Dogs do not know how to behave in a strange house or in a strange garden, no matter how well-behaved they may be at home.

UNION OF LABOR AND LIEERAL

In Britain there is a strong movement afoot to try to bring about a united opposition of Labor, Liberal and other factions, having particular regard to the foreign policy of the government. Those opposed to the British government claim that this is unjust. They also object to the practical throwing over of the League of Nations with its general principle of collective security.
