. This is simply ridiculous."

"Representations on the subject have been constantly made to the Federal Government during the last two years to give these pioneers a southbound service. The Board of Trade has twice taken action in the matter, but so far without result. These people look to us for assistance and as they are willing and desirous of giving us their trade we ought to and shall do all that is possible to relieve the situation. The trade of Bella Coola means a great deal to Prince Rupert."

PORTLAND CANAL MINE TO START UP AGAIN

Most Important Merger of Mine Interests With Sir Donald Mann's Mines is Now Announced

Definite promise of a most important merger of mining interests in the Portland Canal district is forecasted in the latest issue of the Portland Canal Miner. It is stated on the authority of General Manager W. J. Elmendorf of the Portland Canal Company, who is at present at Stewart, that the Portland Canal

mine is to start up work again soon. "It is quite true," said Mr. Elmendorf, "that negotiations are being successfully carried out with a view to a merger of the company's property with the Chilcote-Jumbo-Ben Bolt groups, owned by Sir Donald D. Mann. Of course I am not at liberty to divulge the details, as these will

be submitted to the adjourned annual general meeting of my company on March 20th at Victoria," he said in reply to an enquiry regarding the proposed merger. "I can, however, state that an early resumption is on the tapis, as it is felt by all interested that there is no need to let the mine lay idle."

BRITISH SHIPS AND PANAMA

Grand Trunk Chairman's View of Possible U. S. Preference.

(Canadian Press Despatch.) London, Jan. 20.—Although the question was discussed with a number of shipowners recently as to whether British trade would be likely to suffer from the giving of preferential rates to American vessels passing through the Panama Canal when that matter is not at present, at all great waterway is opened, the events, looked upon in a serious light.

Alfred Waldron Smithers, chairman of the Grand Trunk Railway of Canada, said that he could not imagine that anything could prevent English shipowners from successfully competing with the rest of the world, as they have done in the past, even if Americans received preference.

AVERT TARIFF WAR

Strenuous Efforts Being Made by Russian Interests.

London, Jan. 20.—Many powerful interests, says an Odessa despatch to the Standard, are working to avert a tariff war with the United States. An increasing number of Russian chambers of commerce and merchants' guilds are formally protesting against the attempt of the Octoberists to pass a bill in the Douma raising the customs duties on American goods.

MORE FOR PORT ARTHUR

Canadian Terminal for G. N. and Shops Will Be Built There.

(Canadian Press Despatch.) Port Arthur, Jan. 20.—Acting for the Hill interests, a party of English capitalists have just closed a deal whereby the Great Northern Railway secures 900 acres of land at Port Arthur. It is stated on reliable authority that the land is to be used partly for the terminals of the Hill lines when they are carried into Port Arthur, and that the Canadian shops of the Hill lines will be built there, costing several million dollars. The announcement is made that the route for a line from Port Arthur to Winnipeg has already been selected. Work on this will start as soon as the plans fully mature.

PRESIDENT WAS AMONG KILLED

Illinois Central Express Crashes Into Private Car, Instantly Killing President of Road and Two Officials of Rock Island Road.

(Special to The News.)

Kimmunday, Ill., Jan. 22.—James T. Harahan, former president of the Illinois Central Railroad; F. O. Meleher, vice president of the Rock Island Railway, and E. E. Wright, solicitor for the Rock Island, were killed and a score of other persons badly injured when the an Illinois Central express train crashed into the private car of President Harahan attached to a standing train, here. All were instantly killed, the car being smashed into splinters. President Harahan's body was hurled through the roof of the car; the two others were pinned beneath the wreckage. The regular passengers of both trains escaped injury.

The railroad officials were on their way to a conference at New Orleans.

It is stated that the standing train failed to send out a flagman. The latter is missing now and being sought by the police.

"Storm King" Wrecked.

Vancouver, Jan. 22.—(Special.)—The Vancouver tug Storm King, owned by J. H. Green, went ashore last night on a rocky ledge near Lund and now lies in thirty feet of water. The crew escaped.

