SMUTS ALL FOR UNITY

Asks Fellow Countryman Not to Make South Africa Another Ireland

WINBURG, South Africa, Dec. 23: (CP-REUTERS)—A plea for South African unity has been made by General Jan Smuts. He exhorted the nation not to break away from the commonwealth of British nations as had been suggested in some quarters.

"We don't want to become an Ireland," he said. "Where stands Ireland today? It is a land torn to its very foundations. No, we are not going to follow Ireland's precedent. We are going to keep to our course to build a stronger, unified South Africa on the foundations that have been laid."

Munich Recalled By Xmas Card Of British Premier

LONDON, Dec. 23: (CP)—The Christmas card of Prime Minister Neville Chamberlain recalls the historic trip to Munich. The picture is that of a plane above the clouds, signifying the flight. The simple caption is "Munich, September 29, 1938."

Ship Survivors At Lituya Bay

Finally Make Their Way Out From Cape Fairweather After Being Delayed by Storm

JUNEAU, December 23 (CP)—A snowstorm slowed up the progress of sixteen survivors of the wrecked motorship Patterson who were hiking from Lituya Bay from their wrecked boat off Cape Fairweather. The vanguard reached a point twelve miles from the bay Wednesday night and completed the thirty-mile trek yesterday.

LOGGERS TO TOWN

PARIS, Dec. 23: (CP)—The Chamber of Deputies today overwhelmingly approved Premier Edouard Daladier's ordinary budget for 1939. The budget estimates expenditures of \$1,750,000,000 and contains financial decree laws. It was the Premier's third test of strength since yesterday in all of which he came through with flying colors.

REVOLT IS DISCOUNTED

Counter-Revolutionary Uprisings in Spain Said by Insurgents to be Not Serious

Resumes Offensive

Government's Front in Catalonia Broken in Four Places

BURGOS Spain, Dec. 23: (CP)—Insurgent authorities discount the importance of reported counter-revolutions and uprisings in insurgent Spain. A number of arrests for espionage have been made but the situation is completely in hand, it is stated.

The insurgent command announced today that the government's front in Catalonia had been broken in four places by the first onslaught of the insurgent offensive. The drive now beginning was that forecasted for last month but delayed by leakage of General Franco's plans by which he hopes to win the civil war.

Seriously Injured In Auto Accident

Mrs. David J. Innis of Keremeos In Car Which Slipped Off Road In Fraser Canyon

VANCOUVER, Dec. 23: (CP)—Mrs. David J. Innis of Keremeos sustained serious injuries yesterday when the car in which she was driving with her husband to Vancouver skidded on the icy road near Jackass Mountain in the Fraser Canyon and dropped more than one hundred feet to the Canadian National Railway tracks below. Mr. Innis escaped with minor injuries.

FIRE SWEEPS NOTED HOTEL

Napoleon's Tomb Saved From Conflagration in Paris Last Night

PARIS, Dec. 23: (CP)—Fire last night swept the historic Hotel de Champs Elysees, doing extensive damage. Nearby Napoleon's Tomb was saved from damage.

RECOGNIZE CONQUEST

Sovereignty of Italy Over Ethiopia Now Admitted by Canada

OTTAWA, Dec. 23: (CP)—Formal recognition by Canada of Italy's conquest of Ethiopia was announced last night by Premier William Lyon Mackenzie King. The Dominion addresses King Victor Emmanuel as "Emperor of Ethiopia." The British ambassador to Rome has been requested to so notify Italy. In the recognition, Canada joins the British government as well as Australia and the Union of South Africa as well as all European nations with the exception of Russia after the League of Nations said it was up to individual members.

AIR MAIL WAS BUSY

Helped Greatly in Speeding up Christmas Postal Service

WINNIPEG, Dec. 23.—"Canada is this year enjoying the advantage of its first trans-continental Christmas air mail service and it is a source of great gratification to the postal authorities to note the citizens are making excellent use of it," stated W.F. Lough, district director of Postal services, Winnipeg. "We have handled a tremendous amount of Christmas mail, both east and west, much more than we anticipated."

"A pleasing feature of the new service, now operated by Trans-Canada Air Lines between Montreal and Vancouver, is the performance of the planes. Heavy ground fogs have delayed a few trips at Vancouver but that is not to be unexpected at this time of the year. However, the schedules have been splendidly maintained. "Last night we sent on trip No. 1 of Trans-Canada Airways 500 pounds of air mail for the prairies and Pacific Coast points and trip No. 2 that left Vancouver carried on through Winnipeg with 450 pounds of air mail," said Mr. Lough. The shipment west from Winnipeg was the largest shipment of air mail sent out of Winnipeg since the inception of the present service.

