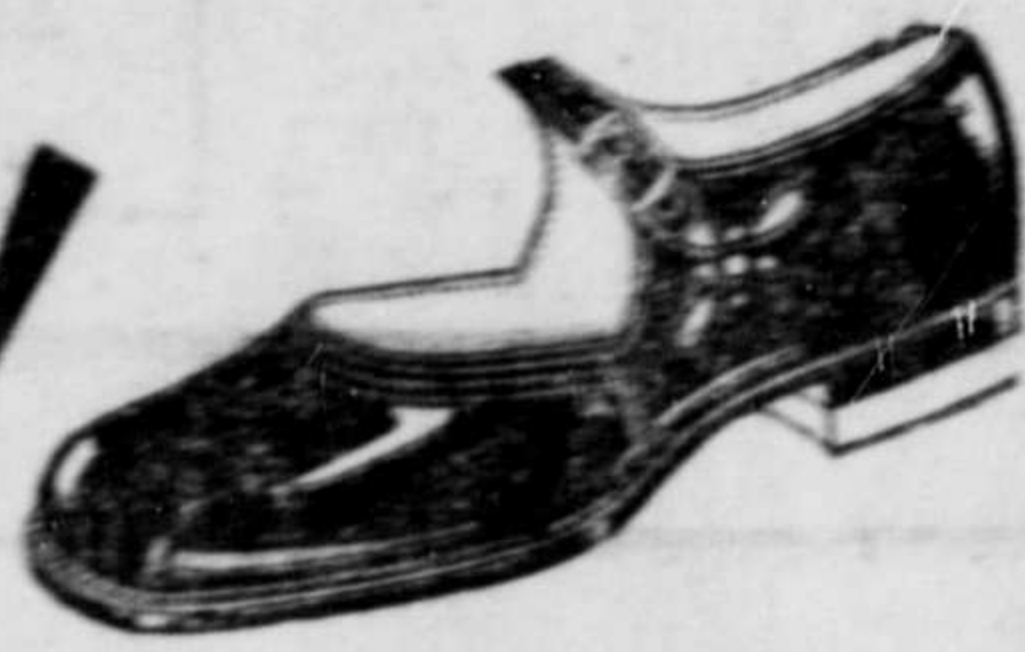

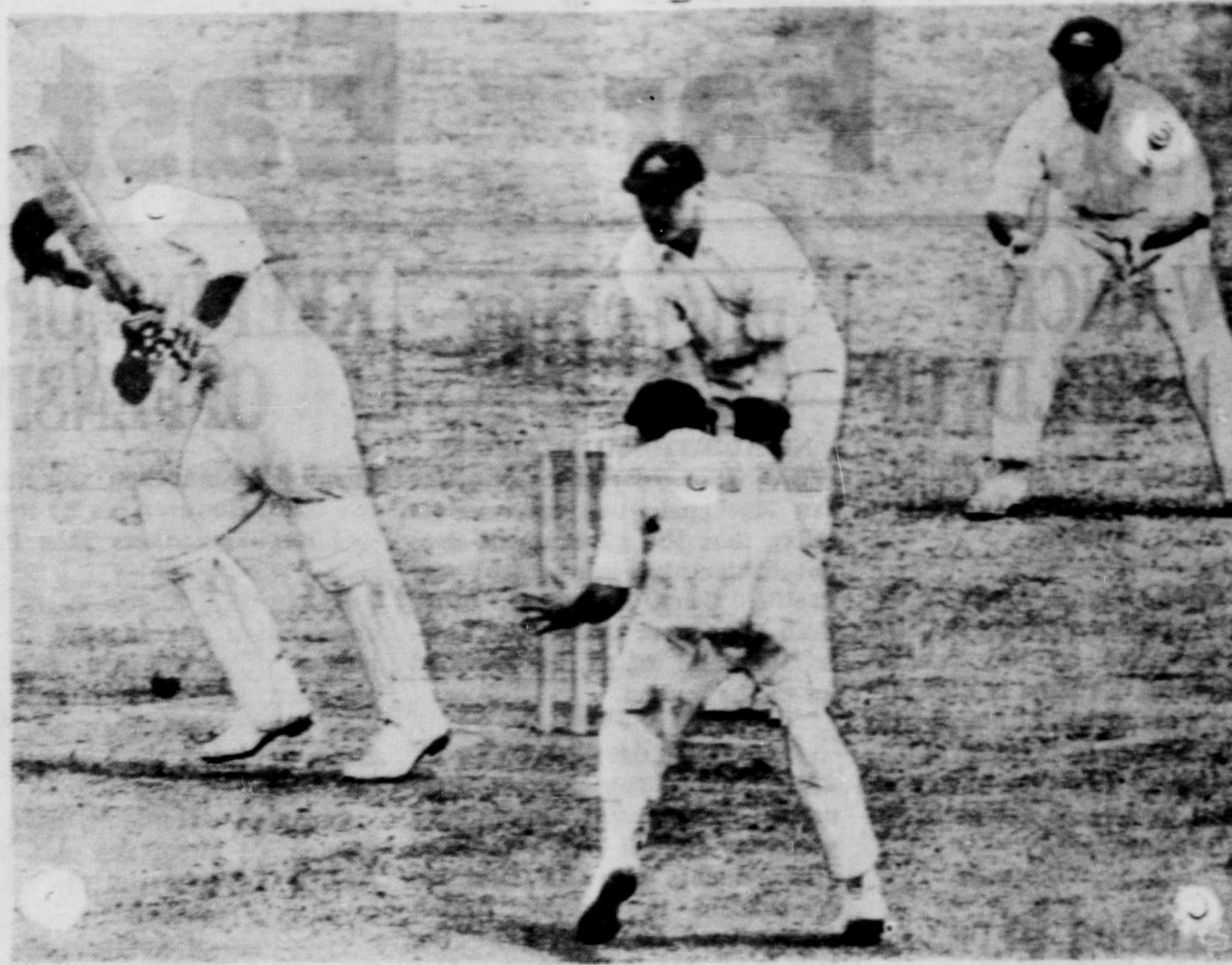

PASSED IN HIS SLEEP

Remains of Late Roy Herman Are Brought In From Skeena River.

Provincial police boat P. M. L. 8 returned to port last night bringing in the remains and boat of the late Roy Herman whose body was found early yesterday morning in the drifting boat on the Skeena River. It is believed that Herman died as he slept either from heart failure or the effects of carbon monoxide poisoning.

Herman left Port Essington at 7:30 Sunday night for fishing. He is believed to have become stranded upon a sand bar near Haysport, deciding to retire for the night and drift off. S. S. Gurovich, a fisheries patrolman in the boat Rainbow, located his boat fourteen miles above Port Essington on the opposite side of the Skeena across from Kayex River at 3 o'clock Monday morning.

The boat had evidently been leaking for the body was found face down in bilge water when found. It was still under the blanket.

Herman was forty-one years of age and was born at Mile 21 of a well known Skeena River family. He is survived by two brothers—Walter and William. Deceased had served overseas and had sustained injuries in France which affected his heart.

SERVED IN TWO WARS

Late Matthew McLean Was Both In South Africa and France—Lived in North Many Years

The late Matthew McLean, whose death occurred here last Saturday afternoon as a result of a heart attack, was a veteran of both the South African and the Great Wars. He served in the South African campaign with the Argyle and Sutherland Highlanders and in the Great War with the Twenty-Seventh Battalion. He suffered from war disabilities and was a war pensioner.

