RADIO LICENSE INCREASE

There is to be an increase in the radio license fee from two dollars to two and a half dollars. To that there should be little objection as long as the people get service in return for the money paid and as long as the license is collected from everyone.

Uu to the present this matter of radio has never been tackled in a businesslike manner. The system of having a local inspector seems to have failed and the visiting inspectors have been only spascodically active. What we seem to need is more frequent visits from an outside official who should be clothed with power to enforce the removal of interference and a system of collection under which every person using a radio should be forced to pay the fee or have the radio sealed until the fee is paid. Most people object to paying the fee when they know their neighbors get by without paying. To make payment optional is to make a joke of the whole license system.

Prince Rupert cannot expect to get unfailing reception from the south. We are simply out of range. What we want is to be able to get reception when conditions are fairly good. We want to have such reception that we can make use of the waves when they are arriving in the city. Most people would have no objection to paying the fee if they could be assured of reasonably good reception. Those who object then should not be allowed the privilege of using the radio.

The Vancouver station CBR has been a great aid to the northern part of the province. The programs average much higher than American stations to the south but often the waves are not strong enough and the local interference is too strong. The result is that evcept for the local station many evenings are blank.