REJECTION COSTS MANY MILLIONS

Ey Rejection of the Reciprocity Treaty Western Provinces Lose Thirty-two Millions.

(Special to Daily News.)

Ottawa, Jan. 22.—According to figures compiled in Winnipeg, the grain exchange there has lost seven and one-half million dollars already by the rejection of reciprocity. Three western provinces are estimated to have lost twenty-five millions.

SIX Q. C. I. COPPER-GOLD CLAIMS FETCH \$125,000

IMPORTANT MINING DEAL JUST COMPLETED—E. L. MORGAN FOR WINNIPEG SYNDICATE BUYS CLAIMS FROM D. R. BELL AND JOE DAVIS—DEVELOPMENT PLANS.

One of the largest mining deals made locally for some considerable time has just been completed between Mr. D. R. Bell and Joe Davis of this city and Mr. E. L. Morgan, who represents a strong Winnipeg syndicate of mining investors and operators.

The deal, which involves a consideration of \$125,000, transfers six valuable copper-gold claims one and a half miles from Lockport on the Queen Charlotte Islands to the syndicate represented by Mr. Morgan.

The claims are situated at an altitude of 3,000 feet, and the vein they include is 120 feet wide. The ore is of the same quality as that being handled at Goose Bay, and as development proceeds on the claims will probably be sent for smelting to Goose Bay, when the smelter is erected there.

Mr. Bell and Mr. Davis, who is a brother of Miss Grace Davis of the Government office staff, have

held these six claims for four years, resisting several tempting offers to part with them. Mr. Morgan, on behalf of the Winnipeg syndicate, states that in May development work will be commenced on the claims with machinery and a force of 25 men. With Messrs. Bell and Davis he visited the claims in the launch Ocean Bell.

MAY AEOLISH BATH TUE TAX

Relic of Days When Such a Thing Was a Luxury.

Montreal, Jan. 20.—(Special.)—Montreal's bath tub tax, a relic of the days when bath tubs and baths were among the luxuries of the rich, will probably be abolished. The tax is \$1 per bath tap in all houses having a rental of \$150 per year or over. Last year it netted \$22,000.

A LAND FULL OF OPPORTUNITIES.

That Northern British Columbia carries a larger and more varied stock of natural resources and opportunities for the settler, the prospector, the adventurer and the investor no one who has spent a couple of years in the country has reason to doubt. Not only are its ranching and fruit growing possibilities well known, its riches in minerals and water power to develop them, its great forests and its immense fisheries, but in things outside of these opportunities are offering every day by virtue of new discoveries. It is only a few weeks ago since a company financed a discovery of cement, and soon there will be a cement works within a few miles of the railway. More recently a mountain of granite, suitable for building, paving blocks and concrete, has been located, and so it goes on, one thing after another, to add to our productive wealth.

The most recent is the magnificent specimen of elephant ear sponge now on exhibition in the window of Orme's drug store, and those whose attention is attracted by it are asking if this means another industry. It probably does, but too little of the matter is known to at once definitely answer the question. This specimen was dragged up by its roots by some halibut fishermen off the west coast of Graham Island last week. It seems strange to read of sponges growing so far north, but undoubtedly this is explained by the fact that the Japan current swirls past the Queen Charlotte Islands, thus materially modifying the temperature of the ocean and the climate of the islands. Sponges are mostly found in tropical or semi-tropical waters, and the variety known as the elephant ear sponge grows to great perfection of the coast of Southern Florida. This is by no means a solitary specimen that has been found off Graham Island, but it chances to be the first that has ever been exhibited in Prince Rupert. There have been others found from time to time, but public attention being thus directly drawn to the matter it will no doubt lead to full investigation, and possibly this addition to our natural resources will result in one more being added to the growing number of our industries.

Moral for trail blazers, prospectors and adventurers by land and sea: If you find anything that looks good bring it to Rupert.

DISTRESSFUL LAND AGAIN

Terrible Rioting Predicted in Ireland Over the Inauguration of Home Rule.

