CABINET RESIGNS

Lithuanian Government Quits Following Submission to Poland—Not Accepted

KAUNALS, Lithuania, March 22: (CP)—Having taken the unpopular step of yielding to the Polish ultimatum on Saturday, the Lithuanian cabinet has resigned. President Smetona has, however, refused to accept the resignation until the return of Premier Tubelis who is seriously ill in Switzerland.

It was reported last week that if the cabinet was forced out, only a pro-German cabinet could be formed.

RAILWAY LAY-OFF

Minister of Transport Hopes Shopmen's Disputes Will Be Amicably Settled

OTTAWA, March 22: (CP)—Hon. Clarence D. Howe, minister of transport, told the House of Commons yesterday that he hoped a dispute of Canadian National shopmen would be settled amicably without a general lay-off.

The dispute reached the floor of the House when A. A. Heaps of Winnipeg North, C.C.F. member, said he understood thousands of men were being thrown out of work by the railways.

Mr. Howe said the dispute was due to slackness of work and inability to maintain the five-day week. The management suggested a four-day week but the shop unions refused and claimed that any reduction would be at the expense of junior employees.

EARTHQUAKE FELT HERE

Slight Shock Was Undoubtedly Recorded in Prince Rupert This Morning

Inquiry at the Dominion Observatory at Victoria today elicited the information that the centre of this morning's earthquake disturbance was 550 miles north of Victoria, about ten miles from Prince Rupert. The tremor was also felt on the Queen Charlotte Islands where people were awakened from their sleep. It was also strong enough to be felt in Alaska.

What was undoubtedly a slight earth tremor is reported to have been perceived by a number of Prince Rupert people as they sat calmly at their breakfast tables at 7:25 this morning. A distinct shake was evidently noticed by quite a few people, light fixtures and furniture quivering for a few seconds.

John Ivarson of Beach Place reports that he was up at the time and the windows of the house shook and the dishes rattled indicating a very decided quake. The tremor seems to have been noticed in every part of the city.

Last night about ten o'clock some people saw a particularly vivid meteor of greenish hue, appearing much like a colored rocket fall from the skies. It seemed to be unusually close at hand. Had it been at a different time of year, it would have been dismissed as a piece of pyrotechnics.

LOOKING BACK

Looking back at the recent move in Europe which followed the removal of Anthony Eden it seems as if either Prime Minister Neville Chamberlain was a party to the rape of Austria or that he was used by the pro-German group in the British government to make conditions such that the invasion could be carried out with the least possible chance of interference from Great Britain.

Evidently, this action is not approved in Canada as indicated by a number of editorial articles published in this country. On the other hand, it must be remembered that Canada withdrew from effective membership in the League of Nations many months ago and has, through the Ottawa government, refused to be a party to any action by Britain. Canada has in fact said: "Go ahead if you like but don't count on us." That was the effect of the refusal of Premier Mackenzie King to make any suggestions either for or against the policy followed.

In view of this situation, it is not for Canadians to criticize the policy of the British government or Mr. Chamberlain or any other British statesman. Canada's opinion is that Canada is not interested in what Britain does in this regard.

Anthony Eden may be a hero to the average Canadian. Chamberlain may or may not be a traitor to the men who fought in the last war. We may all feel saddened by the fallen prestige of the British Empire, snubbed and ignored and spurned, but unless we are prepared to do our part in any trouble that may follow the "firm stand" policy which all admire, we had better keep silent, swallow our pride and remember that the outcome in Europe is to some extent at least the result of the Canadian and American policy of determined non-participation.

WHOSE TURN NEXT?

Evidently Chancellor Hitler and Premier Mussolini combined forces to get rid of Anthony Eden from the annoying position of Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs in the British government. Having secured the appointment of a friendly secretary in his place, they pounced on Austria, this being Germany's slice of the plunder. Now it is Italy's turn. The two dictatorships concentrated their efforts in Spain after promising to withdraw. It would seem the logical move soon for Il Duce to march into Spain, declare the country a part of the Italian Empire and appoint General Franco governor general of the province.

Whatever action is taken it is pretty sure that Italy is looking to get her share of the plunder while the getting is good. Whether it is in Europe or in Africa, we can be sure it is planned. In the meantime, Canada is not interested in these things and Chamberlain seems to be making Mussolini happy with his appeasement talk.



TROPHY TO THOMPSON

Boston Goalie Greatest Net Minder in National League For Fourth Time

MONTREAL, March 22: (CP)—Tiny Thompson of the Boston Bruins has won the Georges Vezina trophy as the greatest National Hockey League goal-tender. It was the fourth win for Thompson who finished the season with 89 goals against him, seven less than were scored against Dave Kerr of New York Rangers, the runner-up.

Gordon Drillon of the Toronto Maple Leafs finished up the season as high scorer of the league with 52 points, two more than his teammate, Sylvanus Apps.