"The air mail service is so quick that it has taken all the worries away from those in the habit of mailing their cards and parcels at the last minute. Our department is greatly pleased with the new service," stated Mr. Lough.

She was eighty-two years of age and was born in Port Simpson but had made her home here for the past ten years. The family is well and favorably known throughout the district.

Deceased is survived by two daughters—Mrs. Gladys Greggs of Vancouver and Mrs. Fanny White of Prince Rupert—and two sons—Thomas Gosnell of Port Simpson and William Gosnell of Prince Rupert. Funeral arrangements are in the hands of B. C. Undertakers.

GOV'T HAS WON MOST

Victorious in Six of Eight By-Elections Since Munich—Also Has Popular Vote Lead

LONDON, Dec. 23: (CP)—The by-election of Wednesday in Kinross-West Perth, in which the Duchess of Atholl lost the seat which she had occupied for fifteen years to W. McNair Snadden, straight Conservative candidate, and hearty supporter of Premier Chamberlain, made the eighth by-election since Munich and the Czechoslovakian crisis. Of these the government won six and Labor two. The total vote was approximately 197,000 for the government and 177,000 against.

Today the Duchess was 1300 votes behind Snadden with some polls yet to be heard from although they cannot change the result. The Duchess was elected to the House in the general election as a Conservative but was repudiated by the local Association at Grief when she started opposing Chamberlain's foreign policy. This led to her resignation to re-contest the seat as an independent.

"I still think that the government's 'no' is leading us into grave danger," the Duchess said on learning of her defeat.

ALL ARE LINED UP

Twenty-One Pan-American Nations Agree to Maintain Solidarity Against Foreign Intervention

LIMA, Dec. 23: (CP)—The Western Hemisphere's twenty-one republics tonight proclaimed their "decision to maintain and defend" their continental solidarity "against all foreign intervention or activities."

The declaration was drafted by Argentine which had insisted that there be no mention made specifically of aggression off the continent.

Founder Of Town In Alberta Dies

Eugene Bashow, After Whom Community Was Named, Passes Away in Spokane

CALGARY, Dec. 23: (CP)—Word reached here yesterday of the death in Spokane of Eugene Bashow, one of the pioneer settlers of the Camrose district of Alberta. He was the founder of the town of Bashow.

LIBERALS UNITED

Chief Party Whip at Ottawa Announces Solidarity After Visit With Hepburn

OTTAWA, December 23 (Canadian Press)—"We're going to fight the Tories with a united front," W. A. Fraser, Liberal member for Northumberland, and Ross Gray, chief Liberal whip in the House of Commons, said yesterday on their return from a visit with Premier Hepburn at his farm home near St. Thomas. The interview of the two members followed the recent caucus to consider the split between Premier Hepburn and Prime Minister William Lyon Mackenzie King. Premier Hepburn, at St. Thomas, said he had absolutely no comment to make.

President Roosevelt Is Ridiculed By Nazis Press In Latest Blast

No Direct Reference is Made to United States Rebuke at Protestation Over Speech of Secretary of Interior Ickes

BERLIN, December 23: (CP)—The Nazi press today ridiculed President Franklin D. Roosevelt but avoided any direct reference to the United States rebuke to Nazi protestations in regard to the speech of Secretary of the Interior Harold Ickes. Officialdom and press awaited word from Chancellor Adolf Hitler as to the next move.

The newspapers scorned Roosevelt for accepting a medal from an American Hebrew magazine for having done the most to improve semitic-Christian relations in the past year.

Previously the Nazi press had described as "impudent and insulting" Secretary Ickes outspoken condemnation of German treatment of Jews. Ickes has been in disfavor with Germany ever since he refused to permit export of helium gas to Germany on the suspicion that it was to be used in dirigibles for military purposes.

Commission On Highway Is Appointed

OTTAWA, Dec. 23: (CP)—Personnel of a five-man Canadian commission which will study construction of the proposed British Columbia Yukon-Alaska highway project in collaboration with a similar commission of the United States was announced last night by Prime Minister William Lyon Mackenzie King. It consists of Hon. Charles Stewart, former minister of the interior, chairman; Arthur Dixon, deputy minister of public works for British Columbia; J. W. Spencer, Victoria department store head; Brigadier General T. L. Tremblay of Quebec and J. M. Wardle, Ottawa, of the federal department of mines and resources.