Born in Scotland fifty-eight years ago, the late Mr. McLean had resided in Northern British Columbia for thirty years and was well known in the Portland Canal district, having been employed at the Premier and Big Missouri mines. He is survived by a widow and two daughters in Pollockshaw, Glasgow, Scotland.

The funeral will be held tomorrow under Canadian Legion auspices.

Teacher Retires After 50 Years

Miss Anna B. MacIntosh Of Sydney Relinquishes Duties

SYDNEY, N. S., Aug. 2: (CP) — Miss Anna B. MacIntosh, principal of Argyle Street School, has retired after fifty years of service in the teaching profession.

She began her career at South Gut, St. Ann's, and had schools in many sections of Cape Breton Island before accepting a position in Sydney in 1901. She claims the distinction of never having missed a day from school through illness.

Rural Residents Dig Fuel Supply In Marshy Lands

ST. JOHN'S Nfld., Aug. 2: (CP) — Residents of the barren areas around Bonavista Bay, near Bale de Verde and Carbonear, are discovering a valuable commodity

which heretofore they have trodden underfoot, little realizing its value.

The Commission of Government's Department of Rural Reconstruction has engaged investigators to advise as to the commercial development of the peat deposits which cover large areas. Already the people are learning to dry the peat which is a staple fuel in parts of Ireland and Scotland and to burn it instead of wood.