Eggs
Eggs can be served so tastily in the ordinary ways in which they are used, such as boiled, poached or fried, that many people may not realize the great adaptability of this food and that it can be used as the basis of a wide variety of dishes. However, with the true food value of eggs becoming better understood as a result of nutritional research; new ways of preparing eggs are of interest.

French Omelet
Beat the eggs with a fork, adding one tablespoonful of cream and one of water for each egg used. Into a heavy frying pan put plenty of butter and let it get sizzling hot. Then pour in the eggs and lessen the heat. Immediately start shaking the pan back and forth and roll the omelet as soon as the edge is firm and while it is still wet. The inside of the omelet cooks while it is being removed from the pan. To roll the omelet lift one edge and roll it over. Tilt the skillet in the direction the omelet is to be rolled and assist in the rolling with a spatula or knife. Slip the omelet from the skillet to a hot platter and garnish.

INSPECTOR IS HEARD

Dr. Hugh Morrison Speaks on "Education" at Terrace Meeting

TERRACE, March 22.—Dr. Hugh M. Morrison, inspector of schools, delivered a lecture on Friday night in Terrace on the subject of education.

The speaker was listened to with marked attention by all present. The old idea of the public schools being but stepping stones on the way to the university was giving way, the speaker emphasized, to a more liberal view of educating the coming generation to take their places directly in those spheres of activity which they choose. Although in some parts of the country it had become advantageous to consolidate schools, he did not expect much development along that line in the coast districts.

A. E. White was chairman and introduced Dr. Morrison. On behalf of the school board, W. A. Kirkpatrick thanked the speaker for an interesting and instructive address.

GUNNERY IS SHOWN

Local Battery, Inspected by Visiting Officer, Gives Display of Work Done

Some sixty officers, non-commissioned officers and men of the 102nd heavy battery of the Royal Canadian Artillery gave a display last evening on the occasion of an official inspection by Major W. R. Stone, officer commanding the Royal Canadian Artillery at Esquimalt. The battery, which is commanded by Lieut. Col. S. D. Johnston V.D., M.C., was put through battery and ceremonial drills by Sergeant Major James Hagden with Captain A. G. Rix in charge. The drills were carried out with commendable precision and examples of detail work were then shown. Sergeant Alex Mitchell gave a lesson in range finding, Sergeant Wisner Bryant in Anti-aircraft work with a Lewis gun; Sergeant E. R. Hudson showed work on the Range Indicating dial; Bombardier Madill, gunnery, and Bombardier Macdonald in first aid.

It was difficult for a layman to realize the vast amount of work which has to be done by members of the battery and especially by officers in order to get a maximum of efficiency in the work.

After the formal inspection, the visiting officers spoke encouragingly to the men and complimented them on the degree of proficiency already attained.

Right Rev. G. A. Rix, Bishop of Caledonia and chaplain of the battery spoke, complimenting the battery on the splendid showing it had made and on the unselfish work its members were carrying out on behalf of the community. All hoped that their services would not be required but, should they be called into action to repel an invader, people here would sleep more soundly with the knowledge that the defenses were in such good hands. All hoped that the government would provide everything necessary to enable them to make their work effective. He was glad to have heard that it was the intention to properly equip the battery here and provide at least one gun this year with others to follow. The first gun, he understood, would be set up in the new shed which had recently been erected for the purpose.

The Bishop said that, while the work of the soldier was sometimes criticized, there could be absolutely no criticism of the men preparing to defend their homes and people. At the close of the proceedings light refreshments were provided by the cook house squad. Watching the review were close relatives of the members of the battery with a few officers who served overseas in the Great War and in South Africa. Of the sixty members of the battery taking part only four or five had seen service overseas. They were all young men of fine physique and looked particularly fit in their kakhki uniforms.

ANNUAL REPORT OF CITY

City Commissioner Urges Continued Economy; Points Out Handicap Under Which Prince Rupert Suffers

The city commissioner has just issued the annual report for the year 1937, showing that the financial condition of the city continues sound with only \$2,762 owing to the sinking fund and with enough cash on hand to carry over with careful handling until the taxes for the present year are paid.

In his report to the minister of municipalities Commissioner Alder says in part:

"Although there has been a continued reduction in assessment during the past four years, owing to forfeiture of property for non-payment of taxes, the city has again met all its obligations without any loans from its bankers. This has been accomplished by a policy of strict economy and the maintenance only of streets, public utilities and buildings, all of which have been kept in good order.

"Prince Rupert occupies a peculiar position among the cities of British Columbia in its relationship to the provincial government in that one-fourth of the lots in the original townsite became vested in the province and, while a considerable number of these were sold, over 1600 lots are still government-owned. Many of these lots front on streets on which local improvements in the way of roads, sidewalks and sewers were installed and, as the government has not recognized any obligation in this respect, the city, or rather other taxpayers, have carried an added burden of \$77,000 due on these lots for local improvements in addition to carrying such a large amount of property free from general taxes."

Concluding the report to the minister, the Commissioner says: "until the city gets industrial development, continued economy must be practiced and new pro-