Bonusing Airmen In South Africa

Cape Union Meets Success in Training Men for Air Force Reserve

JOHANNESBURG, Dec. 23: (CP)—Remarkable expansion of the flying club movement in the Union of South Africa following the announcement of the government's scheme for the training of 1,000 pupil pilots for the South African Air Force Reserve through the medium of civilian flying clubs and schools, is related in the Director of Civil Aviation's annual report. "The general expansion in flying training activities in consequence of the inauguration of this scheme has been most marked," the report states, "and today 19 approved flying clubs and schools are actively engaged in training pilots either for the Air Force Reserve or up to the standard of the private pilot's licence on the issue of which a small government subsidy is payable to the club or school and the pilot concerned."

Toronto Mayor Being Opposed

Lewis Duncan, Barrister, Nominated For Chief Magistracy At Forthcoming Civic Election

TORONTO, Dec. 23: (CP)—Lewis Duncan, a prominent barrister, was nominated yesterday to oppose Mayor Day's re-election at the forthcoming civic election. Patrick Sullivan, who had been in the field, was declared ineligible.

Unemployed Enter Fashionable Hotel

Ritz in London Visited by Demonstrators Asking For Relief

LONDON, Dec. 23: (CP)—The fashionable Ritz Hotel was invaded yesterday afternoon by fifty unemployed demonstrators crying: "We want relief." The place was quickly cleared by police.

EDITORIAL

DUCHESS DEFEATED

In Scotland at the general election the Duchess of Athol was elected in Kinross and West Perth as a straight Conservative. Later she did not like the Chamberlain policy and said so. Her constituents objected so she resigned and ran again as an independent candidate.

Now the Duchess is defeated, her opponent being a supporter of the Chamberlain government. This indicates that the Scottish people of that part of Scotland are behind the Chamberlain government in its policy of appeasement.

The fact that the British government won this election does not mean that Chamberlain is right in his policy. Neither does it indicate that he is not right. It simply shows that at least one constituency believes that he is right and the result is one of the straws indicating what might happen in a general election.

FOREIGN CONCESSIONS

From time to time China has granted trade concessions to foreign nations, including Great Britain. These are held under treaty. One of the most important of these is at Shanghai. The Japanese policy is to drive all foreigners out of China and gather in all the foreign trade of that country for herself. What the other countries will say about that is yet to be decided. It is one of the present war dangers. Should Great Britain decide to allow herself to be driven out of China the next step might be to be driven out of Hong Kong and possibly Singapore. This she could not allow. The United States also has considerable interest in China and would probably do more than protest should Japan decide to make the matter an issue. That is one reason why it is desirable that the defences of Prince Rupert should be strengthened as rapidly as possible.

CANNOT BE TRUSTED

Evidently new German settlers in any country cannot be trusted. We have already seen what is happening in many parts of the world where Germans are proving that when they go to a new country they do not become real citizens but retain certain alliances with the Fatherland. This is not always true. Many Germans become excellent citizens ready to defend and fight for their new country. That was seen in Canada and in United States during the time of the Great War. Yet the percentage of those who retain their allegiance with Germany is too great. Just now in Great Britain German workmen are said to be lining up to harass the defense preparations of that country in the belief that there is bound to be war and Germany will win.

HAILED AS MEDAL FOR IRON MAN GALLANTRY

Detroit Centre Playing His 10th Big League Season

DETROIT, Dec. 23: (CP)—They are hailing Marty Barry, Detroit Red Wing centre, as the new iron man of the National Hockey League.

The rugged Montreal boy, who is playing his 10th Big League season, is following the tradition of Murray Murdoch, former New York Ranger forward. Murdoch played in every Ranger game for 11 years before dropping to the minors last year to coach at Yale.

Barry has participated in more than 500 exhibition, play-off and league games without missing a single contest. Thirty-seven of the games were in Stanley up play-off competition.

Although Barry played a month with the New York Americans in 1928 and then dropped to New Haven and Philadelphia, he started his near-record run of games with Boston Bruins in 1929. He came to the Wings in 1935 and the next year at Toronto came closest to breaking his run of games when he hurt his hip playing the Maple Leafs.

This season in Chicago he had six stitches taken in his throat but three nights later took his regular turn on the ice. In 1933 he almost missed a game again when he rushed to his wife's bedside in a Montreal hospital on reports her condition was critical. She improved rapidly so he was able to return to Boston just in time to take the ice for the game.

Twice Barry topped the old American division in scoring, once in a tie with Paul Thompson of Chicago. Barry has averaged 36 points a season, putting him in a prominent place among the lifetime scoring leaders.

M.P.'S HAVE NICKNAMES

People in Public Eye Find Characteristics Labelled

LONDON, Dec. 23 (CP)—"Donald Duck," "Rosebud," "Henry VIII," "The Immaculate Bridegroom" and "Mole Face" have seats in the House of Commons but you can't publish all their names. There would be objections.

A. T. Lennox-Boyd, former parliamentary secretary to the Labor Ministry, is called "Stratosphere." He is six feet, seven inches tall.