Associations are being formed in a number of settlements to ensure that the deposits may be properly conserved and protected. Fires in the past have destroyed large areas of peat bogs. One of the advisers is R. F. Arnett, managing director of a peat product industry at Pitt Meadows, B. C.

Not only is peat useful for fuel, but it supplies many commercial products. It may be used for insulating dwellings and is used by California vegetable shippers for packing asparagus.

A number of residents of the Bale de Verde district have learned the art of drying the fuel. It was a revelation to many to find at their doorsteps a fuel supply when they had travelled many miles previously to get wood.

RUPERT AT CONVENTION THIS WEEK

Four resolutions to be taken by Prince Rupert's delegation to the annual convention of the Associated Boards of Trade of Central British Columbia at Smithers on Thursday and Friday of this week will urge the provincial government to carry out a definite program of completing construction of present partially completed highways before undertaking any new highway projects while the Dominion Government will be asked to give full consideration to the completion of the highway between Prince Rupert and Hazelton as a national defence project.

The Dominion Government will also be asked to grant an annual subsidy of \$60,000 per year for three years to a company operating general cargo from Prince Rupert to the United Kingdom for at least three trips per year.

The provincial government will be asked to institute assay service at the local ore sampling plant.

Prince Rupert's delegation to the convention will consist of J. T. Harvey, G. W. Nickerson, Peter Lakie, Olof Hanson, M.P., and Arthur Brooksbank. All of these except Mr. Hanson, who is already at Smithers, will leave for the interior on Wednesday evening's train and return here on Sunday night.

The text of Prince Rupert's four resolutions is as follows:

Assay Service
—Whereas it takes an average of three weeks to get assay returns from the assay office at Victoria on ore samples from Prince Rupert; and whereas the government ore sampling plant at Prince Rupert has proved its value by assistance rendered to small mining operators;

"And whereas it would help these operators still further if an assay office were established at Prince Rupert, allowing shippers to obtain payment for their ore at a much earlier date and to obtain assays more quickly;

"Therefore be it resolved that this convention urge the government to establish an assay office in connection with the ore sampling plant at Prince Rupert and that copies of this resolution be forwarded to the Hon. T. D. Pattullo, Hon. W. J. Assestine, minister of mines, E. T. Kenny, M.L.A., and Mark Connelly, M.L.A.

Defence Highway
—Whereas the city of Prince Rupert is recognized as of strategic importance from the point of view of national defence; and whereas a road linking the city of Prince Rupert with the rest of the Dominion of Canada is essential to ensure the movement of troops and transport in the event of war;

"Therefore be it resolved that this organization respectfully petition the Dominion Government to give full consideration to the completion of the highway between Prince Rupert and Hazelton as a National Defence project.

Steamship Subsidy
—Whereas the port of Prince Rupert has been equipped at great expense to make it a world port and has been provided with a trans-continental railway, a grain elevator and a large ocean dock, among other facilities;

"And whereas the excess in cost of shipping goods from Prince Rupert by ocean going vessels amounts at present to approximately \$10,000 per vessel and this excess cost has prevented the use of the port for the purpose for which it was designed and the port has in consequence no ocean steamship service whatever.

"And whereas wheat, lumber, canned salmon and products from Central British Columbia could be

shipped in large quantities from the Port of Prince Rupert if the differential in cost was absorbed by the granting of a subsidy and this in turn would place the port on a competitive basis with other Pacific Coast ports, thus eventually eliminating the need for a subsidy;

"And whereas this organization recognizes that the development of the Port of Prince Rupert is essential to the development of Central British Columbia;

"Therefore be it resolved that this organization respectfully petition the Dominion government to grant an annual subsidy for three years of \$60,000 per annum for a company operating general cargo from the port of Prince Rupert to the United Kingdom for at least six trips per year, and that copies of this resolution be forwarded to the Rt. Hon. Prime Minister, Hon. W. D. Euler, minister of trade and commerce, Hon. C. D. Howe, minister of transport, the Hon. Ian McKenzie, minister of national defence, Olof Hanson, M.P., and J. G. Turgeon, M.P.

Completing Highways
—Whereas the matter of highway construction and maintenance is one of the most difficult and serious of problems in British Columbia;

"And whereas the present highways in British Columbia do not compare well enough with those of adjoining states to make tourist travel attractive;

"And whereas there are a number of partially completed highways, and completion of which is very necessary and urgently required;

"Therefore be it resolved that this convention urge the government of British Columbia to formulate and carry out a definite program of highway construction in respect to all the present partially completed highways and that no new highway projects be undertaken until the present program is completed."