Violent opposition is expected to the establishment of Home Rule in Ireland on the part of the Orangemen. Sir Edward Carson said recently: "We don't want rioting, though, unless we are forewarned there will certainly be terrible riots in Belfast immediately after the Home Rule bill passes its third reading in the House of Commons. Ulster will fight by refusing to recognize the Dublin Parliament. For instance, the farmers will refuse to pay their instalments on land they have purchased to the Dublin executive, and if the latter try to sell the farms they will not find buyers. There will be no fighting, but a deadlock. In the sequel it will come to this: The Dublin Parliament will not have any troops, and if they want to exert force they must apply to England for troops. The essential question is, would the English Parliament comply with Dublin's request and send soldiers to enforce an executive order of which England has no official knowledge and over which she has no control?"

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JEWEL THEFT IS MYSTERY

After Three Years' Quest Scotland Yard Men Run to Ground and Arrest Suspect for Robbery of Queen of Siam's Gems.

(Canadian Press Despatch.) London, Jan. 22.—Jules Deboeck, a newspaper man, is under arrest on the charge of complicity in the theft of jewels valued at \$500,000, which were being shipped to the Queen of Siam. The prisoner was remanded to custody. It is believed that other arrests are imminent.

In the summer of 1909 a London firm placed the gems in a heavy iron box and shipped them on a German steamer. When the box arrived at Bangkok it was empty. For three years Scotland Yard detectives worked on the case, but could find no evidence warranting an arrest until the other night, when they traced Deboeck from the Straits Settlement to London, where the arrest was made. The prisoner declares he is innocent.

Invented Recently by Ultra-Fashionable Mrs. Delgado Parke, Divorcee, of Chicago.

Newly invented by Mrs. Marina Delgado Parke, a fair member of Chicago's ultra-fashionable divorcee coterie, is "the divorce ring." It is worn on the little finger of the right hand. A number of her divorced friends have already adopted the emblem of renewed freedom.

TO MAKE CHOP SUEY

Well-Known New York Society Woman's Recipe.

The following directions tell how a well-known society woman in New York makes this famous Chinese dish: Cut the meat from eight pork chops (lamb may be used, though it rarely is) into small lumps and fried in hot olive oil until well browned. To the meat then are added two cups of mushrooms, two large onions, chopped fine, a stalk of strong celery, also chopped, and a cup of wheat sprouts. (These may be omitted if they cannot be obtained in a Chinese quarter or sprouted at home.) Before the meat is fried three dessertspoons of cornstarch and two of sugar should be blended in a cup of warm water, to which are added three tablespoons of Chinese or Worcester sauce. This should be added to the mixture just after the celery, onion and wheat sprouts. The whole should be cooked over a very hot fire and constantly stirred. The mass will thicken and grow smooth. It should be cooked half an hour.

A SKATING COSTUME

One of the Latest Dainty Designs in Vogue in the East.

A pretty skating costume in the new and extremely thick reversible satin was seen this week. It is in mole gray, the reverse side of which is a vieux rose. This somewhat striking color is, under normal circumstances, only displayed in the buttons and buttonholes of satin, which mark the line of the tunic, and where it forms an edging for the collar and sleeves. The rest of the gown preserves its grayness in a striped velvet, of alternating dark and light stripes. A strap of satin above the ankles is elastic, and hence allows free movement in an apparently plain skirt. A gray silk beaver toque has a trimming of the gray satin, with rosette of the vieux rose and a shaded pink ostrich plume.

OLD ENGLISH CANDLE CUP

Pleasant Restoring Drink for Winter Weather.

On a cold night, after an evening spent in skating, try the "candle cup" to warm up the skaters. It is given in Good Housekeeping as follows: Boil a cupful of oatmeal in two quarts of water, slightly salted, add the juice of two lemons, half a grated nutmeg, a teaspoonful of cinnamon, half a pound of raisins and three tart apples cut in quarters. Cook all until soft, strain through cheesecloth and pour on more water if it is too thick. When ready to serve add two well beaten eggs and remove from the fire a few minutes while stirring before pouring into a heated punch bowl.
