British Freighter Is Bombed And Sunk In Mediterranean; Insurgent Aircraft Blamed

LONDON, February 4: (CP)—According to a report from Spanish government quarters in Barcelona today, the British feighter Alcira was bombed and sunk by two insurgent planes off Barcelona. The crew is reported to have been saved.

Great Britain and France are to act jointly in sending seventy warships into the Mediterranean in the effort to prevent further piratical attacks on merchant ships, it was said last night.