Have Sea Fleet At High Levels

JOHANNESBURG, August 2: — (CP) — Sea water was brought 400 miles in a bottle for the christening of the gig Yoeman — "first ship in the future fleet of the Rand Sea Scouts," as she was described — when she was launched at Florida Lake, which is 6,000 feet above sea level in the Rand near Johannesburg.

WHIFFLETS From The Waterfront

Having been delayed for about five hours loading salmon at Wales Island, Union steamer Catala, Capt. Ernest Sheppard, arrived in port at 12:30 noon today from Stewart, Anxoy and other northern points and sailed at 1:30 p.m. for Vancouver and waypoints.

Yesterday was a heavy day for halibut landings at the port of Seattle, twenty-two boats being in with catches aggregating 362,000 pounds. It was the largest number of boats that had been in on any single day this year while landings were the second heaviest for any day this year at the Puget Sound port. 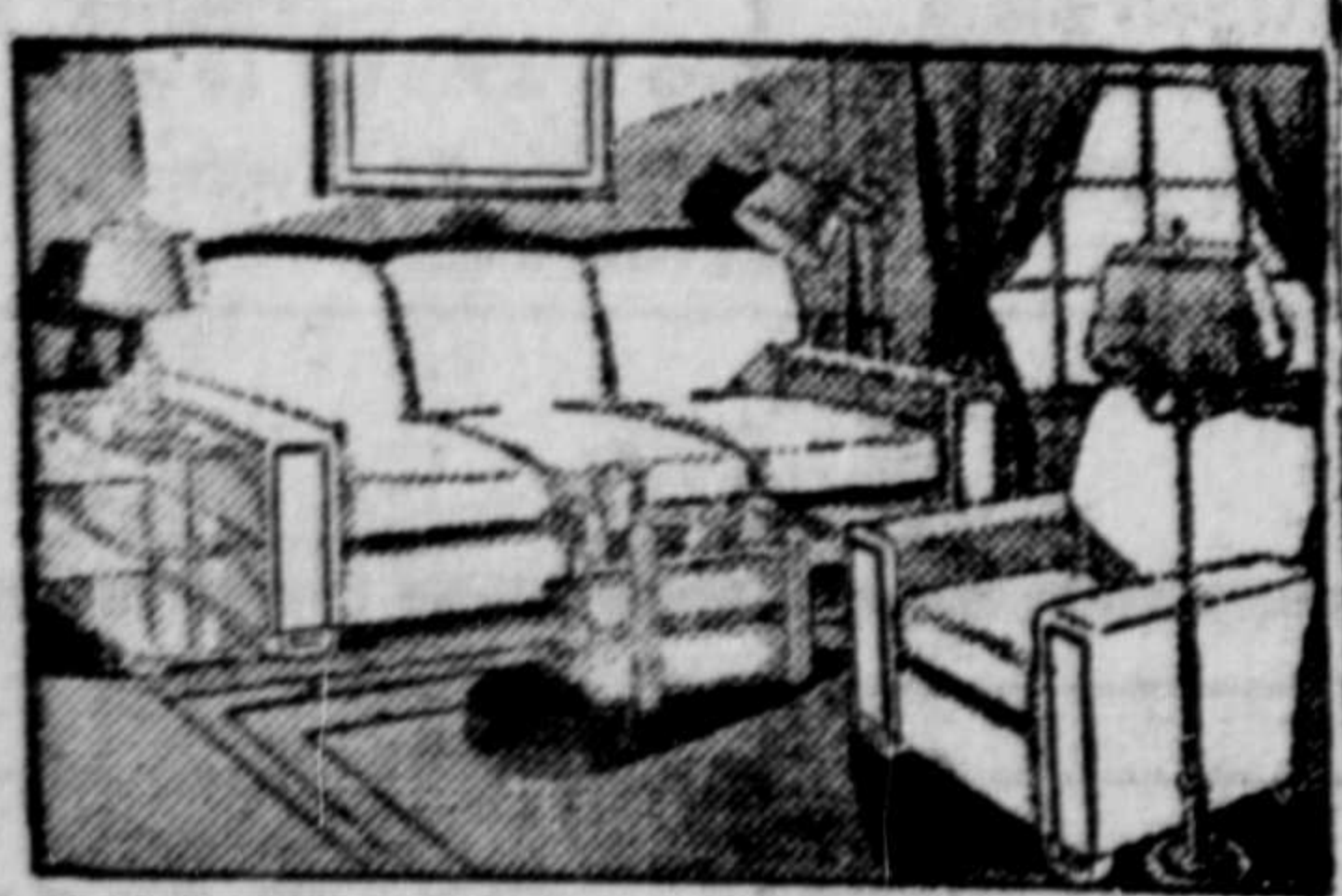

