HENDAYE, France, May 14: (CP) -Government planes launched a surprise attack on the eastern Spanish front as the insurgent drive against Valencia gained headway. The insurgents called immediately for plane reinforcements. The rebels said they had shot down seven government planes without losing any themselves.

Fifty Years Ago Yesterday Was Heavy Blizzard

Cunningham Tells of Weather Conditions on Skeena In Spring of 1888

Fifty years ago yesterday, May 13, 1888, there was a tremendous blizzard on the Skeena River with snow piled in drifts five and six feet high at Port Essington, according to George Cunningham, pioneer canneryman, who was in the Friday, returning home by last evening's train.

Mr. Cunningham says it began to blow and snow in the early morning and, during the height of the blizzard, the sound of the whistle of the cannery steamer Cariboo Fly was heard above the howling of the wind and in came the vessel and tied up at the dock, Captain Myers knew the river so well that he could feel his way through.

In the afternoon of that day the wind dropped suddenly and the sun shone and it was so warm people had to go around with their coats off and the snow quickly disappeared.

In February 1888 it was much like February of this year with sunshine and mild weather.

The danger of a policy of this kind is that, once the populace becomes restive, the government must look for some outlet for their activities to take their minds off their grievances and this may cause international complications.

The working out of the German situation indicates the danger of dictatorships of any kind. Sooner or later they lead to oppression and oppression leads to revolt.

Meadows, Liverpool, England, been able to give any effective cooperation with a view to taking care of such persons outside of the hospital. Under a new regulation, as already announced, the government will not allow per capita grant for such indigent persons who have been in hospital over three hundred days. There was a communication at last night's hospital board meeting from the inspector of hospitals in regard to the subject. The gist of this communication was to place the responsibility for disposal, of such patients on the hospital, reminding it that the board could decide who should or should not be permitted to enter hospital but that, as long as a hospital was receiving public grants, it could not reject patients through their inability to pay. The idea of the per capita grant covering all patients was that a separate fund should be kept to be drawn upon as required! against the accounts of indigents. The per capita grant was not intended to be applied directly to the! accounts of paying patients. Nor was it expected that it would meet the entire cost of taking care of indigents. The idea was that the one should offset the other. Every possible assistance would be given by the governmental department in bringing about the removal from hospitals of "problem" cases.
