SINKS IN PUGET SOUND

SEATTLE-The Coast Steamship Co.'s motorship Coaster sank in Puget Sound today after collision with the Alaska-bound steamship North Coast. The North Coast proceeded on her voyage after Capt. A. J. Borklund of the North Coast had immediately ordered a lifeboat lowered to rescue the Coaster's crew of eight. The Coaster was enroute from Howe Sound to Tacoma smelter. The cargo was insured.


