Three More Victims of Nova Scotia Colliery Disaster Succumb to Injuries at Sydney

### MEIN KAMPF

We have been asked what is "Mein Kampf." In reply may we say it is the new German Bible, a book writ- part of a maid. We have not been able to read this book because it is not published in English although there are English editions containing about one third of the original. The outstanding theme is that Germans have a mission to dominate the world.

"Mein Kampf" means "My Struggle." It is the text book for all Germans and all are expected to read it. It expresses a belief in the ascendancy of the Aryan race and particularly of the German Nordics. According to it the Aryan race must be kept pure, Intermarriage with other races, especially Jews, is a sin.

Another important point laid down in the book is that the Germans must go back to the original principle of government which is to have a freely-elected leader who is to be all powerful. That implies the wrongfulness of western democracy. Parliamentarism is absurd. The democratic mass-idea is wrong. The leader once chosen must do as he pleases although "only the hero is qualified for the task." From this we deduce that Hitler is a hero

The people will obey the will of the leader, partly because he will compel them to do so and partly because he will control all means of propaganda, the newspaper, the book, the wireless, the platform and the pulpit. These means of propaganda will show the people that he is wight. Hitler says that, "by the skilful and sustained use of propaganda, one can make a people see even Heaven as Hell or the most wretched life as Paradise." No opposition and no criticism can be allowed in the state. In carrying out this. Hitler seems to be acting just similar to Stalin in carrying out the dictatorship of the proletariat.

Hitler is a socialist in that he rigidly controls industry and profits. Fducation by the state for the state is a very important part of his plan just as in Russia. Children are taught to believe in the invincible power of the German nation and not even Christian teaching is to take the place of this. The churches are being gradually excluded from German education.

Foreign policy as laid down in "Mein Kamnf" is or of force. All Germans, no matter where located, must cooperate. If they do not they are not Germans. This im plies the annexation of all German-speaking people. Hitler has promised not to interfere with the Germans in Switzerland. Italv. Alsace or Poland. But Hitler's promises have seldom been kept. His policy is that nature knows no political frontiers and that mankind grew great in eternal conflict. In eternal peace mankind perishes.

The book indicates that Hitler looks to Russia and her neighbors for territory. Within a century there must be not eighty million Germans in Europe but two hundred and fifty millions and they must not be "cooped up as factory workers." The soil will be acquired by the sword. France is looked upon as a country that must come in on the final reckoning. She is "the irreconcilable arch-enemy." Great Britain and Italy are to be friends but the democratic system is a puzzle to the writer of the book.