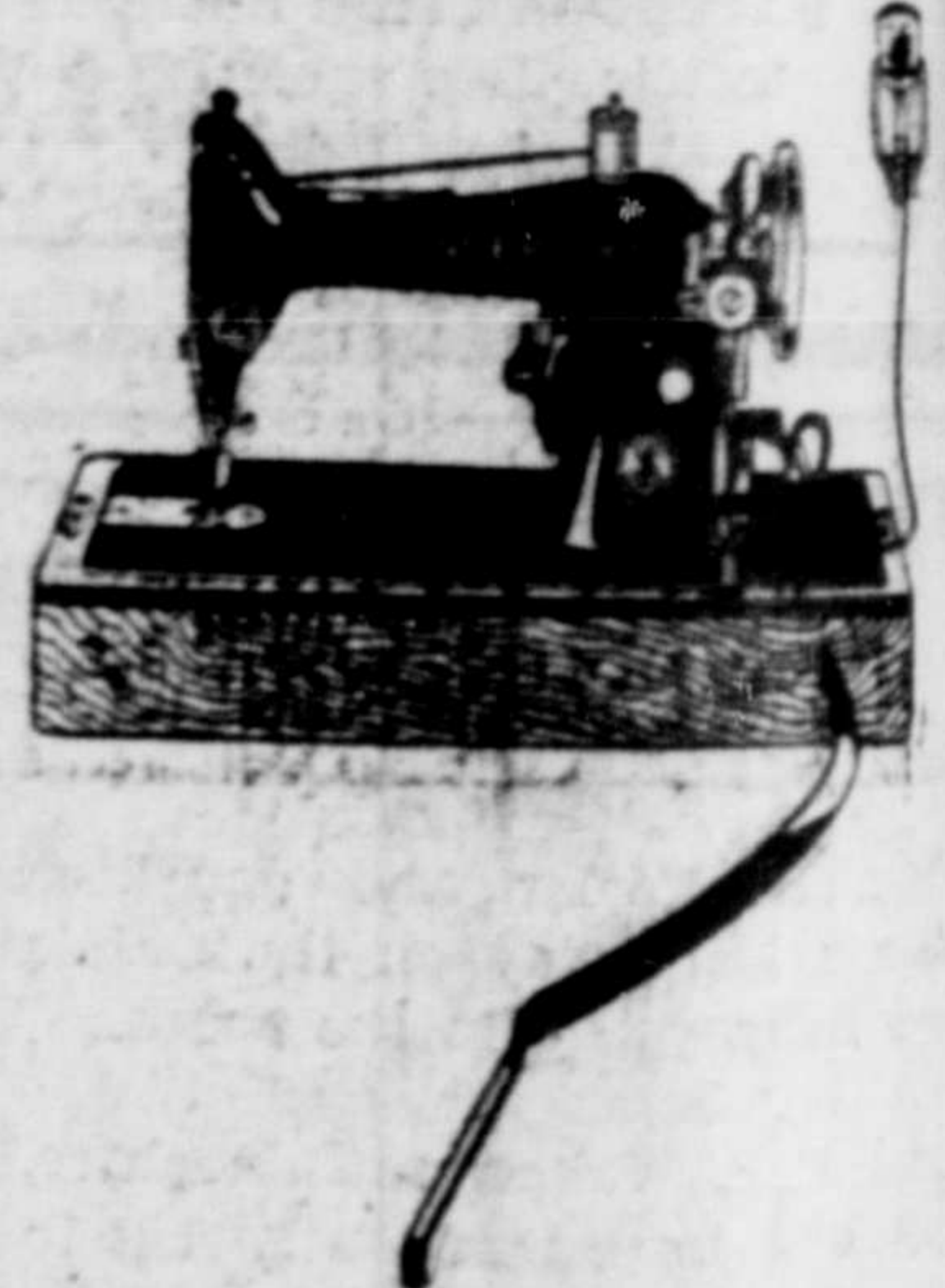