Labor Minister Brown is known as "Snowdrop." He got the name when unemployment relief regulations were being prepared. He repeatedly promised them "in the spring."

"Donald Duck" is George Griffiths, Labor member for Hemsworth West Riding. He has a pronounced colloquial accent and speaks with furious emphasis.

His appearance — and nothing else, his friends are quick to say — made W. S. Liddall, Conservative member for Lincoln, "Henry VIII."

The Duchess of Atholl, noted for her advanced views, is called "Red Katie." Miss Ellen Wilkinson, Labor member for Yarrow, is "Red Biddy" because she has auburn hair. She called Air Minister Sir Kingsley Wood "Aunt Annie." The name stuck although no one appears to know why it was bestowed.

HAMILTON, Ont., Dec. 23: (CP)—The bronze medal of the Royal Canadian Humane Association is awarded to Verdon LaFortune of Toronto for his gallant effort in connection with the rescue of a motorboat party from drowning in Lake Ontario, Sunday, October 30.

The motorboat was proceeding from Toronto to Trenton with a party of eight persons when the motor stalled, leaving the craft without power in rough waters. LaFortune, one of the party, took a small rowboat to row ashore for help but, within 10 feet of the cliffs the boat capsized and he was thrown into the waves. He struggled to shore and had to climb a high cliff where he was able to secure help. The Toronto life saving crew was summoned and brought the rest of the party to safety.

Mrs. Stanley Summerfield of Moncton, N.B., is given the association's parchment certificate for the rescue of Mrs. John A. Patterson from being burned to death at Shelburne, Ont., July 8.

John R. Mize, St. Louis, was the leading slugger for the National League this season with a percentage of .614. Joseph M. Medwick, St. Louis, for the third consecutive year, batted in most runs, 122. Adolf Camill, Brooklyn, received most bases on balls, 119. Vincent DiMaggio, Boston, for the second consecutive year, struck out most times, 134, establishing a new league record. The previous mark of 119 was made by Adolph Camill, Philadelphia, in 1935. James R. Brown, St. Louis, struck out the fewest number of times, 9, among the regular players who took part in 100 or more games. Ivan R. Goodman, Cincinnati, was hit most often by pitched balls, 15.

Ernest N. Lombardi, Cincinnati, by hitting into 30 double plays, established a new record, displacing his own mark of 24 made in 1934. Melvin T. Ott, New York, by receiving 118 bases on balls, brought his record for 100 or more bases on balls during a season to six years. He was hit 3 times by pitcher James Tobin, Pittsburgh, on September 15, thus tying a record held by L. Roy Evans, St. Louis August 3, 1910. John W. Hudson, Brooklyn, by hitting into three double plays on August 25, second game, against Chicago, tied a record held by many players.

Among the clubs, St. Louis leads in slugging percentage, with a mark of .407, and batted in most runs, 680. Brooklyn received most bases on balls, 611, had struck out most times, 615. New York, for the third consecutive year, had most batsmen hit by pitcher, 33. Chicago, by hitting into 157 double plays, established a new league record, displacing the former mark of 146, made by Boston in 1932. Cincinnati, by having four batters hit in the second game of a double-header on July 19, against Boston, tied the modern record made by New York, August 1, 1908.

ARE OUT OF LUCK

Montreal Canadiens Are Beaten Again, This Time By New York Rangers—Black Hawks-Red Wings Tie

MONTREAL, Dec. 23 (CP)—The luckless Montreal Canadiens just cannot get out of the cellar in the National Hockey League. Last night they dropped a five to two decision to the New York Rangers while the Detroit Red Wings, with whom they had been tied for basement honors, were playing a three-all overtime draw with the Chicago Black Hawks. The three winning goals against the Canadiens were scored by the Rangers in the final period.



Pour a can of condensed soup over the whole and put in a moderate oven (350 deg. F.) and bake for 30 minutes. Buttered crumbs may be sprinkled over the top if desired.
Serve with buttered squash and parsley potatoes.

The Christmas message brought to the members of the Prince Rupert Rotary Club yesterday by Rev. J. C. Jackson at the weekly luncheon in the Commodore Cafe was an urge not to be too busy with making a living to give heed to the higher things of life such as beauty, joy, the love of children and the religion of Jesus.

The speaker drew a picture of what happened on the first Christmas at Bethlehem when there was no room for the family in the inn and they had to be content with the hospitality of the stable. It was difficult to accept the best things when minds were filled with war, greed or social sin. Jesus came to bring great joy to all people and this was the message he passed on. The mind must be attuned to receiving the message and willing to accept it, the speaker concluded.


Russian Twins Come To Canada
