Spanish Rebel Battleship, One Of Newest Afloat, Is Sunk By Loyalist Torpedo

Depends On

LONDON, March 7: (CP)—The Spanish insurgent prize cruiser Baleares, 10,000 tons, one of the newest warships afloat, was torpedoed at dawn Sunday and exploded into flames during an insurgent-government naval battle off the southeastern coast of Spain.

Many of the warship's crew of 765 were rescued but the death toll is expected to be great.

One British seaman was killed and three were wounded when the destroyers Kempenfelt and Boreas rescued the survivors.

British destroyers Blanche and Brilliant had been attacked but were unhit by five unidentified bombing planes, the attack occurring yesterday off the Spanish coast in the same general area where the Spanish government fleet torpedoed and sank the cruiser Baleares.


